

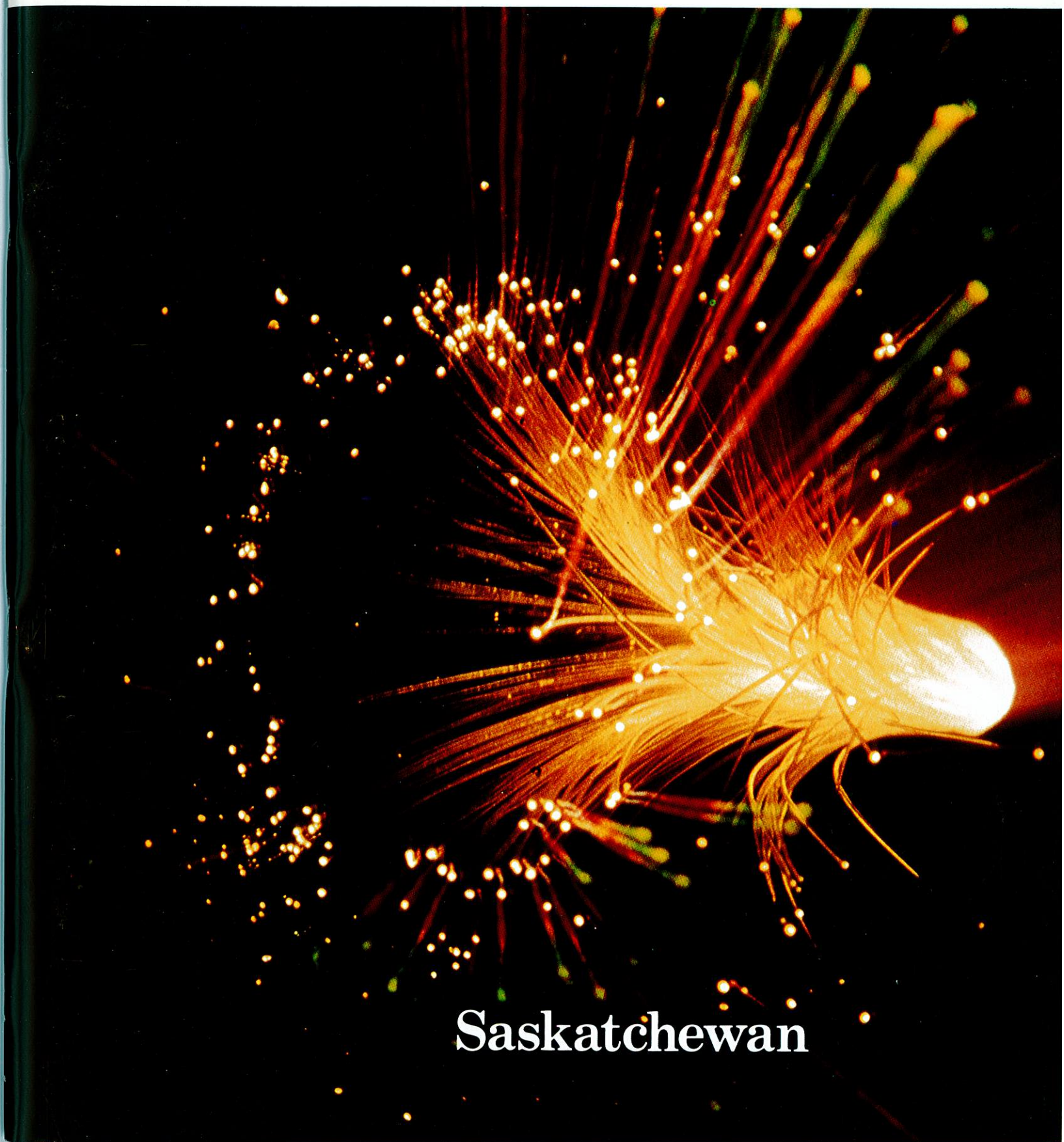

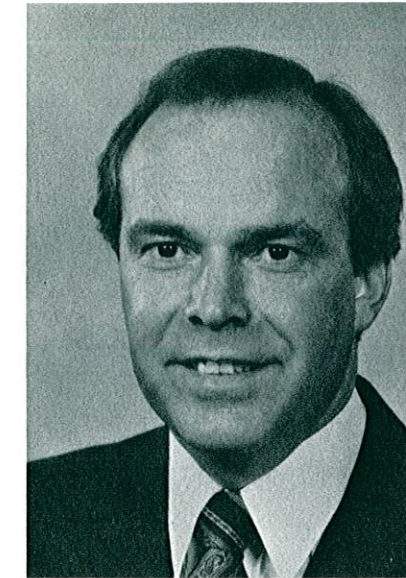

## Foreword

---



In the midst of the worst recession in North America since the 1930's, the Saskatchewan economy performed very well. Employment growth in the past year indicates that the people of this province have, despite the odds, refused to participate in the recession.

We made history in 1983, ending the year with our population passing the one million mark!

Saskatchewan economy created jobs faster than virtually any province in Canada this year. I consider this a significant achievement, given that international markets for our vital exports of grains and minerals were generally depressed. We must continue our determination, however, to improve the employment prospects for all citizens of Saskatchewan.

The rate of inflation has been cut almost in half over the last two years. Elimination of the gasoline tax helped to reduce personal and business costs and, unlike other jurisdictions, there were no increases in provincial income taxes. We continue to enjoy among the lowest housing costs in Canada, with mortgage interest rate protection, and many farm families look forward to reduced fuel bills through rural gasification.

The economy is on the move. Improving business prospects, government incentives and lower interest rates have combined to create a strong surge in housing construction this year. I am especially pleased to note that the smaller cities, towns and rural areas have posted far greater than average increases in residential construction.

The oil industry is booming, due to changes in government policies, and a heavy oil upgrader will sustain that activity. The production of potash and uranium have risen considerably in the latter part of 1983, and the outlook for agricultural prices is more encouraging. Barring unpredictable external forces, such as renewed recession, the prospects for growth and diversification are excellent.

Independent economic forecasts continue to place Saskatchewan above the national average growth rate this year, next year, and possibly beyond this decade.

I sense a new spirit in Saskatchewan. Over the past two years this province has done well in handling the problems the international market has sent our way. Together we can make those forecasts of the future reality.

## 1983 in Review

### Growth in Output and Employment

The Saskatchewan economy has shown strong recovery in output during 1983. The production and sales of oil, potash and uranium have rebounded sharply.

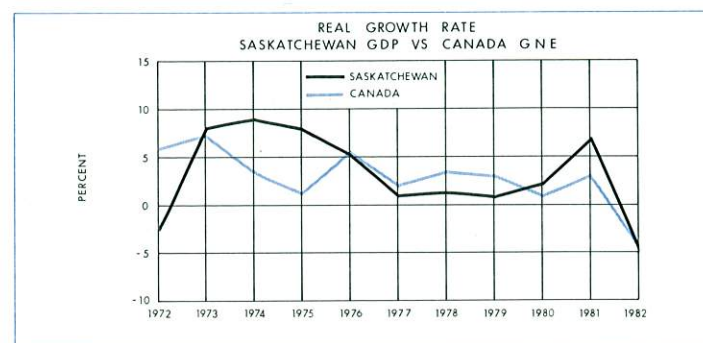
Last year, adverse external factors led to a drop in Saskatchewan's real Gross Domestic Product. During 1983, the increased level of activity in the resource sectors will spur economic growth and produce significant gains in employment.

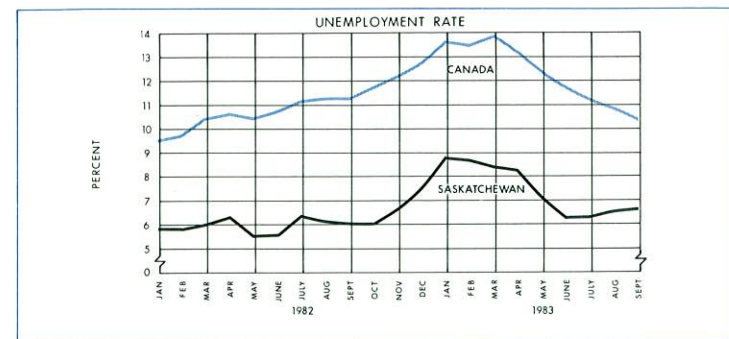
Saskatchewan has enjoyed above average crop production for three successive years. The harvest of the six major grains in 1983 will be slightly more than 20 million tonnes, down from the record 1982 crop of

22.4 million tonnes but well above the five-year average of 18.3 million tonnes. However, the 1983 harvest yielded a record quality wheat. More than half the wheat crop will grade No. 1 CWRS compared with only 25% in 1982.

Uncertainty over transportation policy and caution on the part of consumers will lead to reduced levels of new capital formation in the agriculture and service sectors in 1983. Major investment projects in the province include: the Phase II expansion at the Lanigan potash mine, the expansions at the Collins Bay and Cluff Lake uranium mines, the final stages of the Key Lake uranium mine and mill, the construction of the Nipawin hydro-generating station, and the rural gasification program.

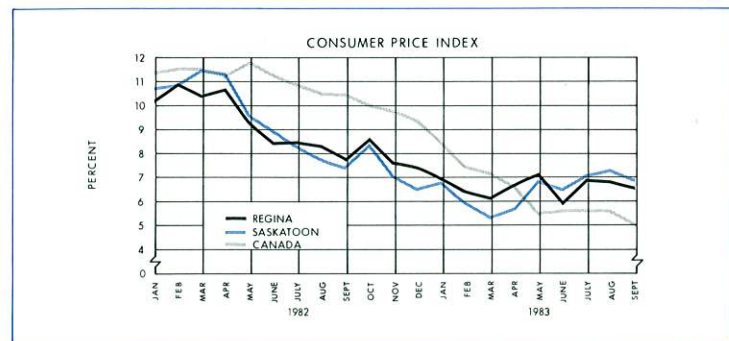
Over the first ten months of 1983, on average, the level of employment in the province has been 10,000 persons above that of the corresponding period in 1982. While the Canadian participation rate has registered a marginal increase, the Saskatchewan participation rate has increased significantly and is now above the national rate. As a result of significantly higher participation, labour force growth has exceeded the gains in employment and the Saskatchewan unemployment rate in 1983 has increased to slightly more than 7.0% from the 1982 average of 6.2%. By comparison, the Canadian unemployment rate has averaged 12.1% for the first ten months of 1983.





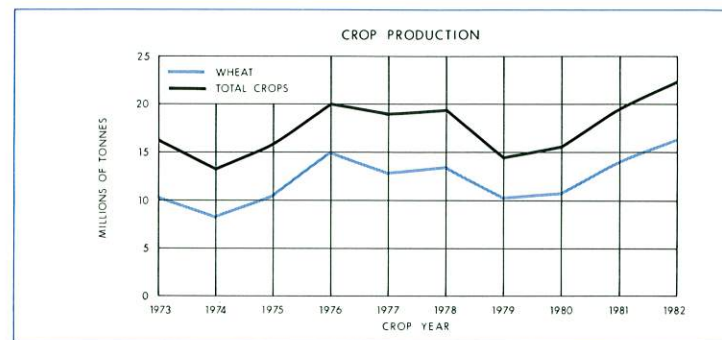
Employment has increased as a consequence of increased levels of output. New jobs have been created in agriculture, construction, mining, forestry and the service industries. Although manufacturing and trade have experienced declines in employment—the former due to high inventory and the latter due to weak consumer spending—overall employment growth for 1983 should be in the neighbourhood of 10,000 new jobs.

Inflation as measured by the Consumer Price Index has continued to trend downwards in Saskatchewan. Following increases in the C.P.I. of 9.0% for both Regina and Saskatoon in 1982, overall consumer price increases averaged less than 7.0% for the first ten months of this year. At the national level, inflation is expected to fall to less than 6.0% this year from 10.8% in 1982.



### Agriculture

Production of the six major grains and oilseeds in 1983 is estimated at 20.4 million tonnes, down from the record of 22.4 million tonnes in 1982 but greater than the five-year average of 18.3 million tonnes. The average grains and oilseed yields were near the five-year average and quality was exceptionally good. Deliveries of all grains to country elevators were 19.1 million tonnes in 1982/83 crop year compared to the previous crop year record of 15.9 million tonnes in 1977/78.



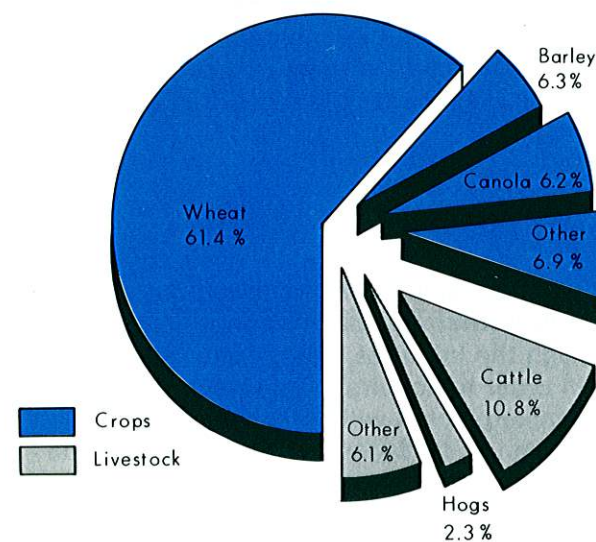
This year, Canadian exports of prairie grain and products will challenge the 1982/83 crop year record of 29.5 million tonnes. Exports of grain and products are at a level 26% above the previous year total.

Prices of grains and oilseeds were soft early in 1983, but they firmed with the high degree of farmer participation in the U.S. Government programs for acreage diversion. Oilseeds and feed grains gained as much as 50% in value during the year to date. Wheat has held steady even though the U.S. crop was near record. C.W.B. asking prices at Thunder Bay for No. 1 CW 13.5% protein wheat on November 9 was \$208.60 (Cdn)/tonne, up from \$199.60 (Cdn)/tonne in 1982.

Producer marketings of hogs were up 1% in the first ten months of 1983 compared with the same period a year ago. Prices for index 100 hogs, however, decreased to \$56.75/cwt. from \$74.70/cwt. Net provincial stabilization payments for both hogs and beef cattle are estimated at \$18 million.

As of July 1, 1983, the cattle population decreased 3% to 2.3 million head. Slaughter marketings for January/September were down 7% and feeder marketings were off 11%.

Farm cash receipts for January/September totalled \$3.0 billion, about 4% lower than in the same period in 1982. Total cash receipts for the year, however, are expected to near the 1982 level of \$4.0 billion. Operating and depreciation charges are expected to increase marginally to \$3.0 billion. As a result, net realized farm income is expected to stay near the 1982 level.

### Mining

Resource extraction and sales have increased markedly during 1983. In response to the new federal-provincial energy agreement and provincial incentives, oil production is at virtual full capacity. Potash sales have rebounded with the turn-around in world markets and uranium sales have exhibited a significant increase with the initiation of production at the Key Lake mine.

The Saskatchewan potash industry has been encouraged by recent developments. The drop in the 1983 U.S. corn crop and the anticipated significant increase in seeded acres next spring, new financing arrangements with Brazil, the renewal of a major contract with Japan, and negotiations with China all suggest a resurgence in the potash market. It is expected that shipments of K<sub>2</sub>O equivalent will increase by over 20.0% in 1983 to 6.2 million tonnes. The \$500 million expansion at the Lanigan mine is continuing and when completed in late 1986 will add over 1 million tonnes of capacity.

Activity in the uranium industry has picked up with the initiation of production at the Key Lake mine. Sales of U<sub>3</sub>O<sub>8</sub> are anticipated to increase by almost 19.0% to 3.3 million kg. The development of Collins Bay 'B' Zone to replace the depleting orebody at Rabbit Lake and the Cluff Lake Phase II expansion will add 3.4 million kg of capacity when fully operational by 1986.

In August of this year, the governments of Saskatchewan and Canada successfully completed negotiations relating to energy pricing and taxation. The major highlights of the amended agreement include:

- no rollback of the wellhead price for conventional old oil from its current reference level of \$29.75 per barrel;
- the New Oil Reference Price (i.e. the world price) is extended to all oil previously described as Special Old Oil; this includes all oil discovered between 1974 and 1980 and all Conventional Old Oil reclassified as Special Old Oil on July 1, 1982 for royalty/tax purposes (e.g. significant amounts of heavy oil production and production from wells extracting less than 10 barrels per day); and
- the New Oil Reference Price will apply to any additional production from new or expanded waterflood projects commencing operations after June 30, 1983.

These extensions of the New Oil Reference Price mean that about 50% of Saskatchewan's production is now receiving the world price.

The amendments to energy pricing and taxation in combination with the Energy Recovery Program initiated by the government of Saskatchewan in July 1982, and the extension of one year royalty/tax holiday for development drilling to the end of 1985, have had a significant impact on the sustained recovery of the province's oil industry. In the first eleven months of 1983 a record total of 1714 wells were drilled compared to 751 wells during the corresponding period in 1982, and 1801 licences were issued compared to 857 last year. The four sales of Crown petroleum and natural gas rights in 1983 netted the province a record \$108 million in revenue. The four sales in 1982 brought in only \$34 million. The land sale results and drilling and licencing statistics indicate that the current high level of activity in the province's oil fields will be sustained. This, in turn, has augmented the resurgence of the province's oil service and supply business. Moreover, in 1983 Saskatchewan recorded a real net addition to the province's proven reserves for the first time in 15 years.

## Manufacturing

The value of manufacturing shipments in the first eight months of 1983 rose marginally (1.2%) compared to the same period last year. Two recent Statistics Canada surveys indicate that the recovery is well under way. The latest survey of capital and repair spending intentions showed that manufacturers in Saskatchewan planned to invest 1.7% more in 1983 than in 1982. In contrast, the comparable figures for the Prairies and Canada were -21% and -13.9% respectively. Meanwhile, a recent survey of Saskatchewan manufacturers demonstrated that more than 80% expected to see about the same or higher production through the end of 1983. The same survey a year earlier showed only 42% were as optimistic.

A notable development in the province's manufacturing sector was the announcement of intentions to build a Heavy Oil Upgrader. The 50,000 barrel per day upgrader will be built in conjunction with the Consumer Co-operative Refinery in Regina and will represent a direct investment of approximately \$600 million. Construction of the upgrader will require more than 2,500 person years of employment with 80 permanent jobs created in the operation of the facility. The Upgrader will provide an assured market for Saskatchewan's crude stream, reaffirm the viability of future exploration and development in the province and encourage the development of enhanced oil recovery which is crucial to the long term stability of Saskatchewan's oil industry. Heavy oil exploration and development is also of national strategic importance as it is the lowest cost unconventional oil supply source in Canada. Construction of the upgrader is expected to begin in 1984 with start-up in June 1987.

## Service Industries

Continued growth in personal income and a population increase to one million have contributed to the vibrancy of the service sectors. Indications to date suggest that personal expenditures on goods and services will further stimulate growth and employment in the service sector.

## Prospects for the 1980's

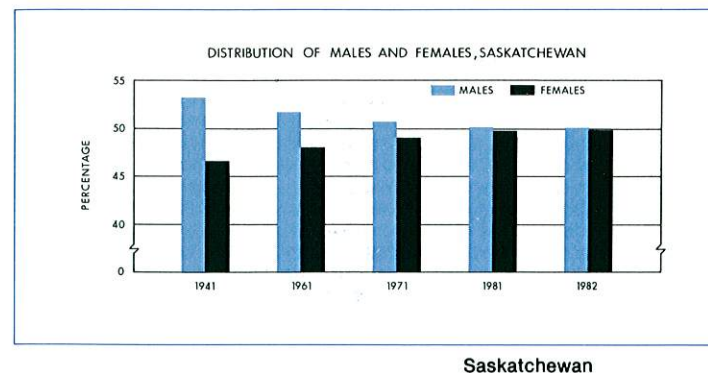
The major challenge facing Saskatchewan during the 1980's will be to further economic strength and diversity through the initiative, energy and industry of its citizens. In order to acquire greater receptiveness in the world marketplace it will be necessary to promote the province, its resources and products and the skills of its people. The sustained expansion of Saskatchewan's economic base through resource production, processing and associated manufacturing activities will further enhance the province's position as a leader in Canadian growth and competitiveness.

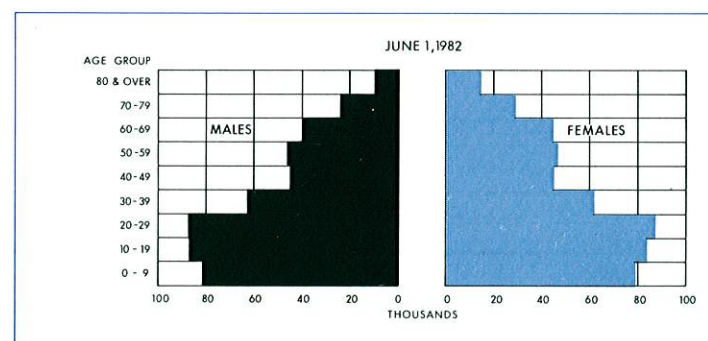
Table 1: Population, Canada, and Saskatchewan by Sex

Table 3: Population, Saskatchewan Distribution by Age Groups

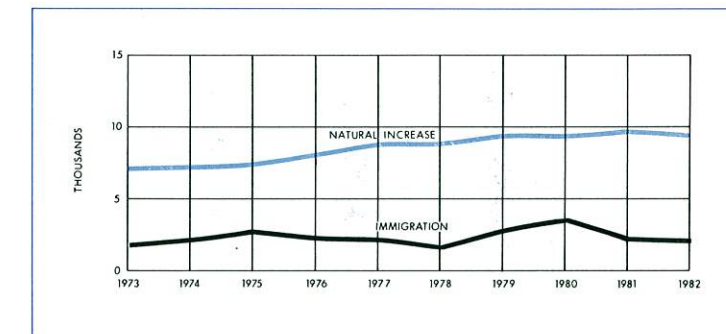

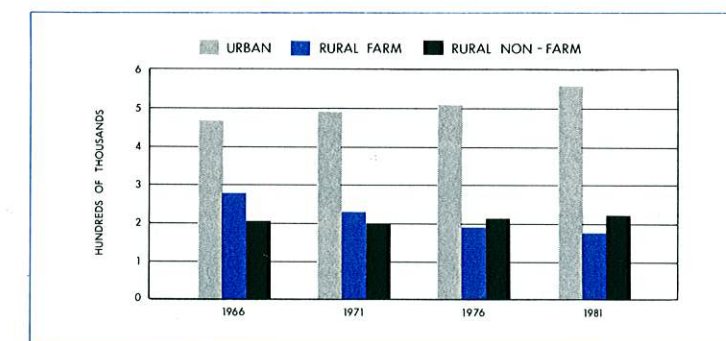

Table 4: Population, Saskatchewan Urban, Rural and Farm

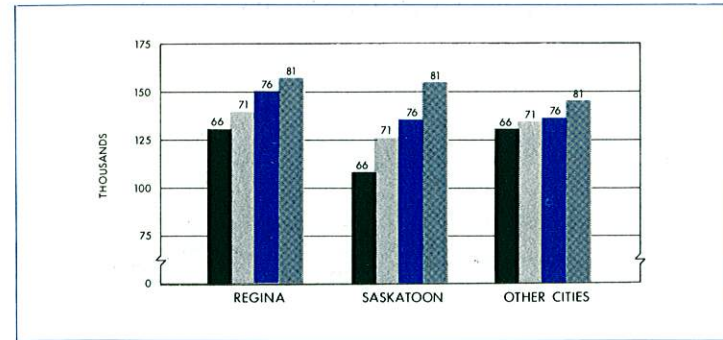

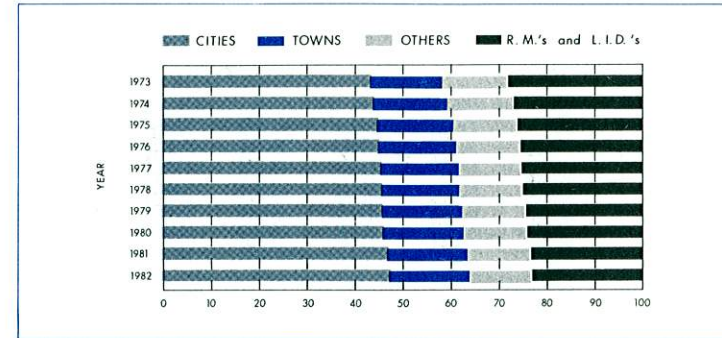

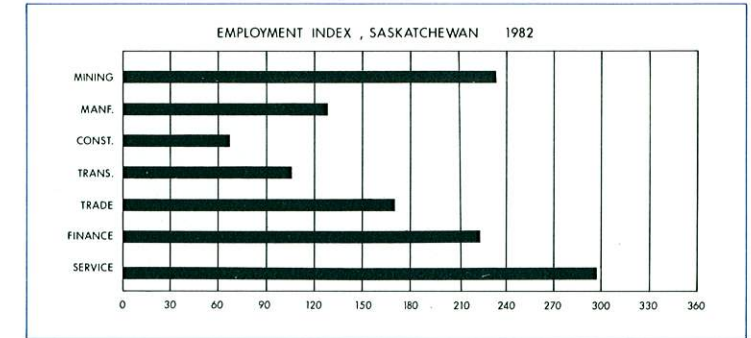

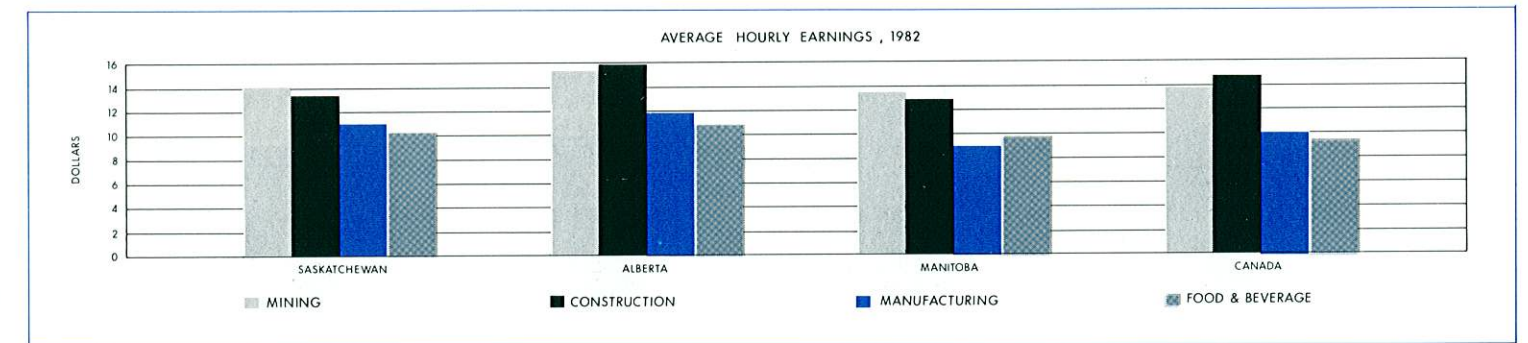

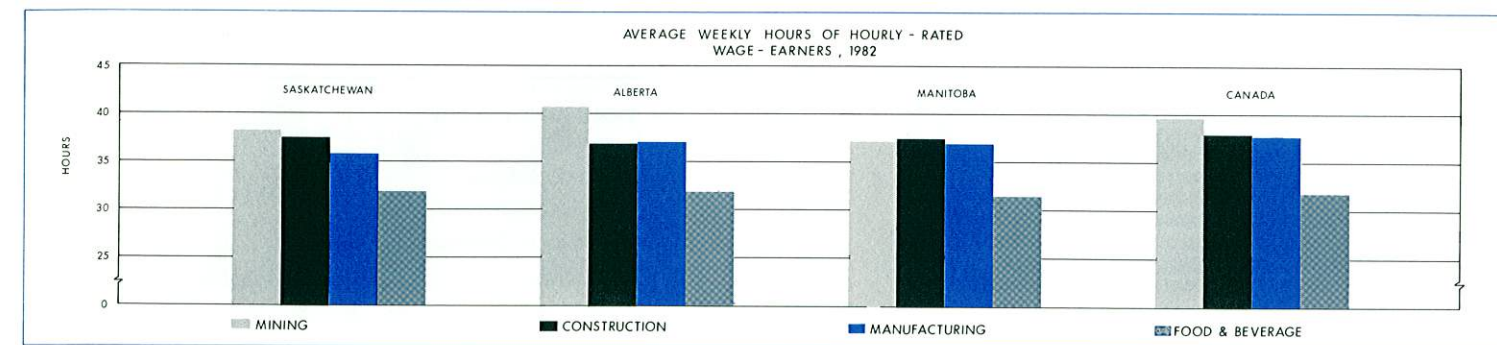

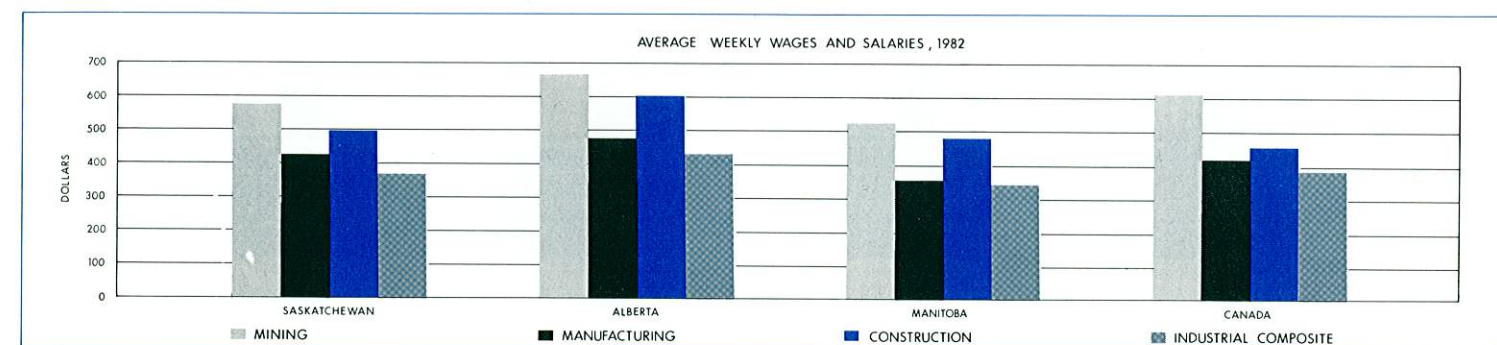

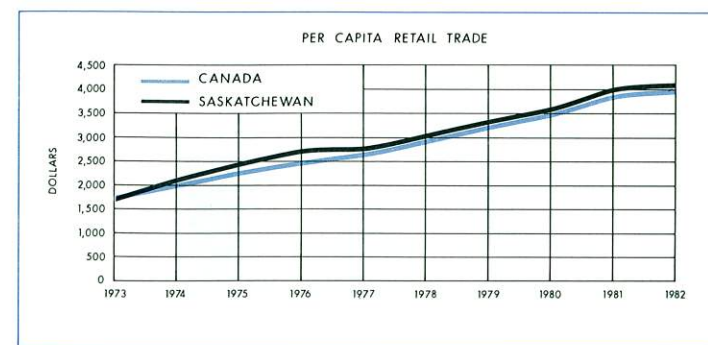

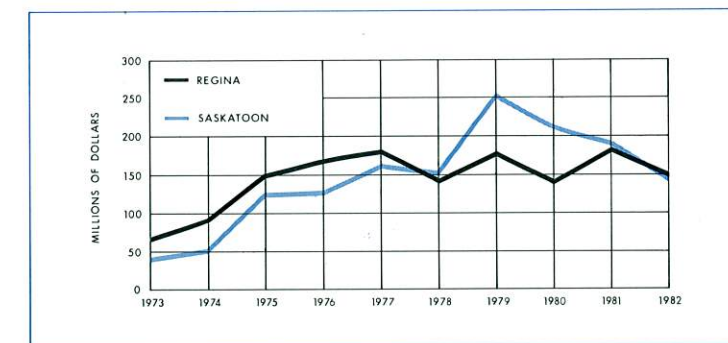

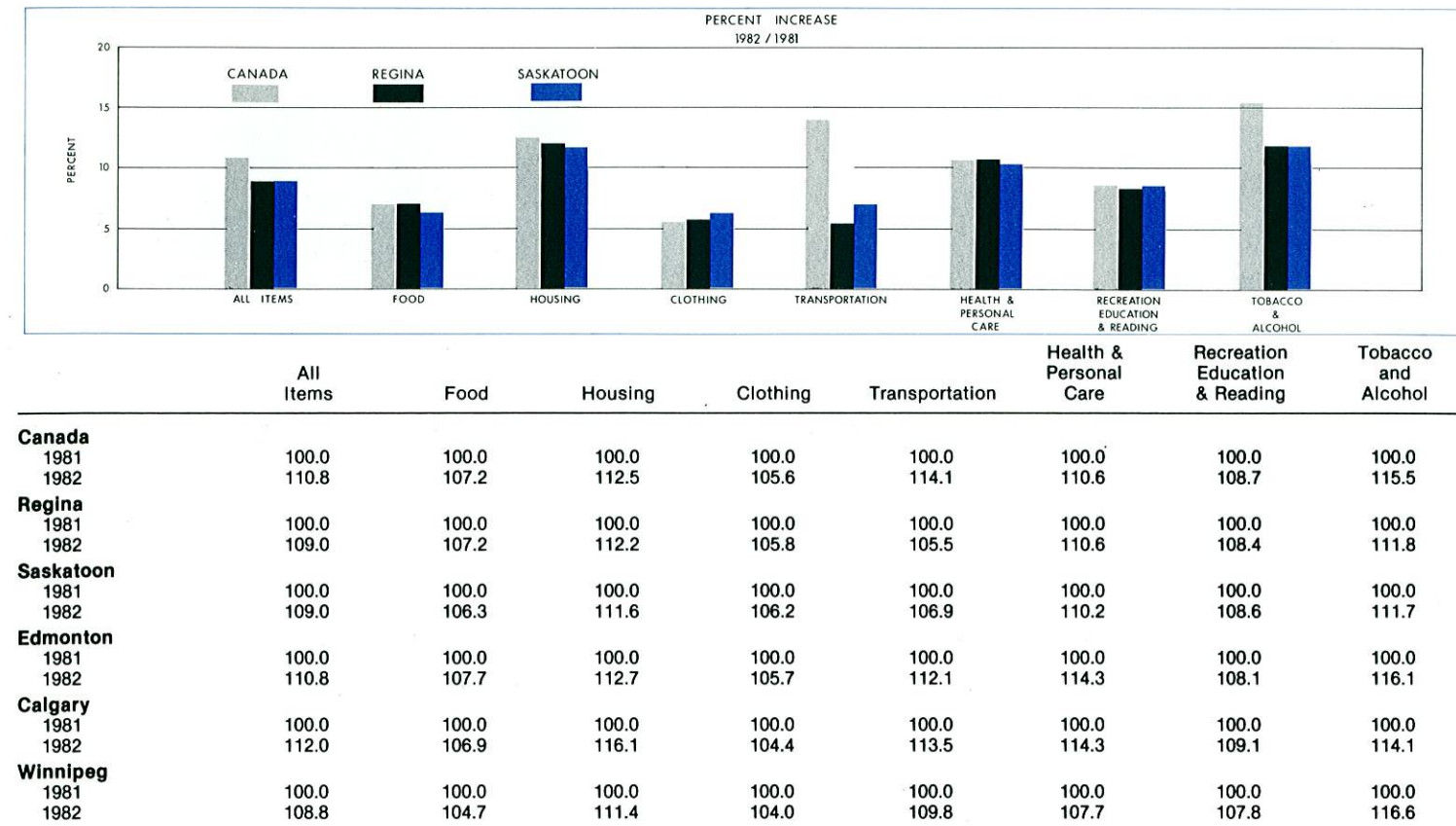

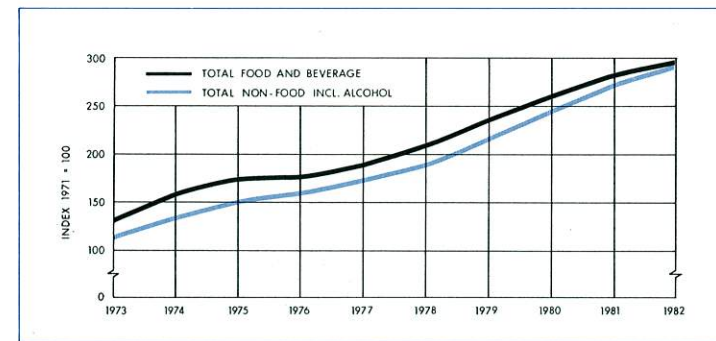

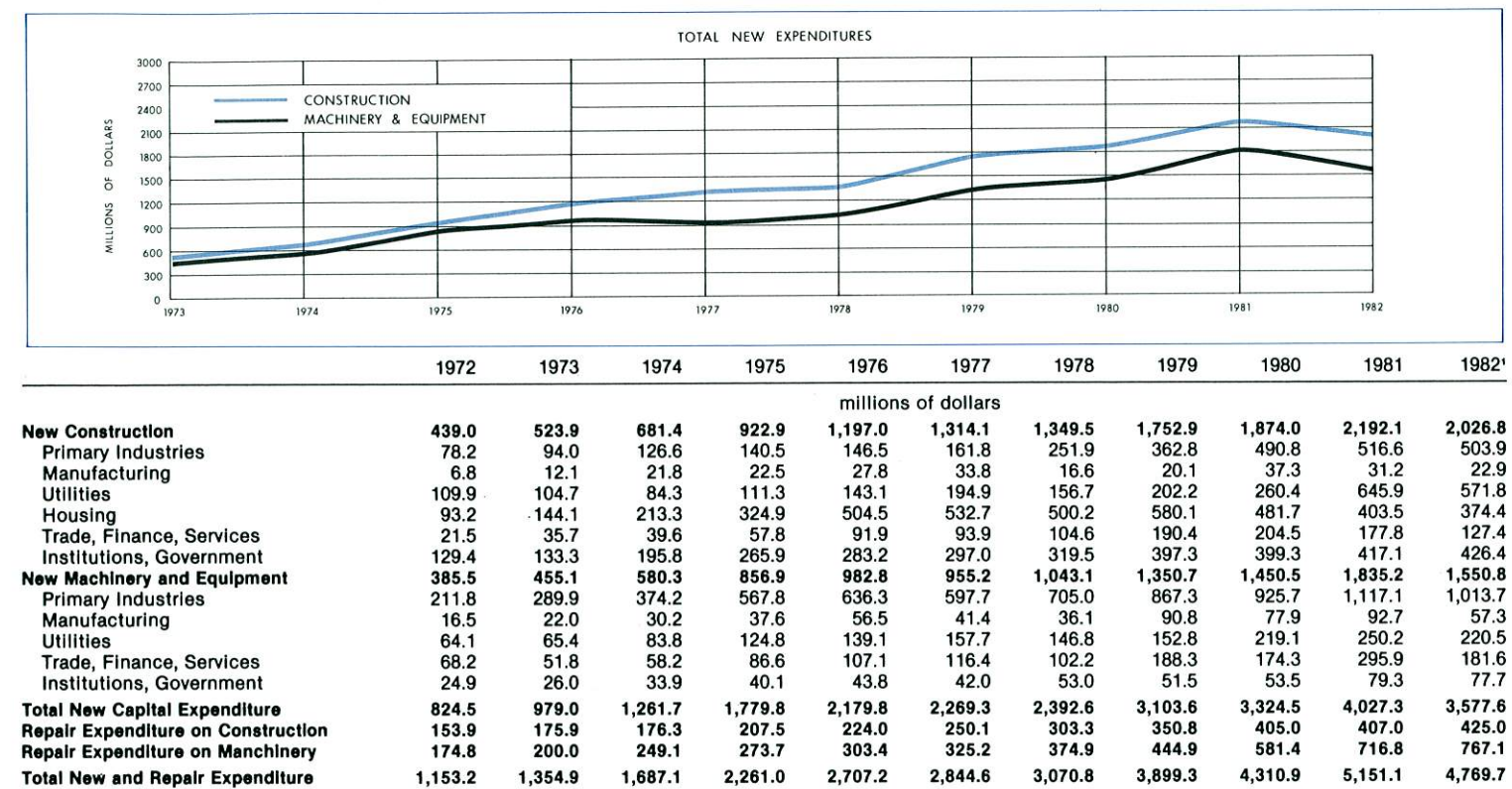

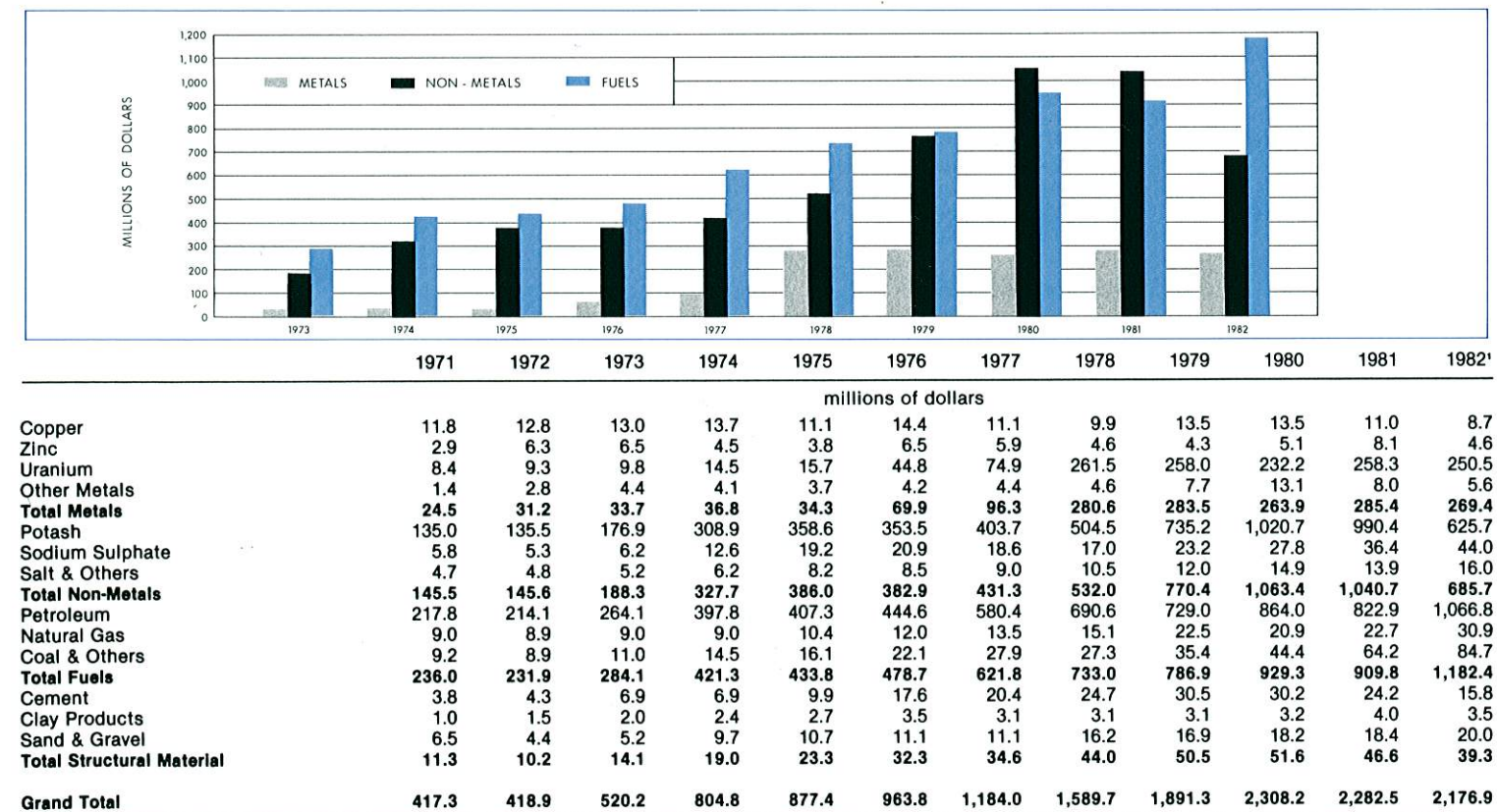

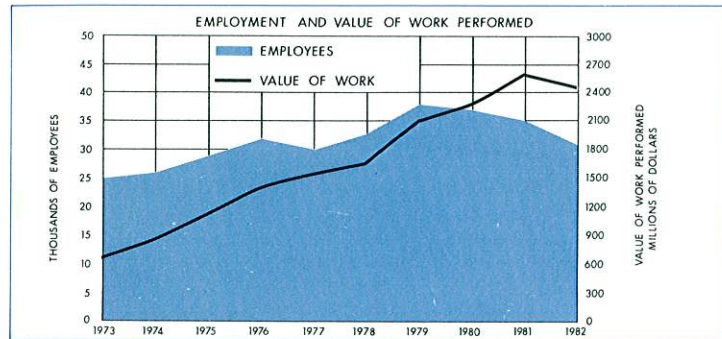
**Table 22: Value of Mineral Production by Kind, Saskatchewan**

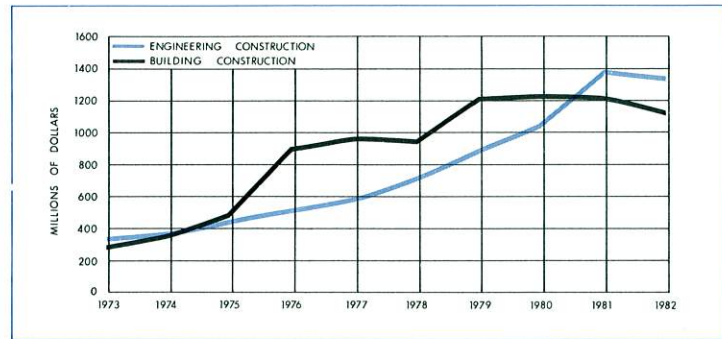

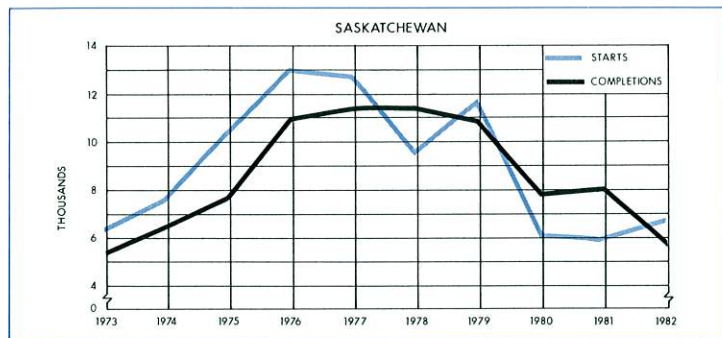

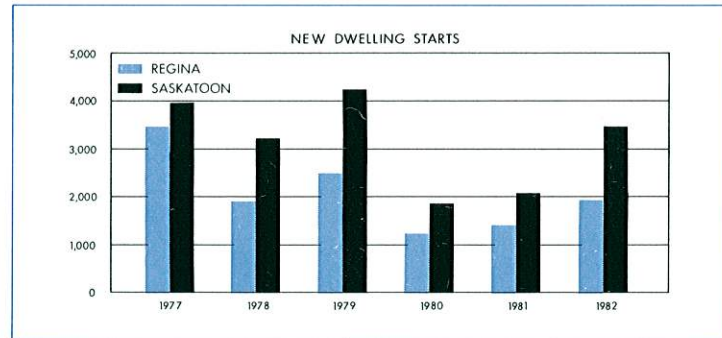

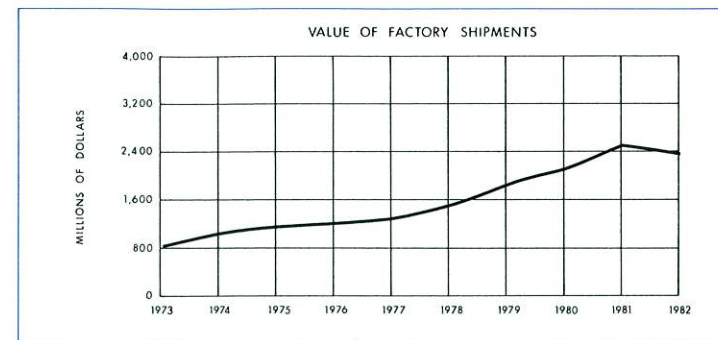
**Table 26: New Dwelling Units Started, by Type, Saskatchewan**

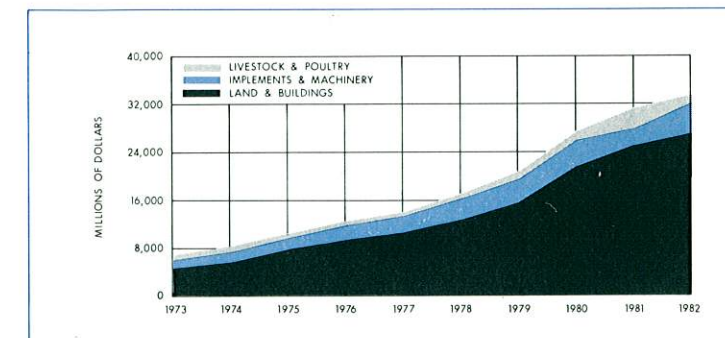

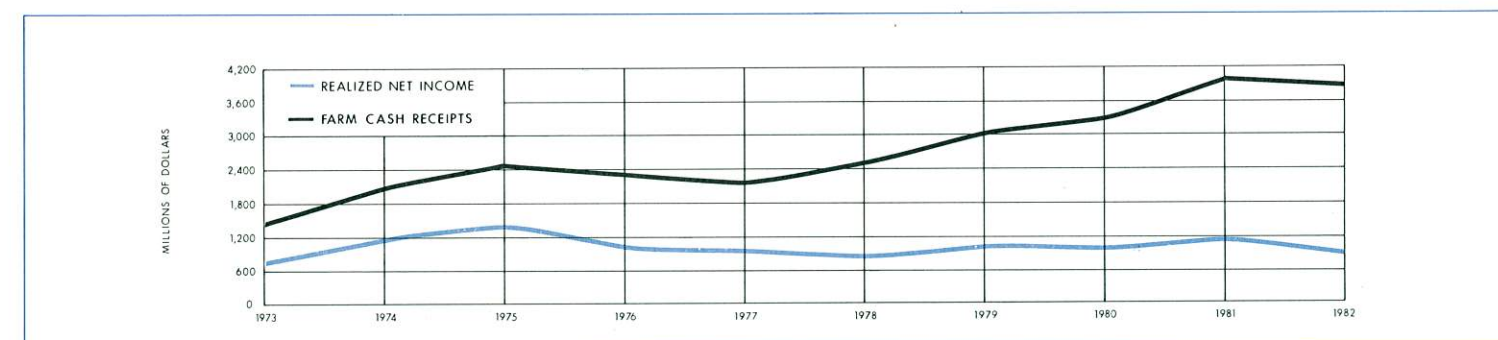

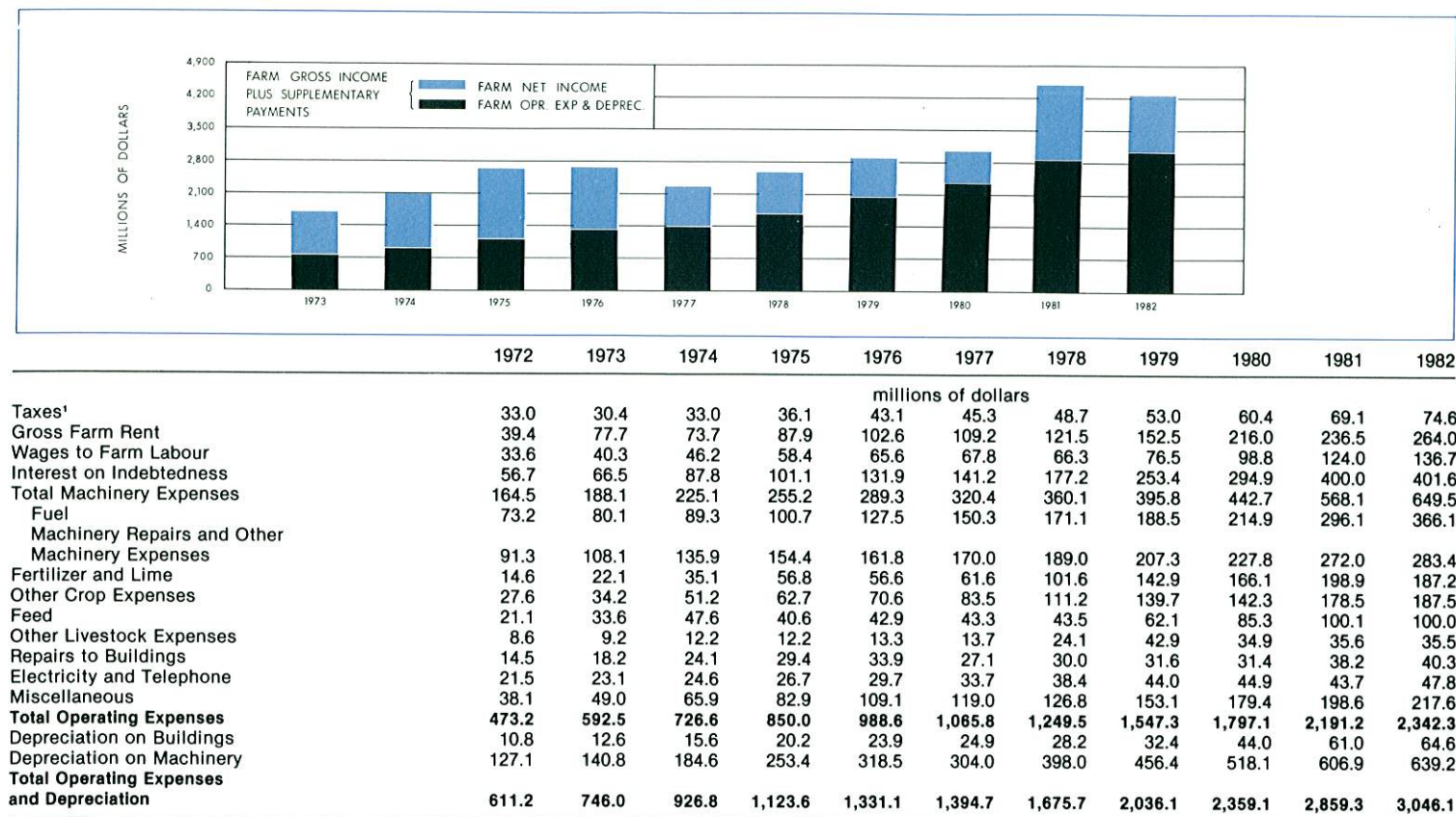

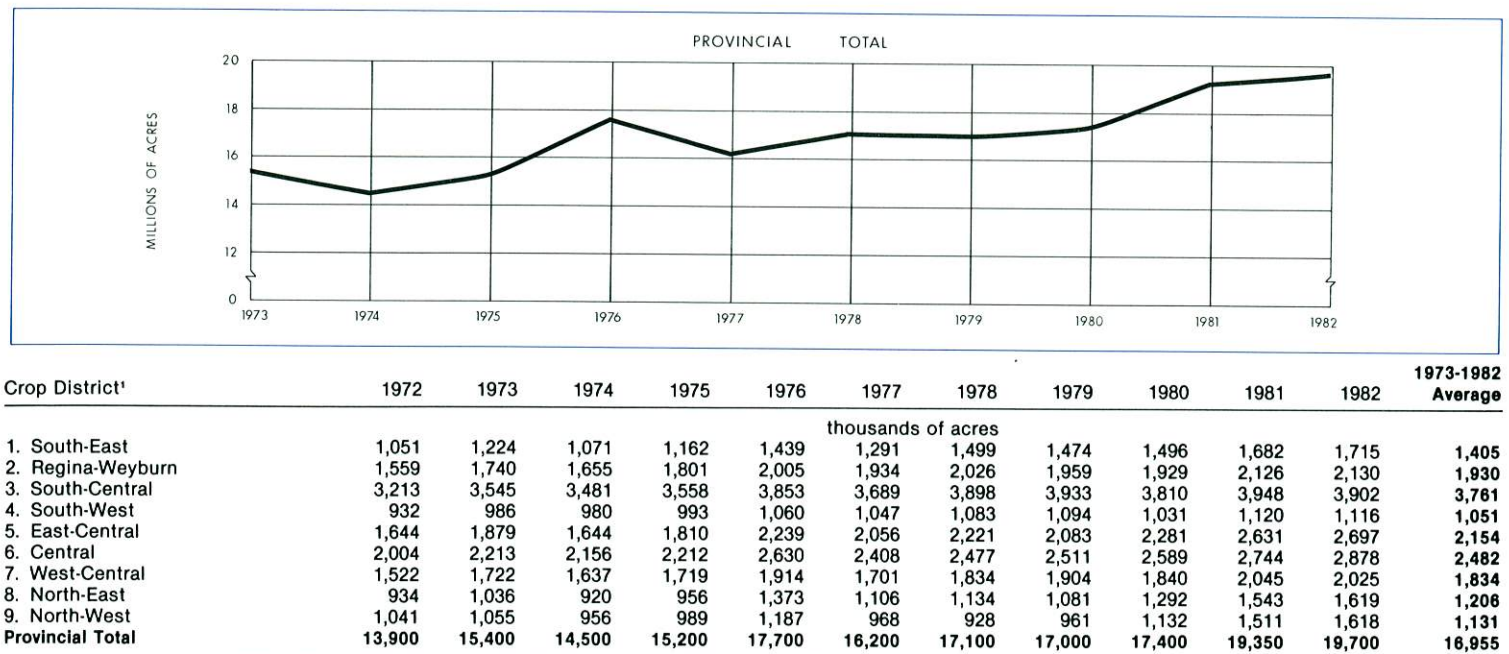

**Table 38: Farm Operating Expenses and Depreciation Charges, Saskatchewan**



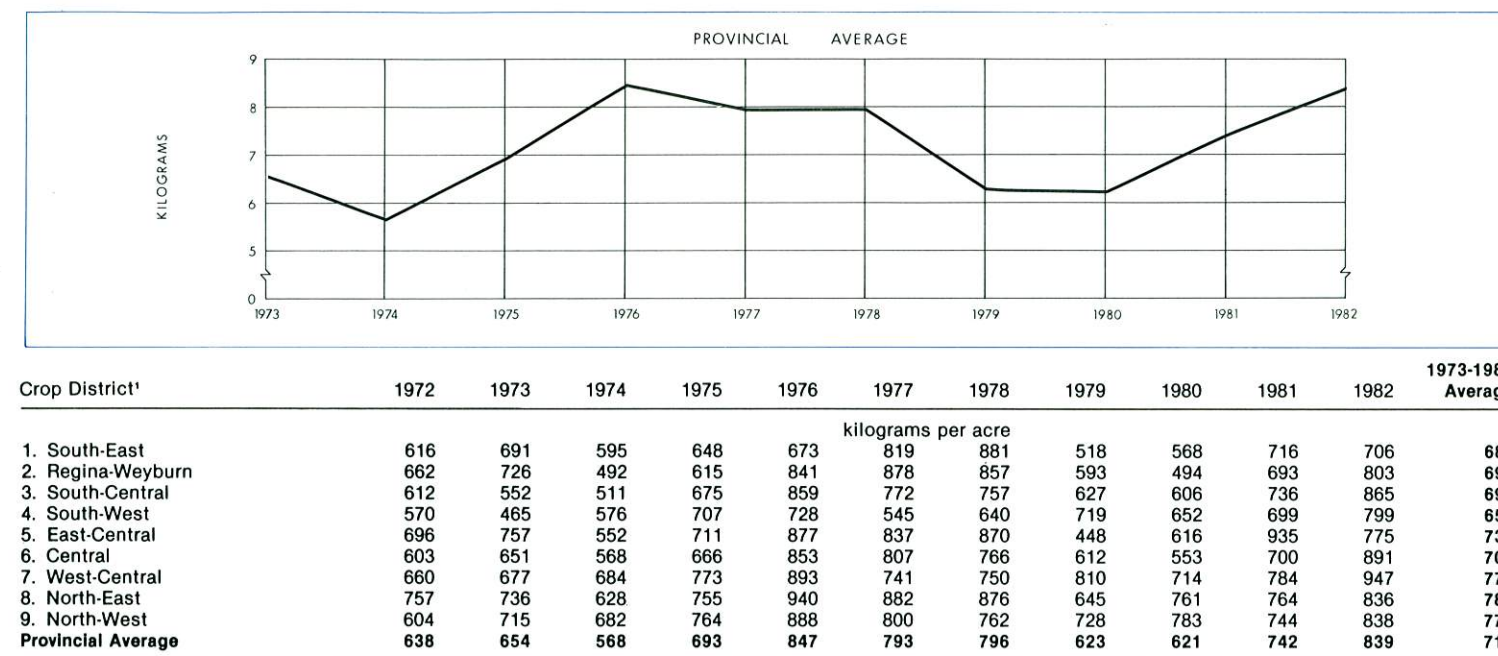

**Table 39: Acreage Sown to Wheat by Crop District, Saskatchewan**



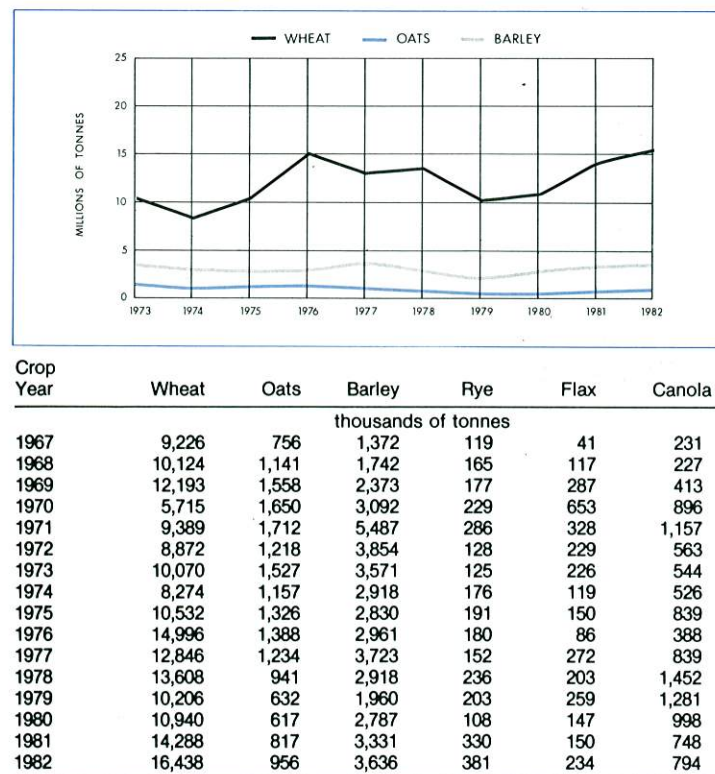

**Table 40: Average Wheat Yields by Crop District, Saskatchewan**



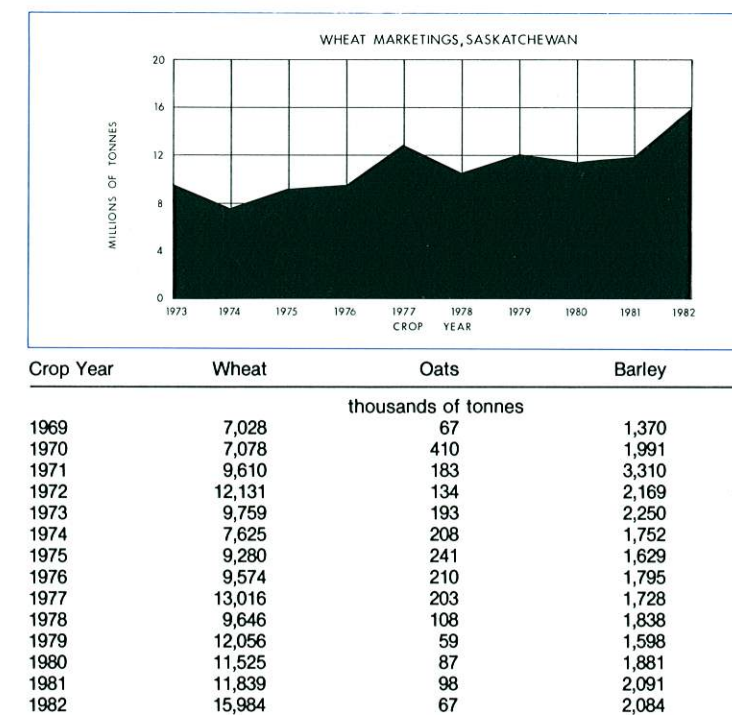

**Table 41: Production of Principal Field Crops, Saskatchewan**



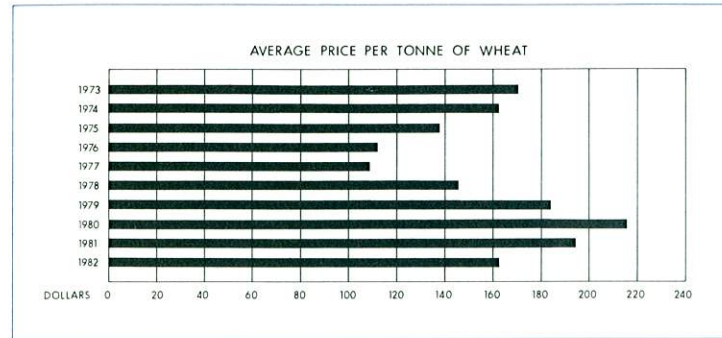

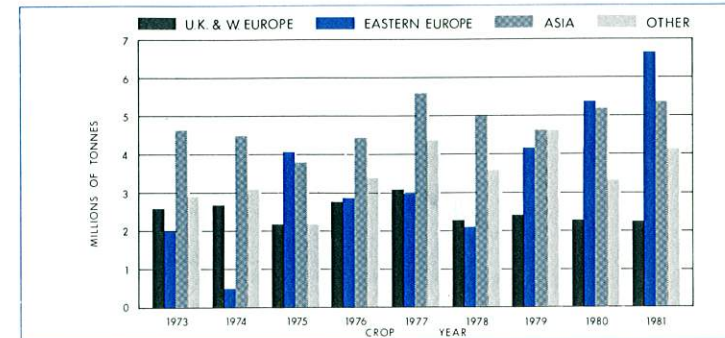

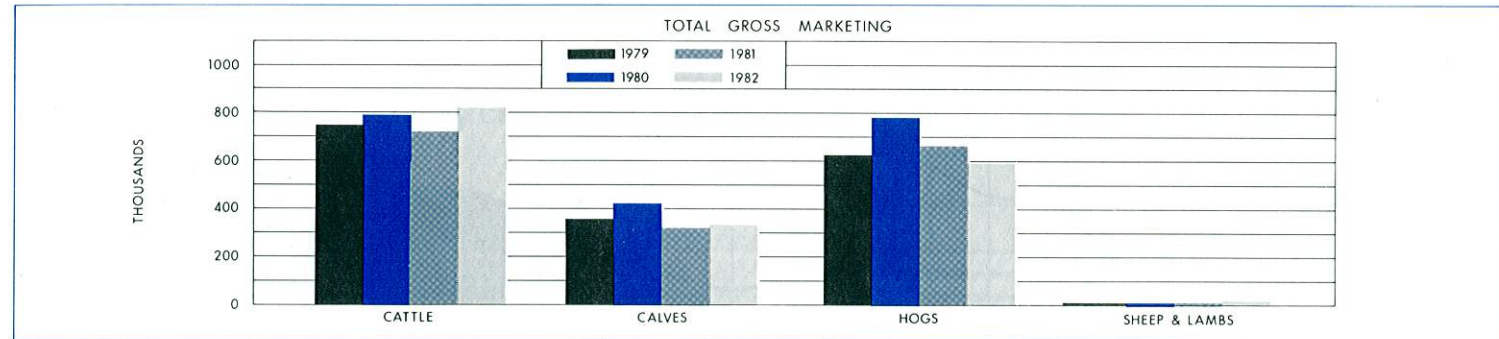

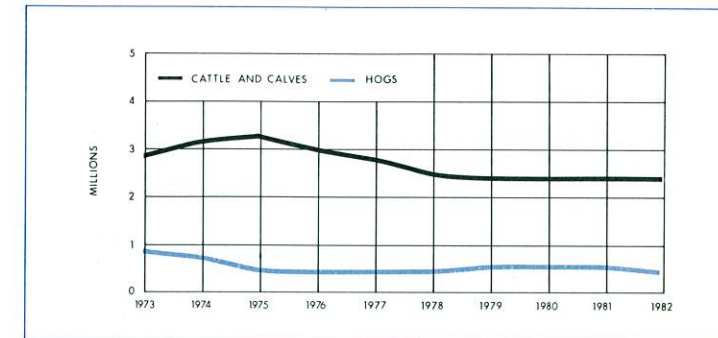

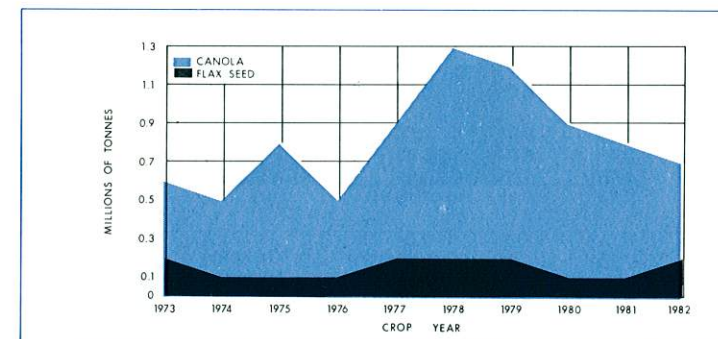

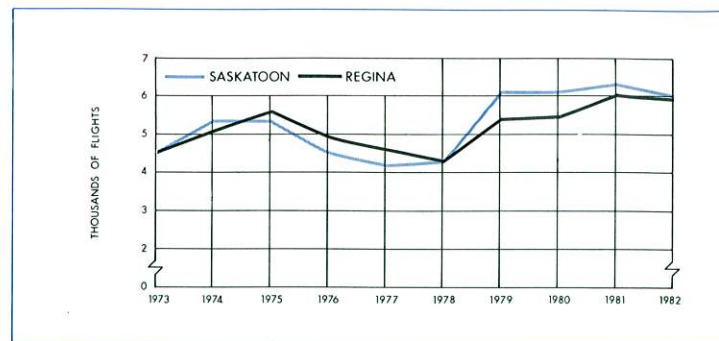

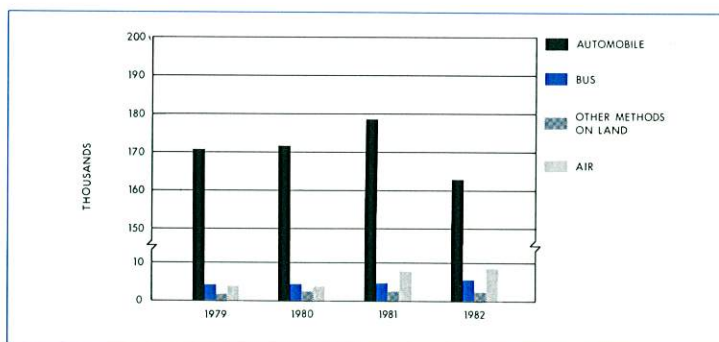

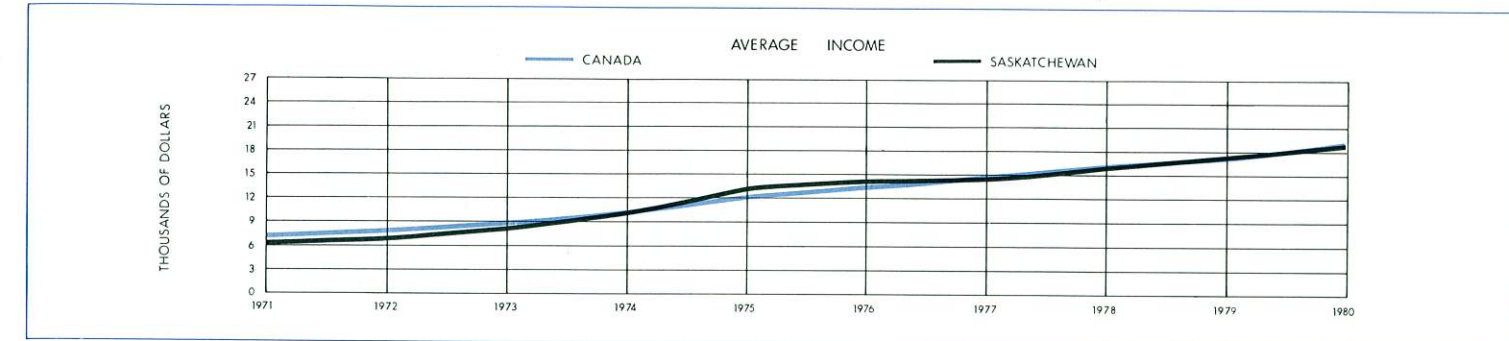

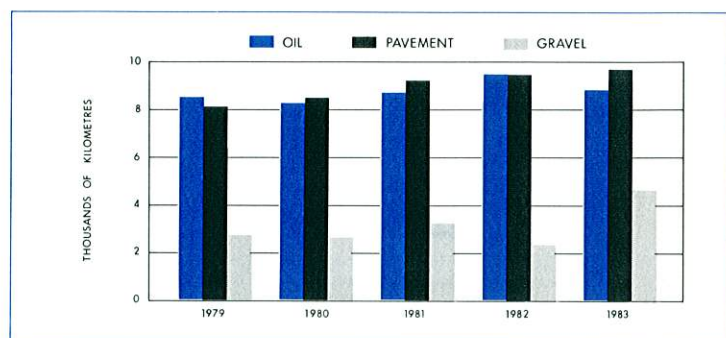

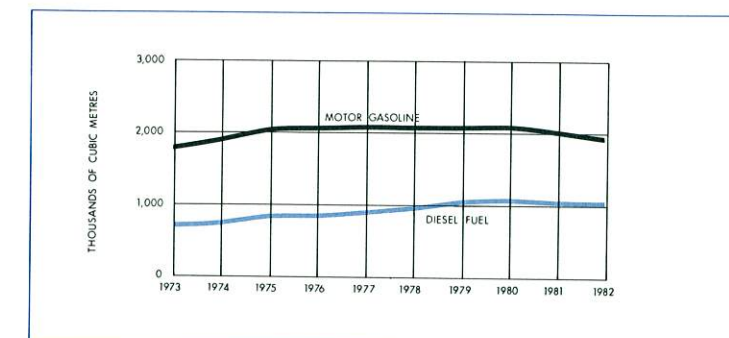

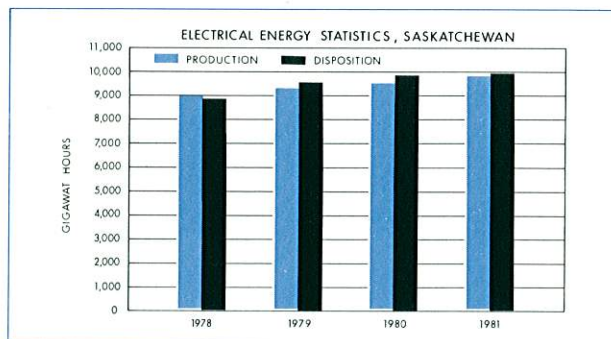

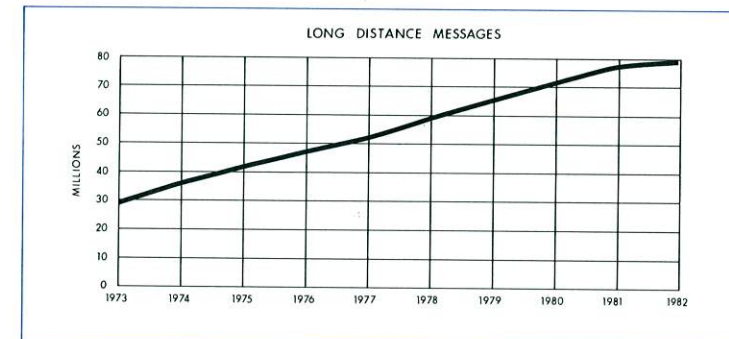

## Saskatchewan Economic Accounts

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has developed a set of economic accounts which can be used to trace the development and growth of the Saskatchewan economy.

The purpose of the Accounts is to measure the value of economic activity in each sector of the economy. This is done by means of a balancing set of accounts similar to the annual income and expenditure statements of a commercial enterprise.

The Accounts have many useful functions. They consolidate information which is now provided through a number of scattered sources and organize it into a central framework. This allows many kinds of economic analysis to be performed ranging from monitoring current economic performance to analysis of structural change in the economy.

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has available, upon request, many more detailed tables and other information concerning the Saskatchewan Economic Accounts.
