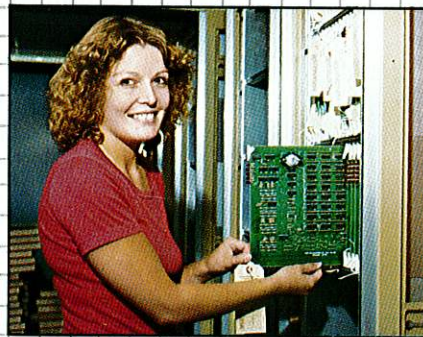

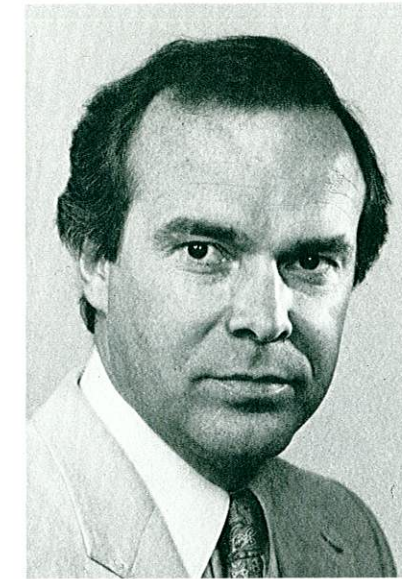

Foreword



The year 1982 marks a fundamental turning point in the economic life of Saskatchewan. The province begins a new era, with a new government committed to the economic betterment of all the citizens of this province.

Saskatchewan has been noted, in the past, for its high degree of government involvement in the economy. Yet Crown ownership or control offers no guarantees of success or security when our major economic sectors face world markets.

Potash production has declined by 30 per cent this year. Governments have had a major role in uranium mining, yet production is down almost 25 per cent. Similarly, while Saskatchewan farmers harvested a record grain crop of almost 23 million tonnes, low prices and increased expenses will reduce net farm income by 30 per cent compared to 1981.

I have no doubt that undue reliance on government has hampered the province's growth by reducing private investment. In 1981, for example, 35 per cent of total investment in Saskatchewan was publicly funded. The proportion in Canada as a whole was 26 per cent; in Alberta it was only 19 per cent. With just over twice our population, Alberta had almost five times Saskatchewan's amount of private investment.

We have begun the process of restoring the role of the private sector in our economic life. Consumer incomes — and consumer choice — have been enhanced through the mortgage assistance program and elimination of the gasoline tax. Saskatchewan's oil production has returned to full capacity, and exploration is up sharply since a reasonable tax and royalty regime was implemented in July.

Saskatchewan may enjoy negligible real growth in 1982, but the record is favourable compared to the four per cent decline in output which plagues Canada as a whole. Also the underlying strength of the Saskatchewan economy, the reduction in the inflation rate and declining interest rates point to a resurgence in economic growth. This together with the programs and policies we have implemented since April 26th and other programs to be introduced, give every reason to expect Saskatchewan will continue to outperform the rest of Canada.

Saskatchewan continues to depend heavily on international markets for our primary products. This was the case ten years ago and it remains true today. We cannot hide from the world marketplace, but we can meet it head-on with a greater variety of competitive goods and services. I am totally committed to long-term economic development and diversification to enhance the stability of the economy and provide greater job opportunities — particularly for our young people. We are first class and world class competitors in many areas and we will be first class in many more.

This province has enormous wealth in its resources and — much more important — its intelligent and hard-working people. Financial experts forecast this province will be number one in economic growth in this decade and beyond. The government of Saskatchewan with the support of all the people, intends to make this dream a reality. There is so much more we can be.

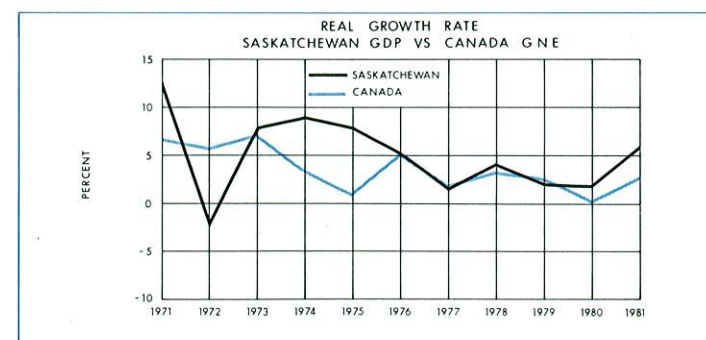

1982 in Review

Growth in Output and Employment

The performance of the Saskatchewan economy continues to surpass that of the Canadian economy. The widespread weakness in the non-agricultural sectors brought on by adverse external influences will be more or less offset by record crop production.

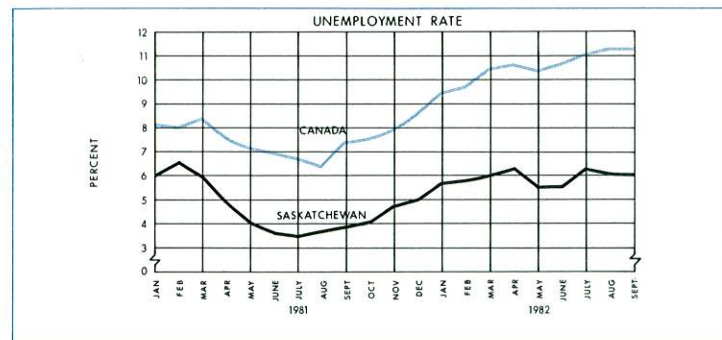
Saskatchewan's real Gross Domestic Product (in constant 1971 dollars) advanced by 6.0 per cent in 1981. With declines in resource sector outputs, the economy will register negligible growth in 1982 from the record level of real output in the previous year. By comparison, real output in the Canadian economy advanced by 3.1 per cent in 1981 and is expected to decline by more than 4.0 per cent this year.



For two successive years, Saskatchewan has enjoyed above average crop production. The harvest of the six major grains in 1982 will reach almost 23 million tonnes, up over 3.0 million tonnes from 19.7 million tonnes in 1981.

Investment in Saskatchewan this year has been adversely affected by external forces (continuing tight monetary policy, cumbersome Foreign Investment Review Agency regulations and adverse provisions of the National Energy Program). Major ongoing investment projects include: the development of a new uranium mine and mill at Key Lake, the phase II expansion at the Lanigan potash mine, the installation of a second 300 megawatt generating unit by the Saskatchewan Power Corporation at the plant near Coronach and the construction of the Nipawin hydro-electric generating station.

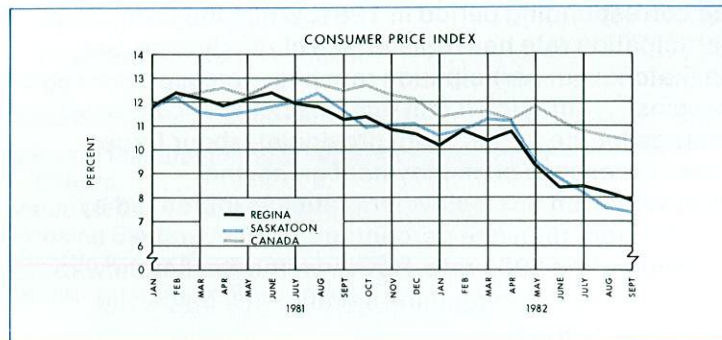
Over the first nine months of 1982, on average, the level of employment has been marginally above (0.2%) that of the corresponding period in 1981. While the Canadian participation rate has registered a slight decline, the Saskatchewan participation rate has increased marginally, although it still remains below the national average for the period. With provincial labour force growth in excess of employment gains, the Saskatchewan unemployment rate has increased by slightly more than one percentage point over the corresponding 1981 rate. However, the Saskatchewan unemployment rate remains significantly below the Canadian average.



Declines in employment have been experienced by the goods-producing industries (mining, forestry and manufacturing) as a result of reduced external demand. The levels of employment in the finance, insurance and real estate and the construction industries has fallen relative to the corresponding period last year as a consequence of continuing high interest rates. Overall, there will be little or no employment growth this year as the increase in employment in the service industries will likely just offset the fall in the goods-producing industries.

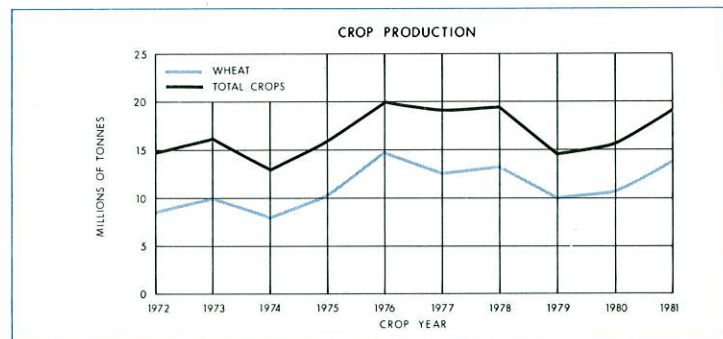
Inflation as measured by the Consumer Price Index has moderated significantly in Saskatchewan. Following increases of 11.7 per cent in the C.P.I.'s for both Regina and Saskatoon in 1981 overall consumer price increases have been reduced markedly following the removal of the provincial gasoline tax in May of this year. Indications to date suggest that consumer prices for Canada as a whole will increase by about 11.0 per cent this year (compared to 12.5 per cent in 1981) while in Saskatchewan, the average rate of increase in consumer prices is expected to be less than 9.0 per cent.

The major sources of consumer price inflation in the province are the costs of housing (the C.P.I. fails to capture the effects of the Mortgage Interest Reduction Program which would reduce the increase in the all-items index by 1.6 percentage points) and luxury items such as tobacco and alcohol.



Agriculture

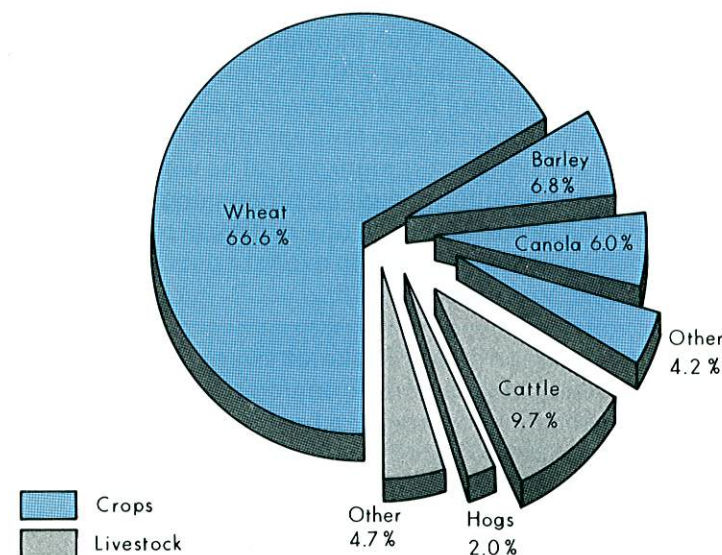
The agriculture industry has experienced two consecutive years of excellent yields and marketings. Grain production, including wheat, barley, oats, rye, canola and flax is expected to increase to 22.9 million tonnes, up from the 1981 level of 19.7 million tonnes and significantly above the previous record of 20 million tonnes set in 1976. Frost in late August has reduced the quality of this year's grain harvest. Currently, overall grain exports are running about 10 per cent ahead of last year's pace. Although the Canadian Wheat Board has not set an export target for this year, unofficial goals are in the range of 28.5 to 30 million tonnes. By July 31, 1982 on-farm stocks had jumped to 3.1 million tonnes, almost double the level in the previous year but still well below burdensome levels. Total shipments from Saskatchewan elevators amounted to 14.8 million tonnes in the crop year ending July 31, 1982. With the record level of crop production, shipments are expected to increase significantly this crop year.



As a result of record large U.S. grain crops, international grain prices are currently lower than for the comparable period last year. Prices may have been even lower, however U.S.S.R. crop expectations did not materialize and thus their grain purchases have helped to support prices. It is anticipated that prices are currently at a near bottom. The Canadian Wheat Board export asking price at Thunder Bay for No. 1 C.W. 13.5 per cent protein wheat has declined from over \$220 per tonne in January to \$193 per tonne in mid-October. With the exception of oilseed prices which are experiencing a prolonged weakening, other prices have levelled off and are expected to remain steady to year end.

For the first 9 months of 1982, hog production declined 12 per cent relative to the corresponding period in 1981; prices have been considerably higher than the previous year. The total cattle herd has decreased 4 per cent to 2.3 million head. Compared to the first eight months of 1981, slaughter cattle production in Saskatchewan has increased 38%.

In the first eight months of 1982, farm cash receipts total \$2.6 billion, down 9 per cent from the same period in 1981. Year end figures for 1982 are anticipated to show a 6 per cent decrease in farm cash receipts (\$3.8 billion in 1982 versus \$4.0 billion in 1981). Payments from various price and income stabilization programs are expected to account for almost \$500 million of total cash receipts.

Operation and depreciation charges are anticipated to surpass \$3.0 billion; up over 10 per cent from 1981. Interest costs continue to be the leading component of these charges accounting for almost \$500 million.

After allowing for these increased expenses and weak prices, net farm income in 1982 is forecast to decline 27 per cent to \$1.15 billion.

Mining

The Saskatchewan mining industry has been squeezed by the prolonged worldwide economic recession. The potash fertilizer industry has been adversely affected by the deterioration of international farm markets. Uranium production has dropped with the closure of the Beaverlodge site. The exception is the oil industry which has responded to a recovery program implemented by the Provincial Government on July 6 of this year.

The provincial potash industry has had to adjust to a depressed fertilizer market as a consequence of the deterioration of net farm income internationally. In the first nine months of 1982, production of K₂O equivalent declined over 30 per cent to 3.7 million tonnes from the same period last year. By year end, it is expected that production will be down over 20 per cent from the 1981 level of 7.2 million tonnes with the average price for the year off by 20 per cent from the previous year. Despite soft markets, the \$500 million expansion at the Lanigan mine is continuing and when completed in late 1984 will add over 1 million tonnes of capacity.

Uranium production in Saskatchewan is down almost 25 per cent from 1981 as a result of the closure of the Beaverlodge facilities at Uranium City by Eldorado Nuclear Limited and declining output from the Rabbit Lake mine as a consequence of depletion of the ore body. Notwithstanding the deterioration of productive capacity as well as an over-supply situation in world markets, the volume of provincial sales and average sales price have been insulated by long term contracts. With the completion of the Key Lake facilities in mid-1984, production capacity of the provincial uranium industry will more than double to over 20 million pounds of U₃O₈.

Saskatchewan's oil production has returned to full capacity following a five-point recovery program implemented in July. The plan includes: royalty holidays of one, three and five years for virtually all new wells, deep development wells and deep exploratory wells, respectively; royalty reductions of up to 30 per cent for "old" oil produced from wells drilled prior to 1974; royalty reductions for heavy oil; a reduction of the provincial share of oil price increases to 40 per cent from 50 per cent for wells drilled prior to 1981; and a specific royalty structure for enhanced oil recovery. Indicative of the renewed confidence in the provincial oil industry was the September sale of oil and gas exploration rights which netted the province \$8.2 million (compared to the pre-recovery-program June sale of \$4.1 million). In addition to the sharp increase in exploratory activity in recent months, preliminary estimates of the August-December sales represent the best totals the provincial oil industry has experienced in two years. This, in turn, will lead to a rebound in the oil service and supply business which has been suffering over the 18 month downturn in the oil industry. Several recent announcements of plans for coming years augment the optimistic attitude towards the economics of oil recovery in Saskatchewan.

Manufacturing

Some of the more notable manufacturing activities within Saskatchewan include the food and beverage industry, steel production, farm implements and high technology electronics. The value of shipments of manufactured goods has decreased by 2.9 per cent during the first seven months of 1982 relative to the corresponding period in 1981. Many producers have been forced to deal with soft demand, high inventories and excess capacity.

Service Industries

While the goods-producing industries are experiencing a period of declining employment, expansion of the service industries has generated new employment during 1982. Growth in personal income and an increasing population have contributed to the vibrancy of the service sectors. In the first six months of 1982, the value of retail trade was 6.3 per cent above the comparable 1981 level. Overall, personal expenditures on goods and services are expected to increase by over 10 per cent this year providing further stimulus to the service sector.

Prospects for the 1980's

The 1980's will be a period of continued expansion of the province's economic base through increased resource production coupled with key opportunities for further diversification of Saskatchewan's economy. Growing market opportunities for Saskatchewan exports of grain, potash, uranium and oil as well as significant opportunities to expand processing and manufacturing associated with raw materials produced in the province provide reason to expect continuing economic and population growth.

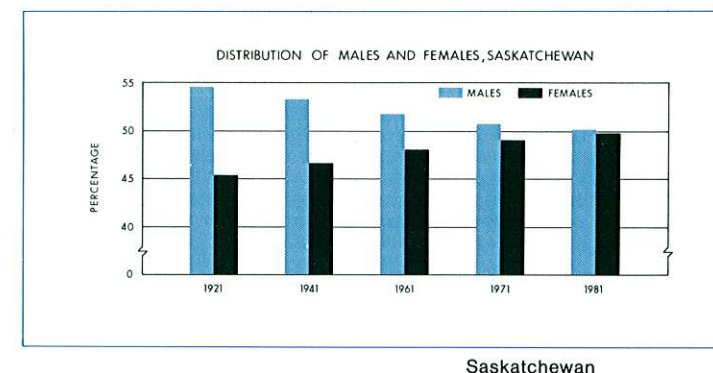
The major challenge facing Saskatchewan during this period will be to obtain a greater degree of secondary benefit from the development of a broader range of goods and services required for its primary and secondary industries and consumer demand. Continued economic growth and diversification together with comprehensive agricultural development programs will help to further mitigate the economic cycles which characterized Saskatchewan's economy in the past.

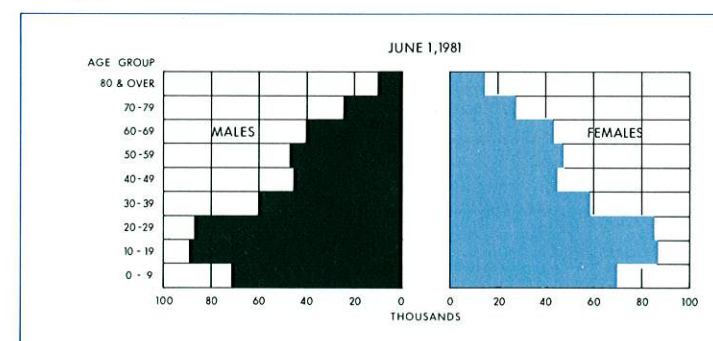
Table 1: Population, Canada, and Saskatchewan by Sex

Table 3: Population, Saskatchewan Distribution by Age Groups

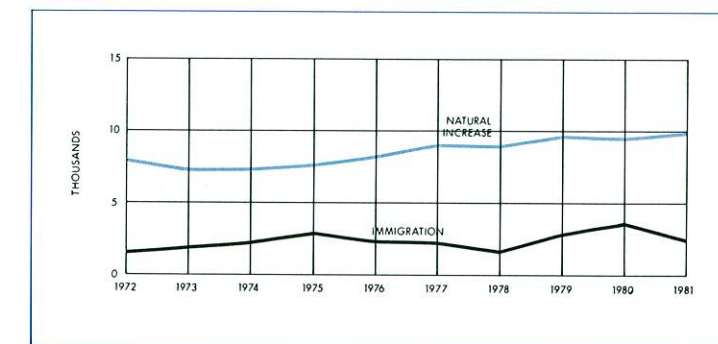

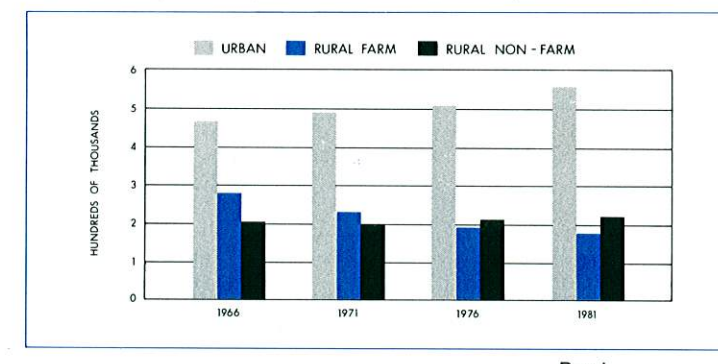

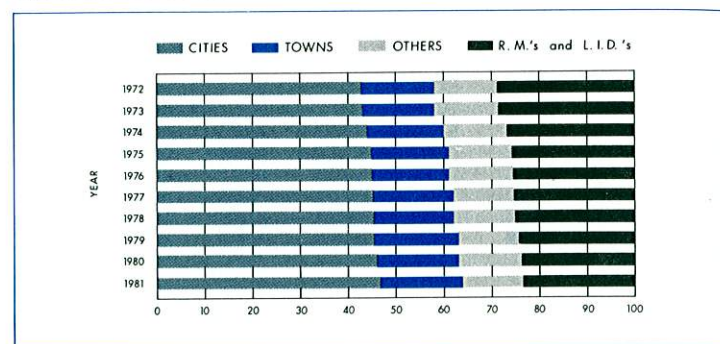

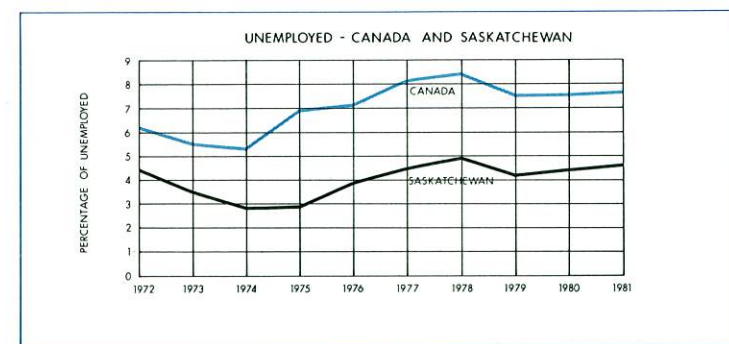

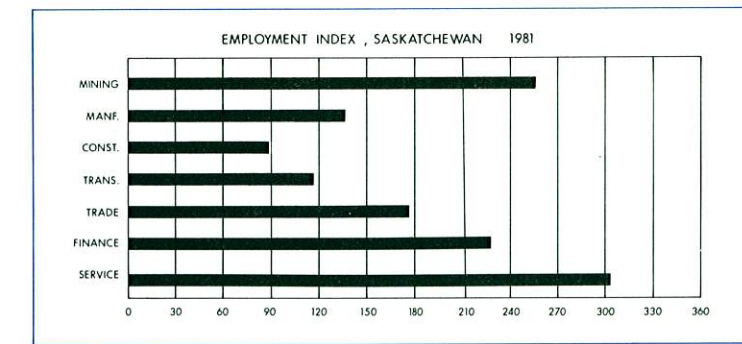

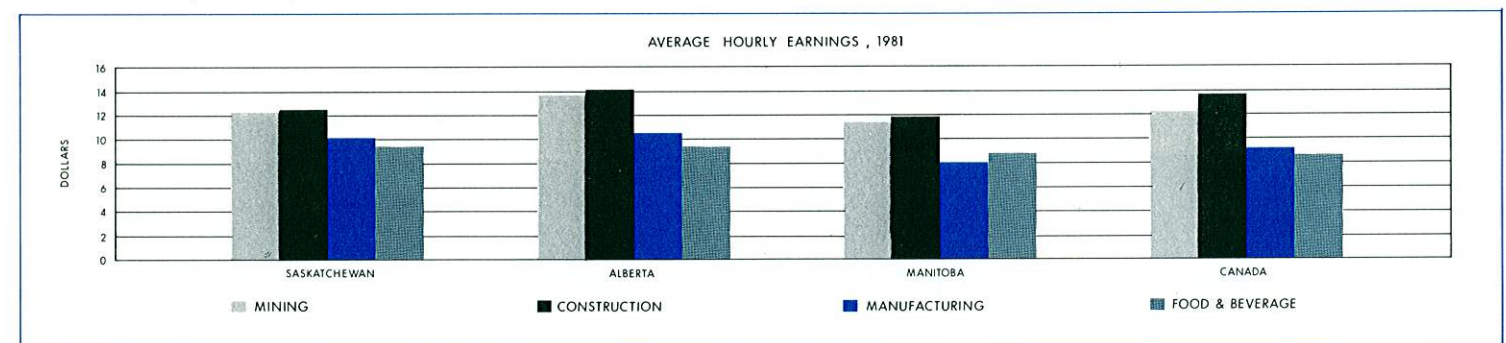

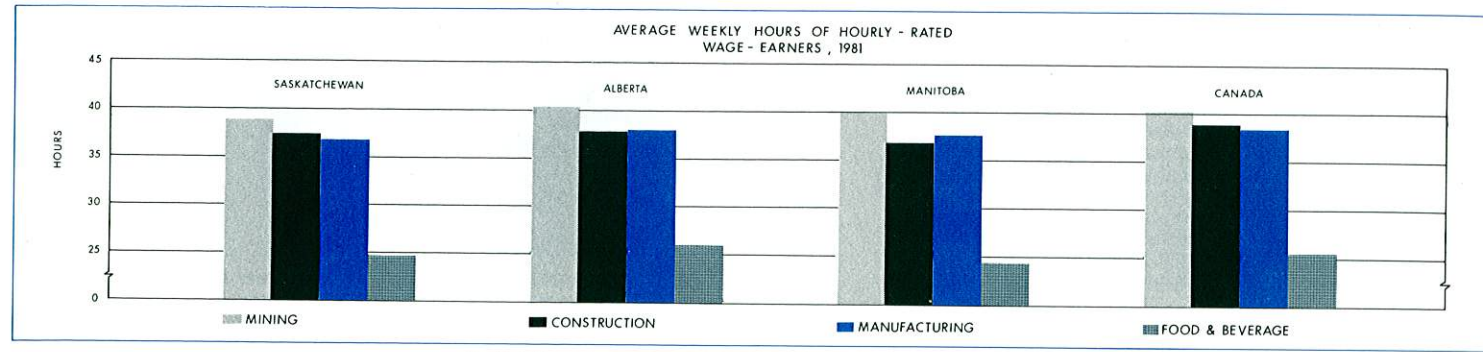

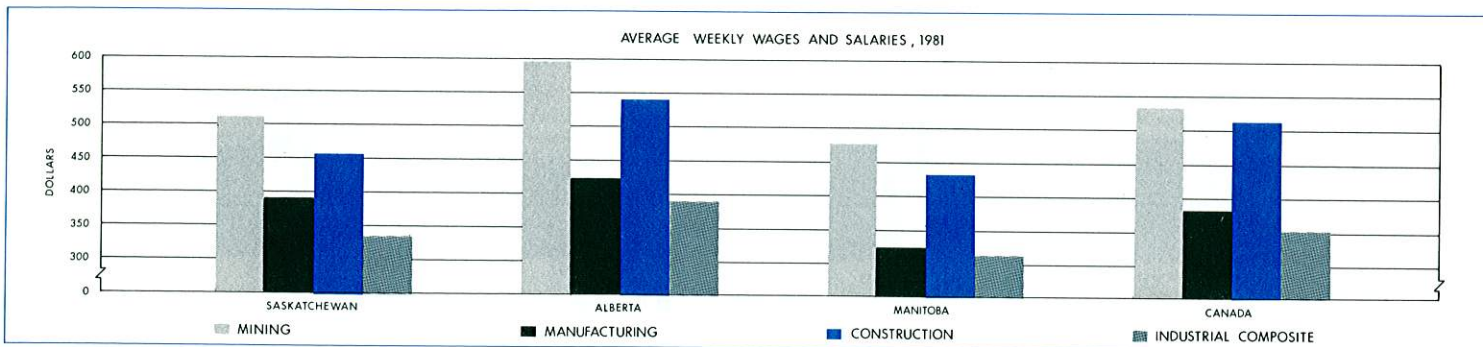

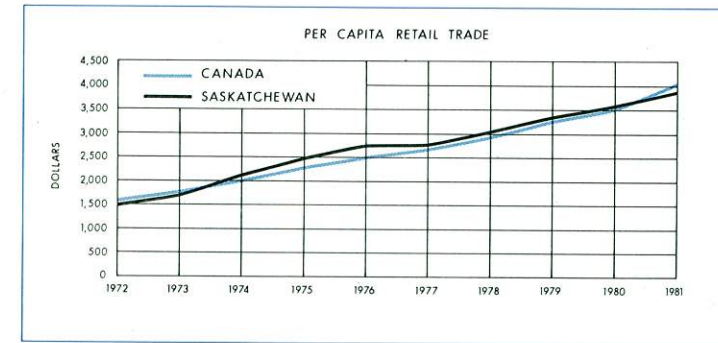

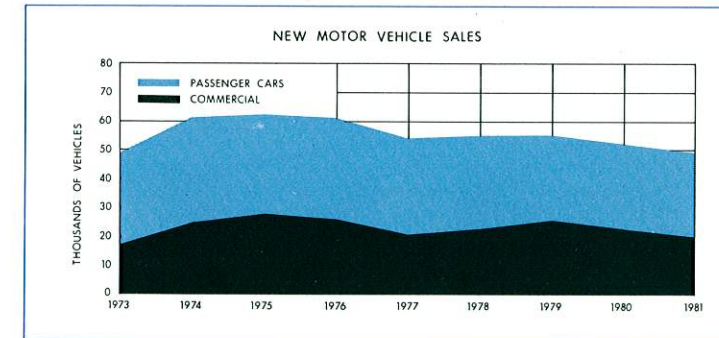

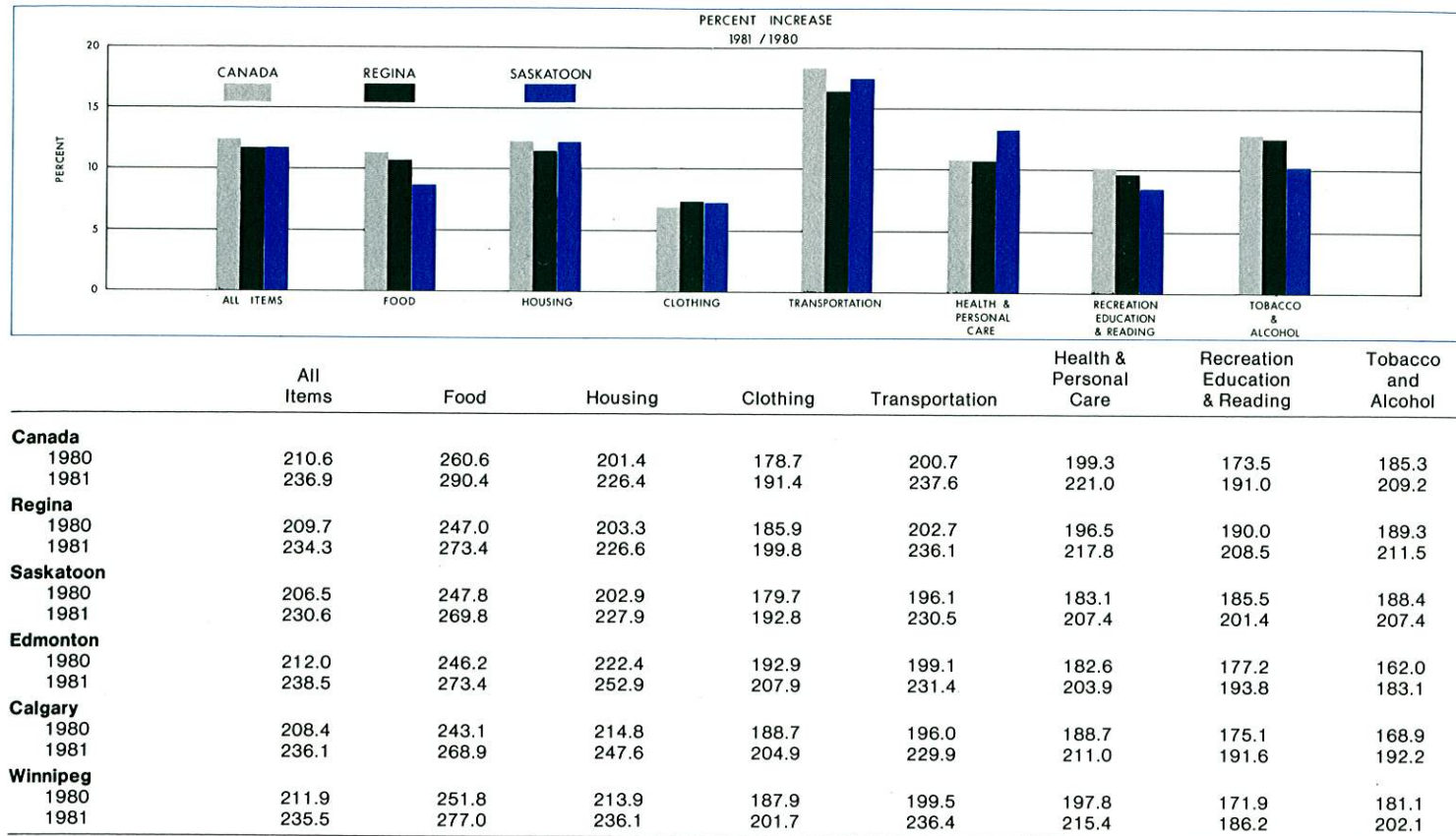

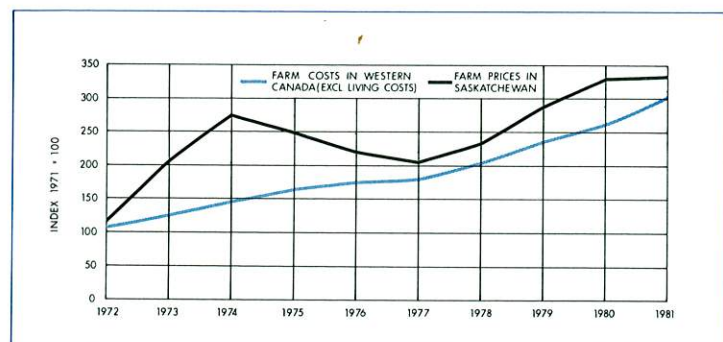

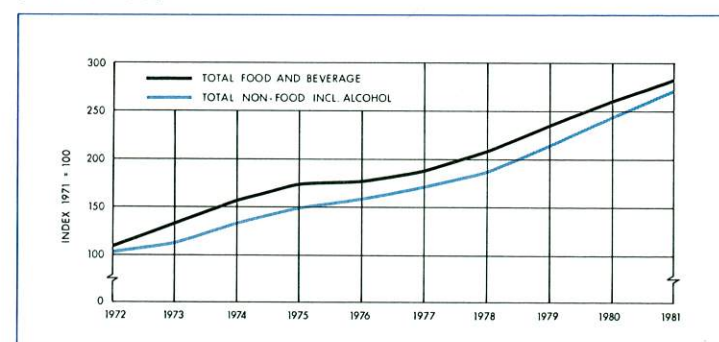

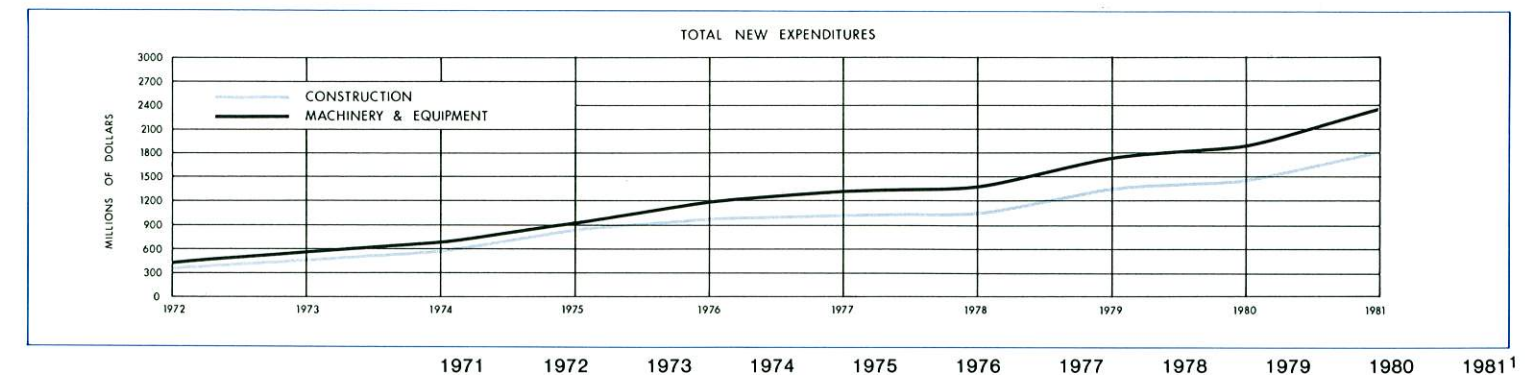

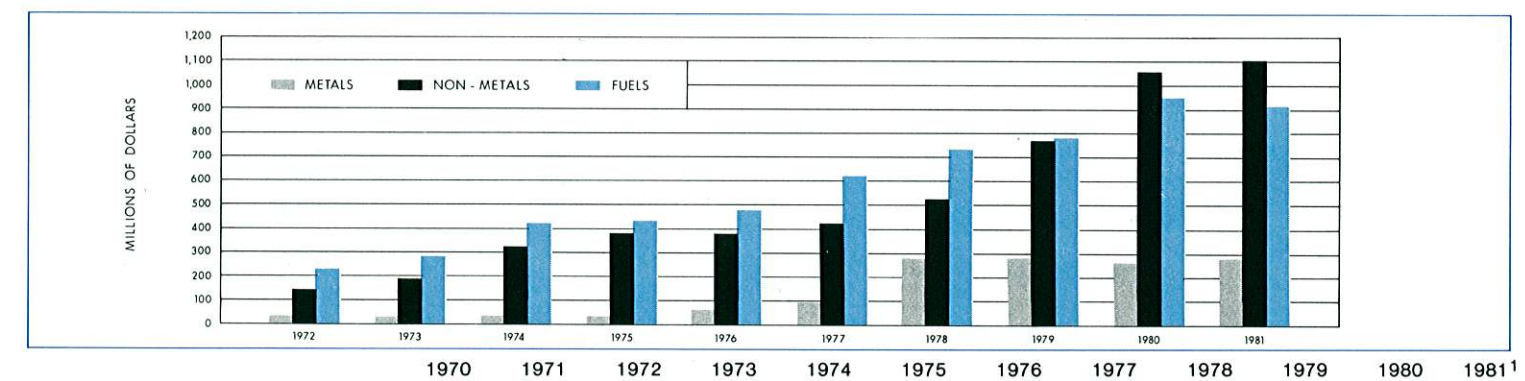

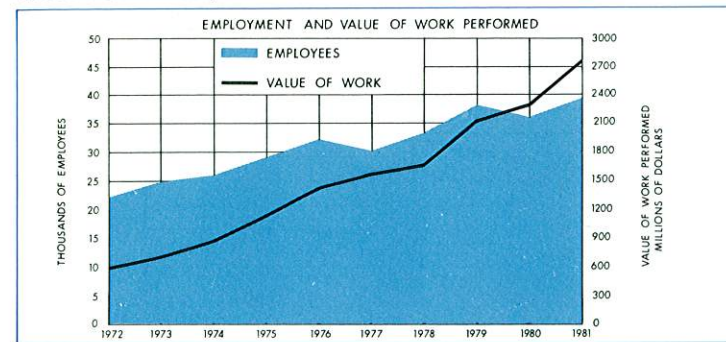

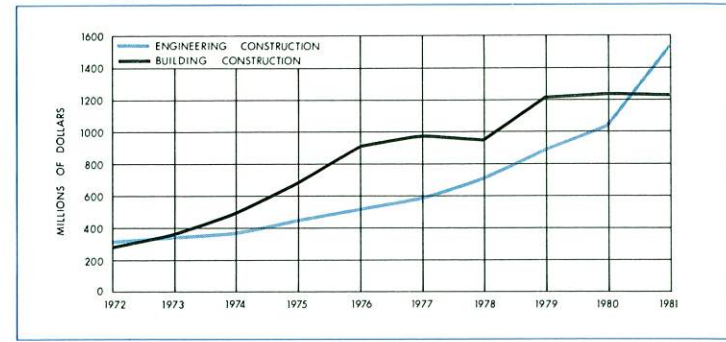

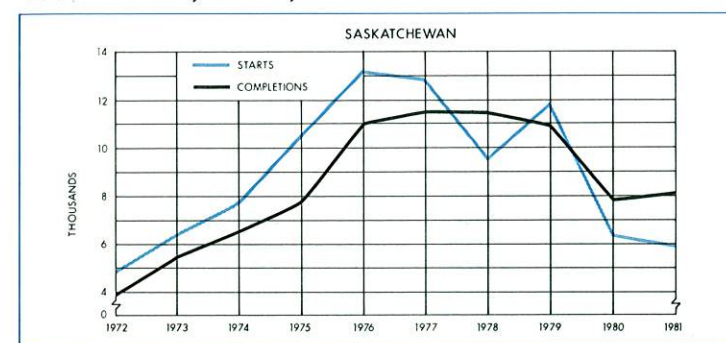

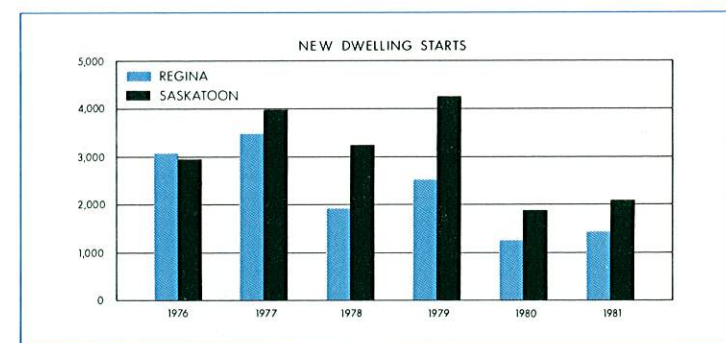

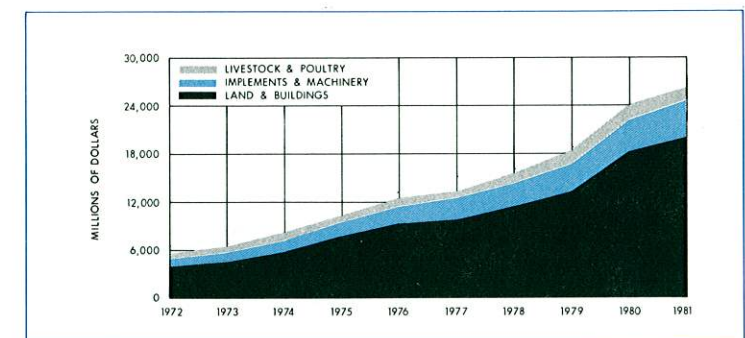

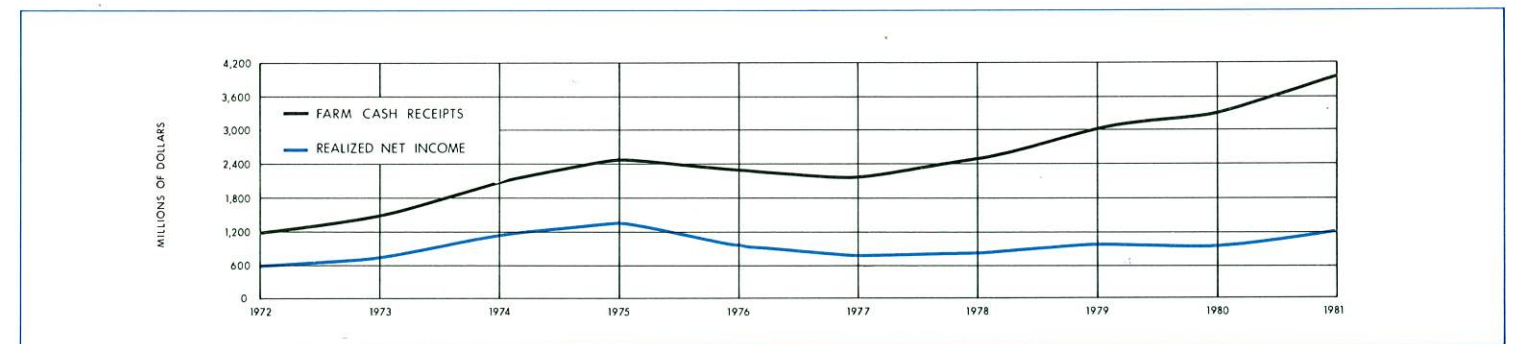

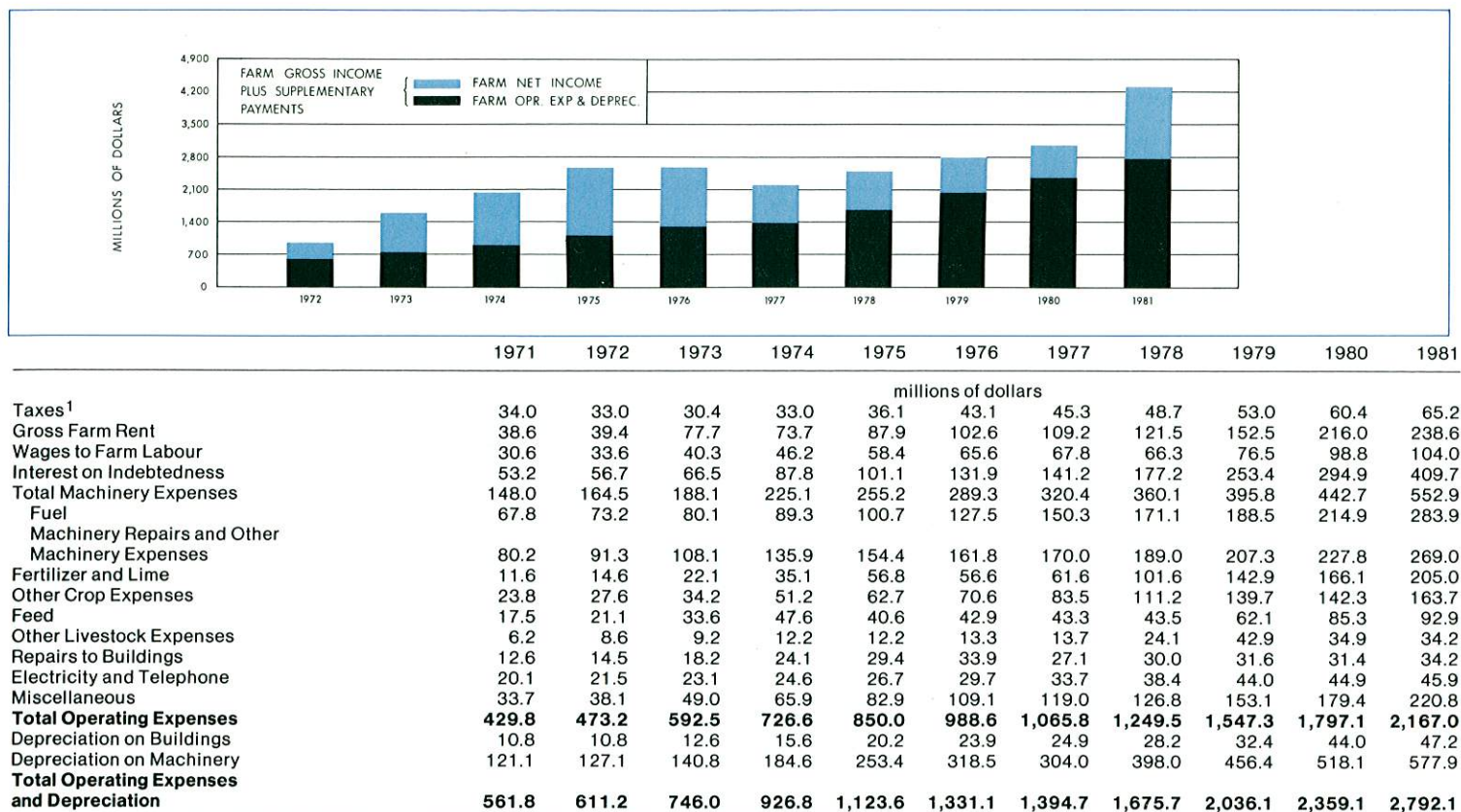

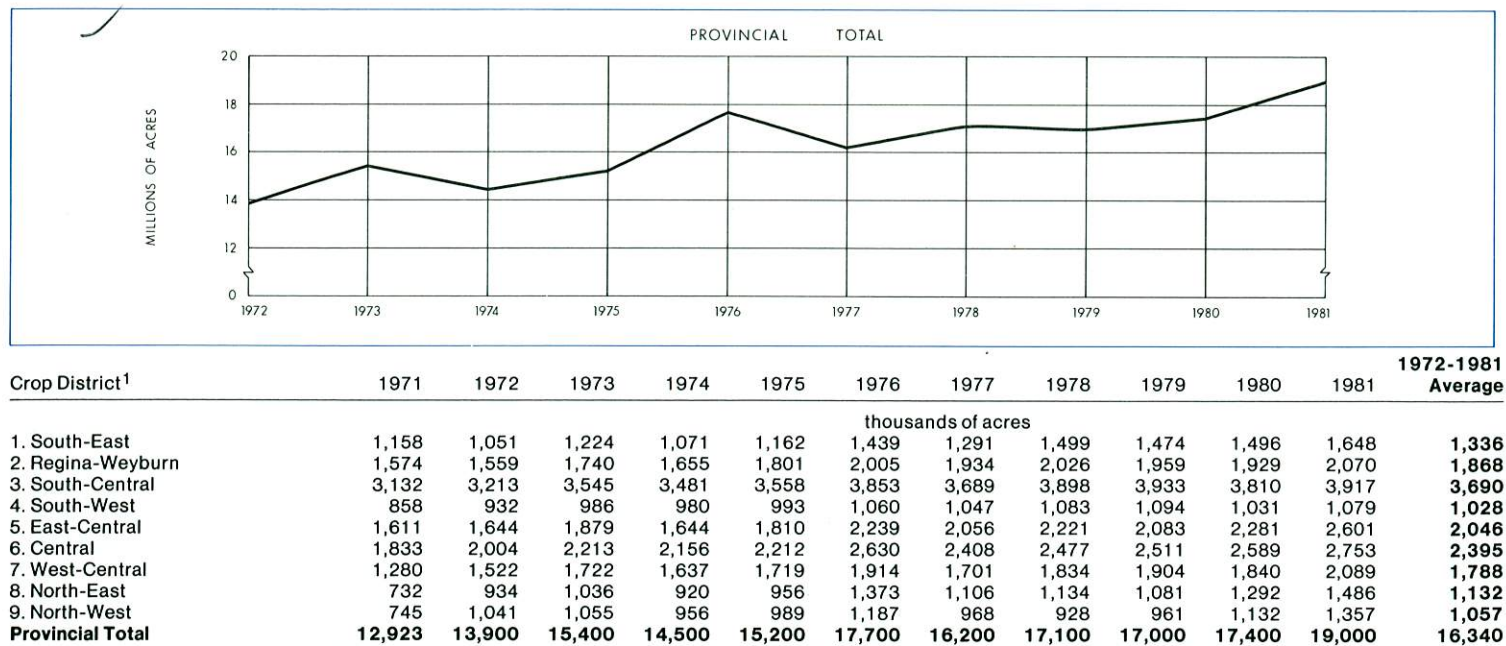

Table 38: Farm Operating Expenses and Depreciation Charges, Saskatchewan



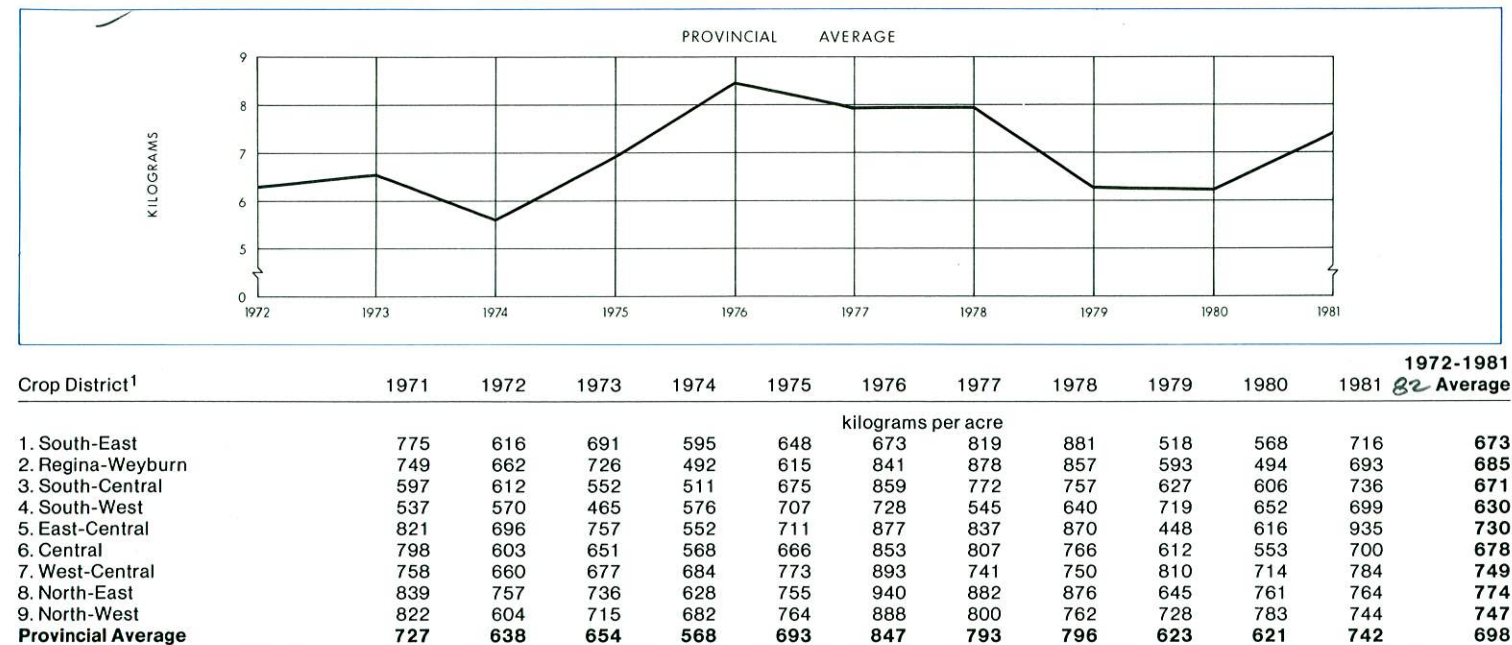

Table 39: Acreage Sown to Wheat by Crop District, Saskatchewan



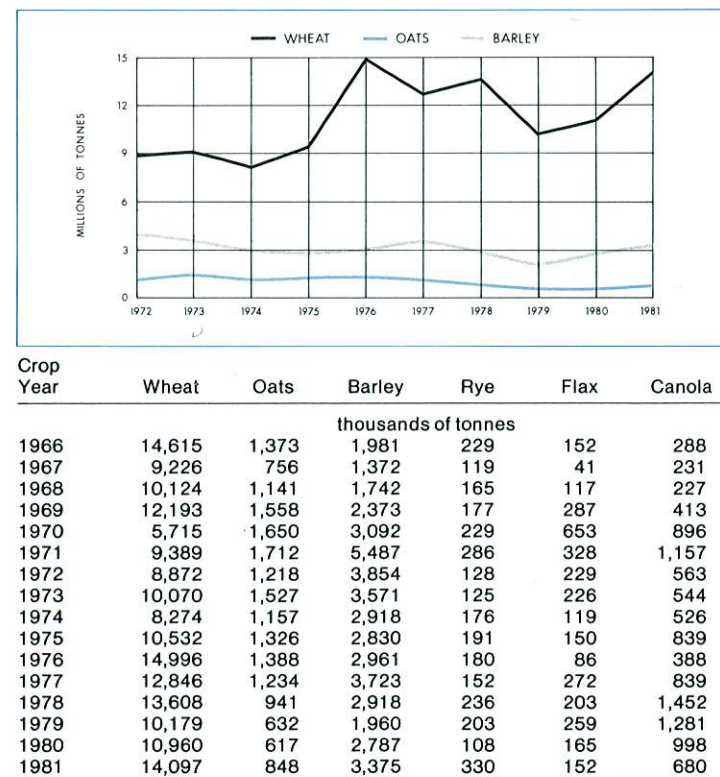

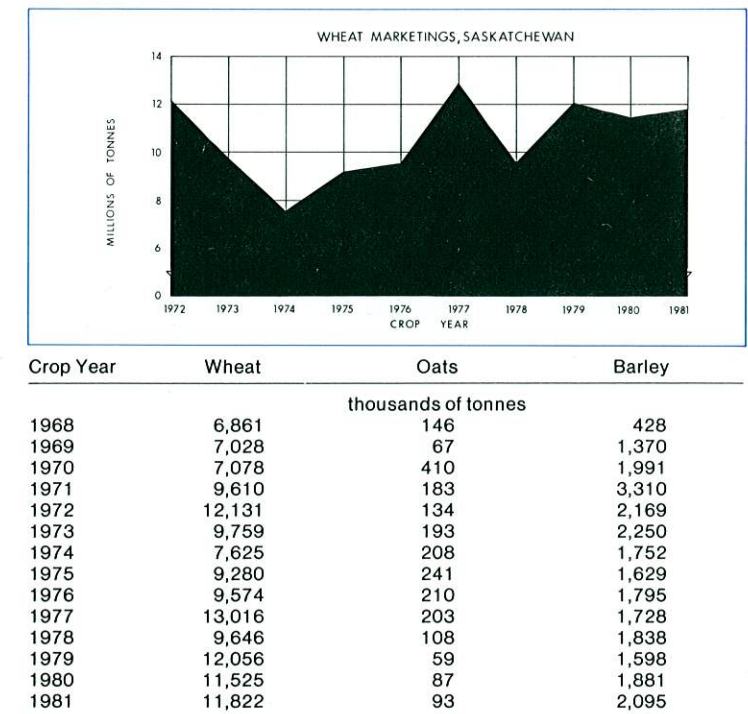
Table 41: Production of Principal Field Crops, Saskatchewan

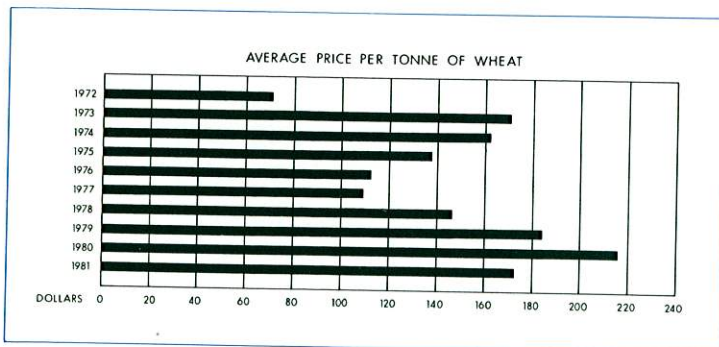

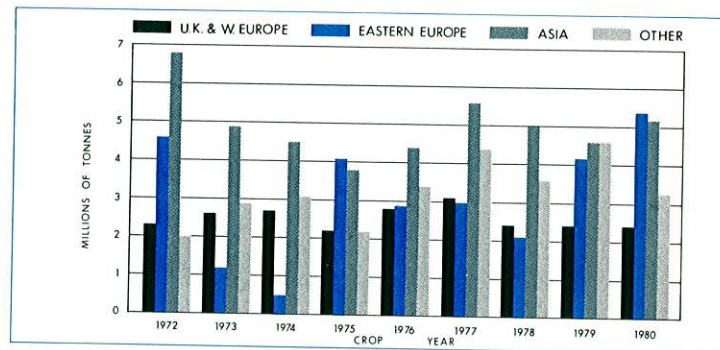

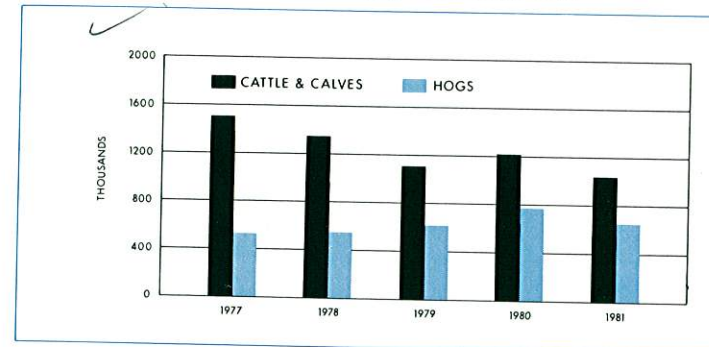

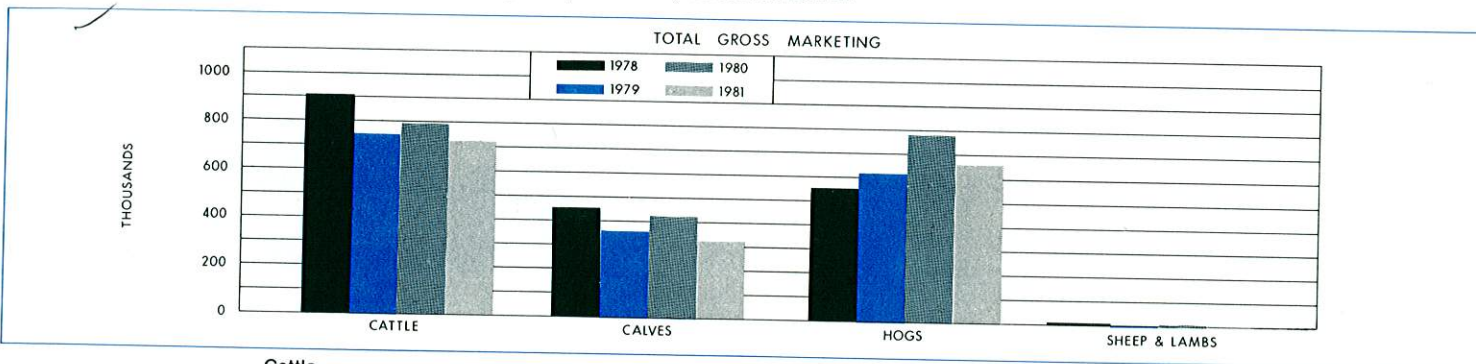

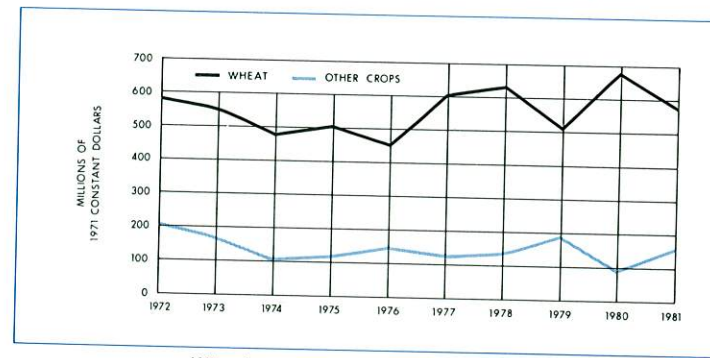

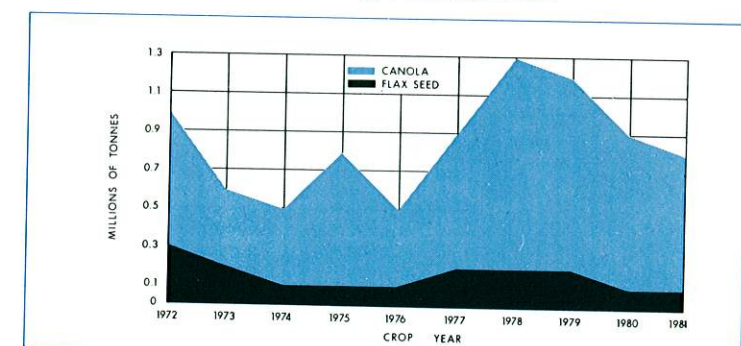

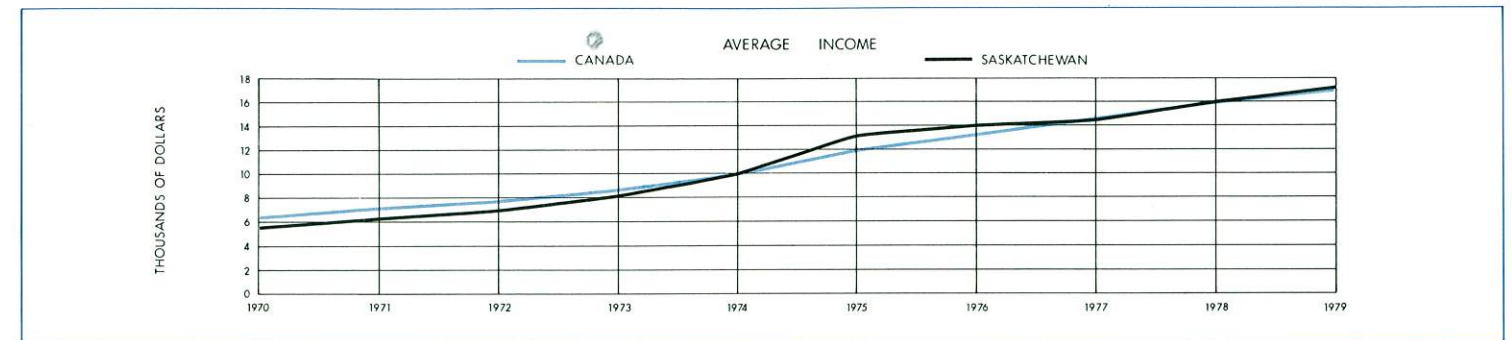

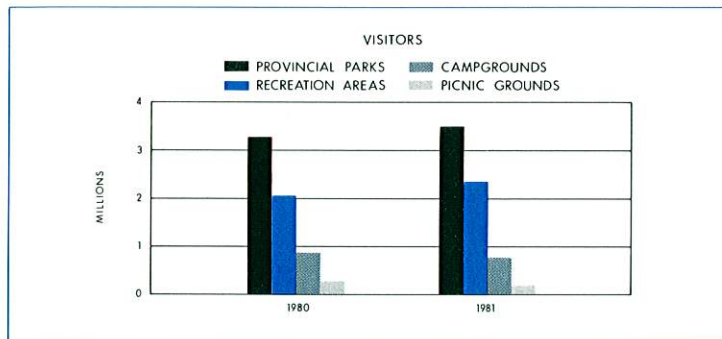

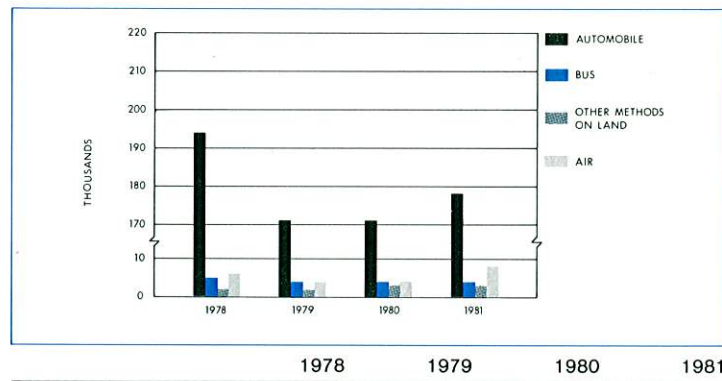

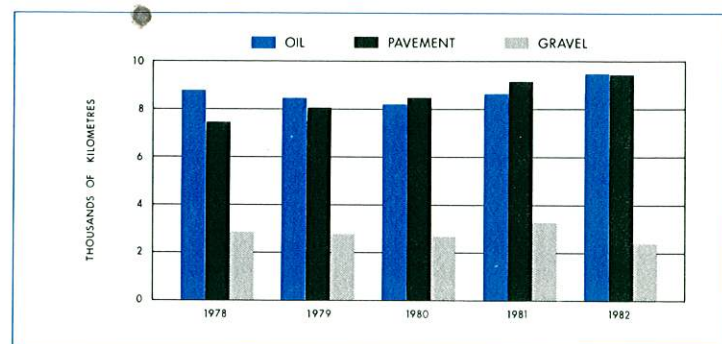

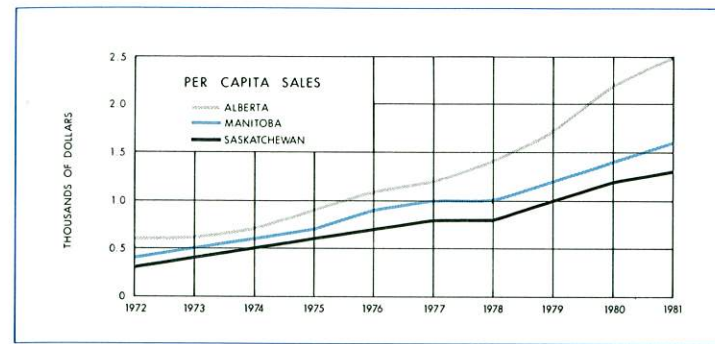

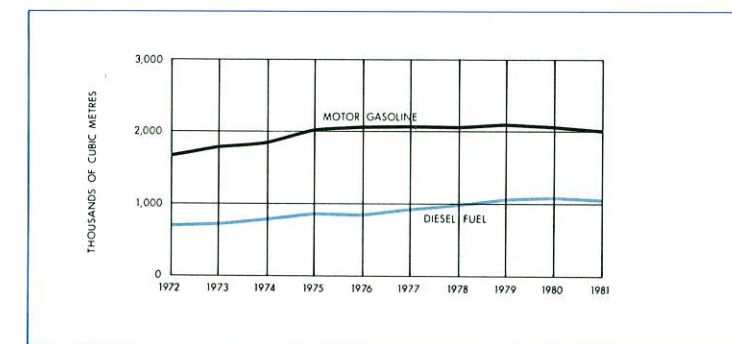

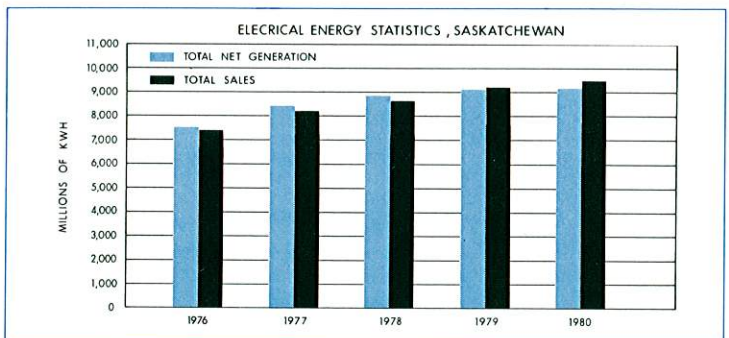

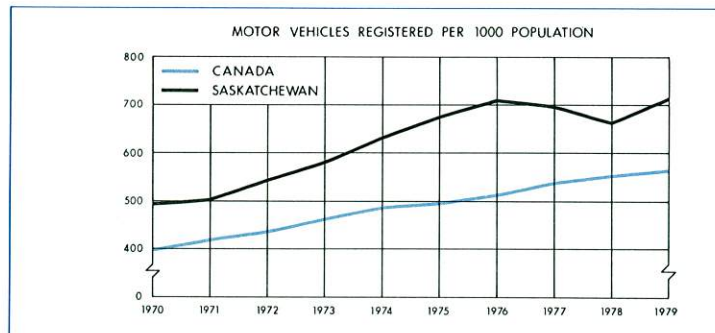

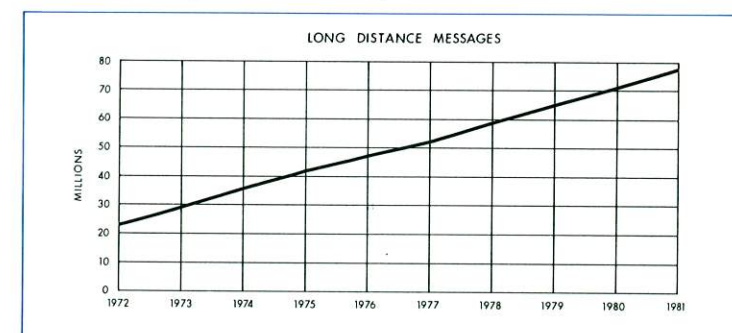

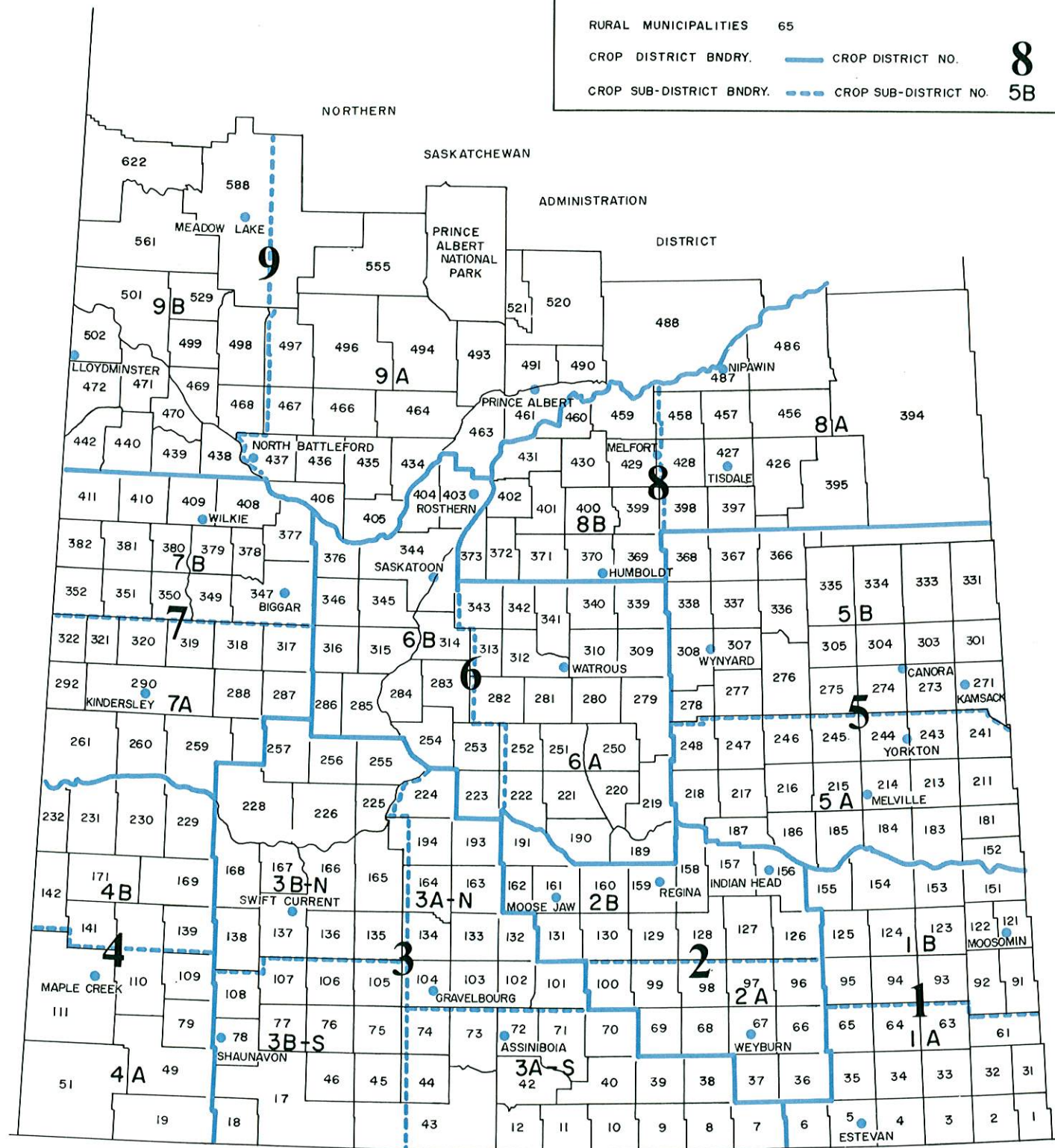

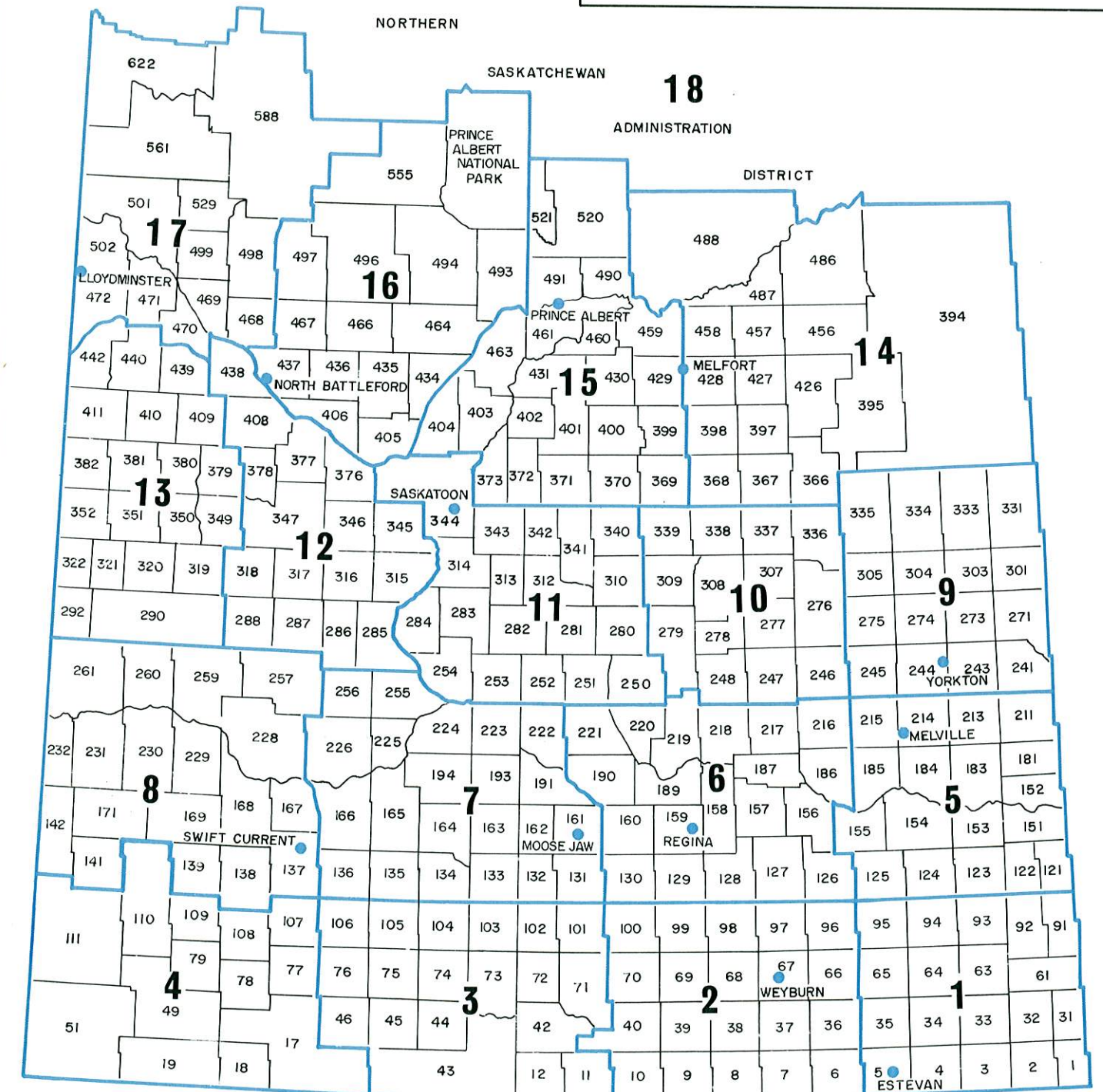

Saskatchewan Economic Accounts

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has developed a set of economic accounts which can be used to trace the development and growth of the Saskatchewan economy.

The purpose of the Accounts is to measure the value of economic activity in each sector of the economy. This is done by means of a balancing set of accounts similar to the annual income and expenditure statements of a commercial enterprise.

The Accounts have many useful functions. They consolidate information which is now provided through a number of scattered sources and organize it into a central framework. This allows many kinds of economic analysis to be performed ranging from monitoring current economic performance to analysis of structural change in the economy.

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has available, upon request, many more detailed tables and other information concerning the Saskatchewan Economic Accounts.
