## ECONOMIC OVERVIEW AND FUTURE PROSPECTS

### 1. GENERAL OVERVIEW

The Saskatchewan economy in 1972 outpaced its performance of 1971. Likewise, the Saskatchewan economy in 1973 is expected to maintain the momentum achieved in previous years. Substantial improvements will likely be registered in all major sectors of the provincial economy this year.

The agricultural sector continues to lead the way again in 1973. Expansion in sales of agricultural products arises from a strong domestic and world demand for grains, livestock, and livestock products. This strong demand is likely to prevail into 1974, therefore assuring the farm sector strong markets for the immediate future.

A most encouraging aspect of the recent agricultural situation is the fact that markets for wheat, feed grains, oilseeds, and livestock are buoyant simultaneously. This should minimize the traditional swings between wheat and livestock which have hampered diversification of Saskatchewan agriculture. Gradual and balanced expansion of wheat, feed grain, oilseeds, and livestock production is therefore expected in 1973 and into 1974.

A disturbing feature of the Saskatchewan economy is accelerating price increases throughout the production and service sectors. These inflationary pressures are not unique to Saskatchewan alone, but are characteristic of Canada as a whole.

Strong inflationary pressures can be expected to remain with the Saskatchewan economy throughout 1973, particularly for consumer and key producer goods. Pressure on general price levels could ebb somewhat in 1974 as production catches up to demand, and inventories are rebuilt. However, prices for food and other agricultural commodities are expected to remain strong throughout 1973 and into 1974.

Despite the sustained expansion of the Saskatchewan economy in 1973, moderate gains will be experienced by those sectors which tend to be high job creating — the manufacturing and service sectors. Since most of the province's economic expansion is due to the primary sectors (agriculture, mining, forestry, etc.), direct employment will likely realize gradual expansion. Therefore, the number of people seeking job opportunities elsewhere is expected to diminish in 1973.

Prospects are good for those activities closely tied to agriculture and non-agricultural resource sectors. As farm and non-farm product sales remain high in 1973, services and retailing areas will register significant gains once again in 1973.

Detailed analysis of the 1972 situation and forecasts for 1973 for each sector are presented in the following sections. The statistical details related to each sector are contained in the accompanying tables.

### 2. POPULATION AND LABOUR FORCE CHARACTERISTICS

Despite the improvement in the economy, the population of Saskatchewan continued to decline to

916,000 at June 1, 1972. The sectors of the economy where recovery was strongest did not completely absorb the increasing labour force. Some out-migration is expected in 1973, but not of the magnitude experienced during the period 1968-1970. Estimated population for June 1, 1973 was 908,000.

With continued high cash returns from agriculture and renewed construction activity expected in 1973 and 1974, there should be more opportunities for local employment.

While total population declined in 1972, the labour force grew to 352,000, compared with 348,000 in 1971. This increase is attributed to a larger number of women entering or returning to the labour force, along with new entrants reaching labour force age.

Because of the age distribution of Saskatchewan's population, the labour force will be further increased by large numbers of young people for several years. The estimated average for 1973 is 355,000. An addition of another 2,000 can be expected in 1974, if employment is as attractive in Saskatchewan as elsewhere.

Although employment in manufacturing and service industries is increasing, it is doubtful that these industries will fully absorb the growing labour force in the immediate future. Average unemployment, therefore, is expected to decline to about 3.9 per cent in 1973, compared with 4.3 per cent in 1972.

### 3. PERSONAL INCOME

In 1972, total personal income<sup>1</sup> in Saskatchewan reached \$2,719 million, an increase of almost 8 per cent over that of 1971.

Wages and salaries account for by far the greatest amount of the total, and this sum rose by almost 12 per cent. A substantial proportion of the increase in total personal income is due to larger transfer payments.

The net income of farm operators for 1972 was reduced by 15 per cent as a result of the withdrawals from inventories of grain.

Personal income per capita increased by 9 per cent to \$2,967. However, the per capita income in Saskatchewan was still \$783 lower than the national figure.

Personal income in Saskatchewan will be higher than \$3 billion in 1973, with substantial increases in all components, including farm income. While a further reduction in grain inventories will result this year, high prices and increased livestock population will more than offset the decline.

### 4. NET VALUE OF PRODUCTION<sup>2</sup>

The total net value of production of the goods-producing industries in Saskatchewan declined slightly to \$1,690 million in 1972. This decline was largely because of a 10 per cent reduction in the value of agricultural production. While most non-agricultural industries registered gains, the value of mineral production remained relatively stable.

Despite the decline in the production of agricultural commodities, this sector still accounted for 46.4 per cent of the total net value of all goods-producing industries.

In the non-agricultural sector, mining accounted for the largest contribution, registering 37.5 per cent of the total net value of \$906 million. Construction and manufacturing followed with 27.6 per cent and 24.7 per cent respectively.

In 1973, increased livestock production and higher prices for all products will add \$230 million to the net value of production in agriculture. Total net value of agricultural production is expected to reach \$1 billion.

Mining will also show improvement with a 14 per cent gain over 1972. A large proportion of gains in mineral production will be due to increased sales of potash.

The total net value of all goods produced in 1973 will likely reach \$2 billion, with agriculture accounting for one-half of this sum.

With firm prices for most goods produced in Saskatchewan and ever-increasing demand for the majority of agricultural products, the total net value of production will likely surpass the \$2 billion mark in 1974.

### 5. AGRICULTURE

Total cash receipts from farming operations in 1972 was estimated at \$1,200.8 million, 31.2 per cent above the value for 1971.

Major factors contributing to the record cash receipts were increased grain delivery and Wheat Board payments and higher prices for livestock.

Realized farm net income<sup>3</sup> of farm operators in 1972 reached \$649 million, 63.5 per cent higher than in 1971.

Total farm net income, which takes into account changes in the amount and value of inventories of field crops and livestock, was reduced to \$433 million in 1972. Production fell far short of grain marketed, and a large part of farm income resulted from marketing previous years' stocks which remained on the farms.

With prices of all grains and livestock higher than last year and with increased marketings of most products, total cash receipts from farming operations are expected to exceed \$1,550 million in 1973. Realized net income is expected to reach \$940 million. Production in 1973 will again be lower than marketings. Therefore, farm net income will be lower than realized net farm income, at approximately \$650 million.

Farm income in 1974 will depend largely on export demand for wheat, and export and domestic demand for other agricultural products. (World supplies of wheat are expected to increase in 1973-74; feed grains will remain in short supply; world supplies of oilseeds will increase and prices will likely decline; demand for meat will rise.) With continued high prices for most agricultural products and with more diversification, cash receipts should equal those expected in 1973. Realized net income may be reduced if increasing prices for goods and services used in production are not matched by increased prices received for agricultural products. Realized net income, however, should still be over \$700 million.

### 6. MINING

Mining activity stabilized in 1972, with the value of production increasing only marginally to \$428.7 million.

The value of metallic mineral production in 1972 increased by 22 per cent over 1971.

The value of petroleum marketed declined further in 1972, although petroleum prices were beginning to strengthen toward year-end. The total value of production of crude oil was \$213.8 million, nearly half the value of all minerals produced in Saskatchewan.

Sales of potash increased slightly in volume, accounting for \$146.2 million.

The outlook for mining in 1973 is for an increase of over 13 per cent to \$485 million, due largely to increasing prices for most minerals and a stronger demand for potash. Because of a decline in copper production, there will be a further reduction in mining of metals, but higher prices will increase the value to \$33 million.

Crude oil production will probably decline 2 per cent from last year to 85 million barrels. However, indications are for an average increase of about 30 cents per barrel throughout the year. Total value of 1973 crude output should be \$238 million.

Sales of potash in 1973 are expected to increase by 20 per cent to 4.9 million tons K<sub>2</sub>O and, at a slightly lower value per ton, this will account for total sales worth \$175 million. Demand for potash in 1974 is expected to intensify as more will be required for crop production by the importing countries.

### 7. MANUFACTURING

The value of shipments of goods manufactured in Saskatchewan in 1972 was \$621.7 million, 8.8 per cent above that of 1971. This represents a greater than average yearly increase when compared with those experienced in previous years.

The food and beverage industries, by far the largest contributors to manufacturing, experienced a gain of 14 per cent over 1971.

In the first five months of 1973, all manufacturing industries registered large gains. Considering expansion of existing facilities and the formation of new establishments for processing agricultural products, the total value of shipments of manufactured goods is expected to reach \$700 million by year-end and should continue to increase in 1974.

### 8. HOUSING

Housing starts in 1972 strongly outpaced those of 1971. A total of 4,845 dwelling units was started in 1972, compared with 3,560 in 1971 and 1,743 in 1970.

With continued economic improvement and changes in criteria for assisted home ownership, it is estimated that dwelling starts will reach 6,000 in 1973.

Large apartment buildings and row houses are expected to account for a higher proportion of total starts in 1973. Single unit starts are heavily concentrated in the larger cities of Saskatchewan, but are expected to increase in the smaller centers as well.

A shortage of skilled labour in some trades may cause some delay in completing homes this year.

With recent amendments to the National Housing Act and continued strong economic performance, Saskatchewan will probably again experience a large number of dwelling starts in 1974. However, the number of starts could be constrained by high interest rates and rising construction costs.

9. PRIVATE AND PUBLIC INVESTMENT

Total investment in construction and machinery in 1972 increased by almost 17 per cent over 1971 to \$1,125.5 million. Capital expenditures in construction rose by 7.8 per cent to \$425.3 million, with increases in utilities, trade, finance and commercial services, and housing.

Investment in new machinery and equipment increased to \$379.6 million for a gain of over 40 per cent. Expenditures for farm machinery in 1972 totalled \$178.9 million, 47 per cent of the total invested in new machinery and equipment in Saskatchewan.

Repair expenditures for construction and machinery totalled \$320.6 million, 7.3 per cent above the 1971 level.

Information on capital spending intentions provides a useful indicator of general economic conditions and reveals expansion plans of particular sectors. It also provides information concerning potential demands to be placed upon the productive capacities within the province.

According to the survey of investment intentions conducted by Statistics Canada and the Department of Industry, Trade, and Commerce, capital expenditures in Saskatchewan in 1973 are to total \$872.3 million, with a 27 per cent increase in farm machinery. Housing construction is expected to account for a 21 per cent increase. Total spending for new and repair investment is estimated at \$1,213.7 million for the year. However, it is felt that investment will be stronger than the early intentions indicated.

Investment in residential construction in 1973 will be substantially greater than 1972 levels. Cities in Saskatchewan are experiencing increased activity in apartment building construction and many new homes are expected to be under construction in the last half of the year. Construction of commercial buildings may also be higher than intentions at the time of the survey. In view of the larger than expected returns to agriculture, expenditures on farm machinery may reach a new high.

10. RETAIL TRADE

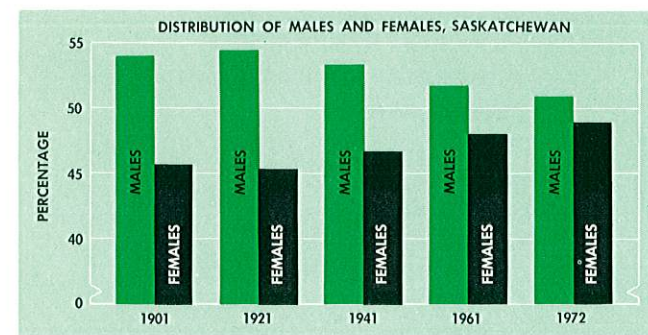
The value of retail trade in 1972 totalled \$1,274.9 million, 12 per cent higher than in 1971. High incomes resulting from improvement in most sectors of the economy, and delayed spending on durables previous to 1972 accounted for much of the increase in volume of retail trade. Sales of motor vehicles amounted to \$289.3 million, an increase of almost 20 per cent.

Rising prices of most consumer goods also contributed to the high value of trade. This is most noticeable in grocery store sales where the increase was almost 10 per cent last year and is continuing at the same rate this year.

With the optimistic outlook for 1973 generally, consumer confidence remains strong, and the value of retail trade will probably reach \$1,400 million. Although spending on durables has not increased to the same extent as in 1972, it is expected to grow as the year progresses, especially if new home construction should reach the level anticipated.

1. Personal income measures all income received by persons, including wages, salaries and supplementary income, net income of farm operators and unincorporated businesses, interest, dividends and net rental income and government transfer payments.
2. Net value of commodity production measures the "value added" by each of the goods-producing industries. It is obtained by deducting from the gross value (exclusive of excise and other sales taxes) of shipments (adjusted for inventory changes of finished goods and goods-in-process), the cost of materials and supplies, fuel and electricity. Indirect taxes and cost of services, such as insurance, communications, etc., are not removed from the gross value.
3. Realized net income is the sum of cash receipts and income in kind (the value of goods produced by the farmer and consumed in his home, plus an imputed rental value of the farm dwelling) from which is subtracted his operating expenses and depreciation charges. It represents the farmer's income immediately available for family living and investment.

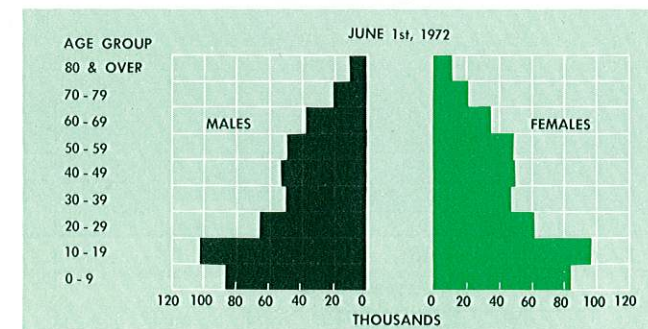
Table 1: POPULATION, Canada, and Saskatchewan by Sex

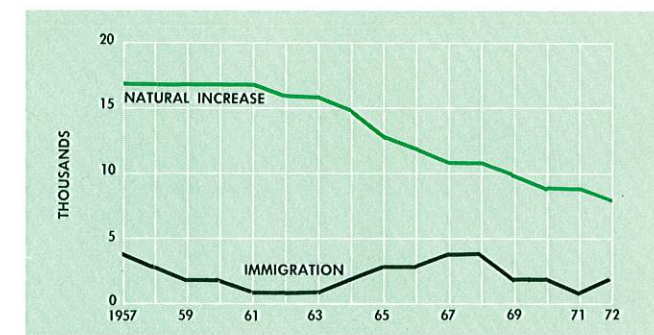
Table 3: POPULATION, Saskatchewan Distribution by Age Groups

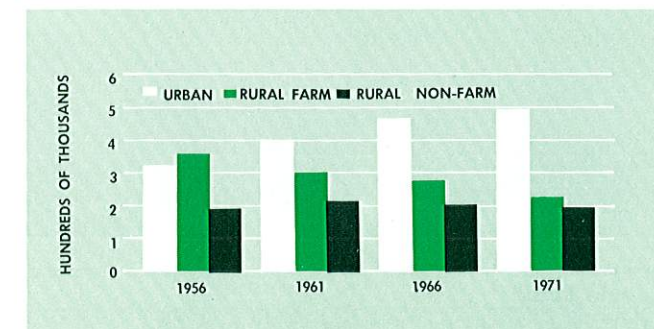

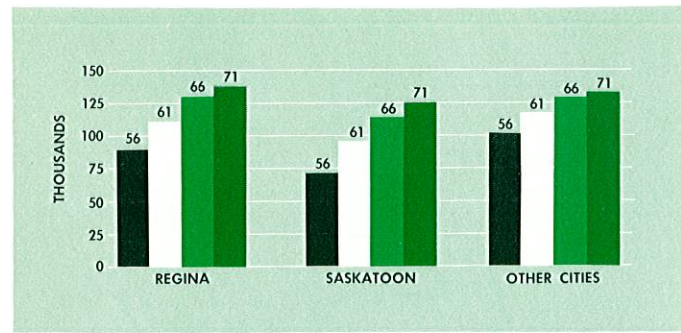
Table 4: POPULATION, Saskatchewan Urban, Rural and Farm

Table 5: CITY POPULATION, Saskatchewan

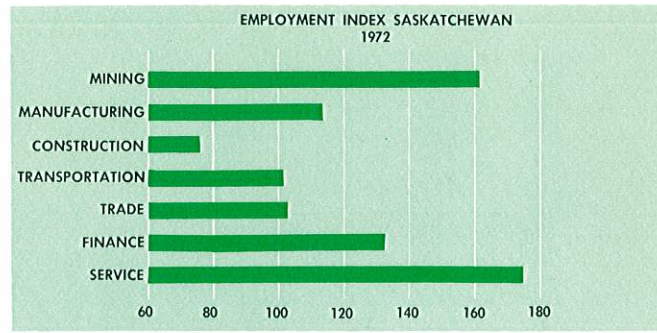

Table 6: INDEX OF EMPLOYMENT<sup>1</sup>, (1961 = 100), by Industries, Saskatchewan



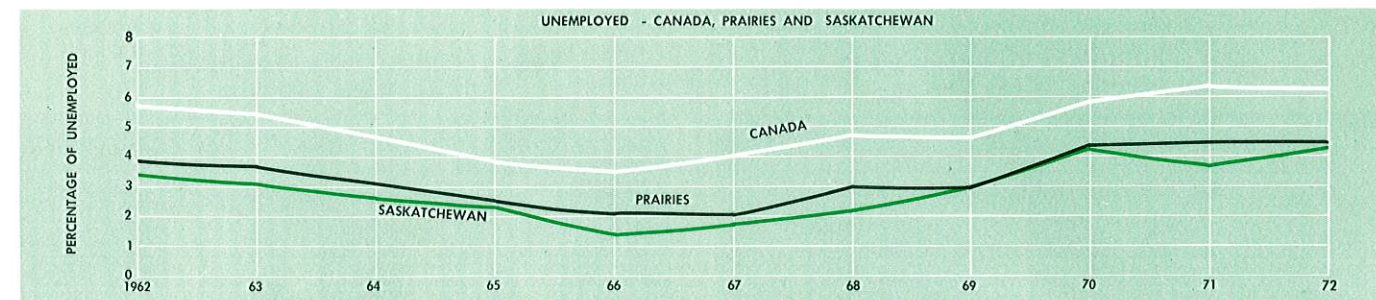

Table 7: LABOUR FORCE, Canada, Prairies and Saskatchewan



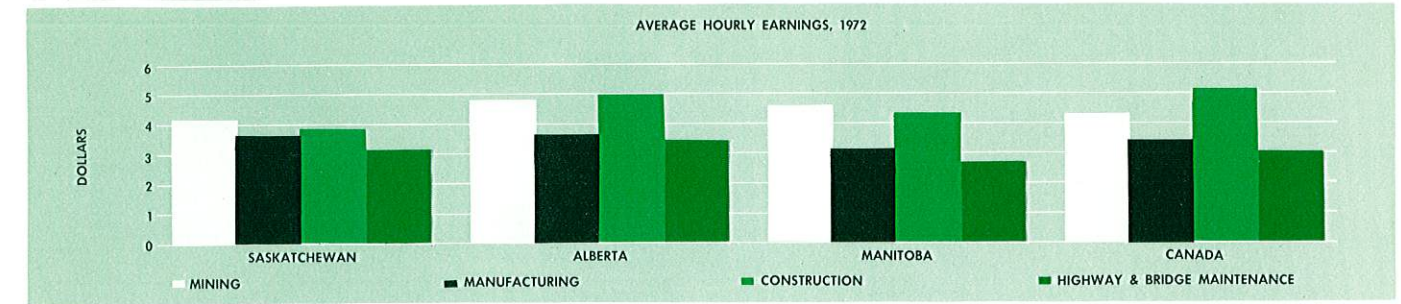

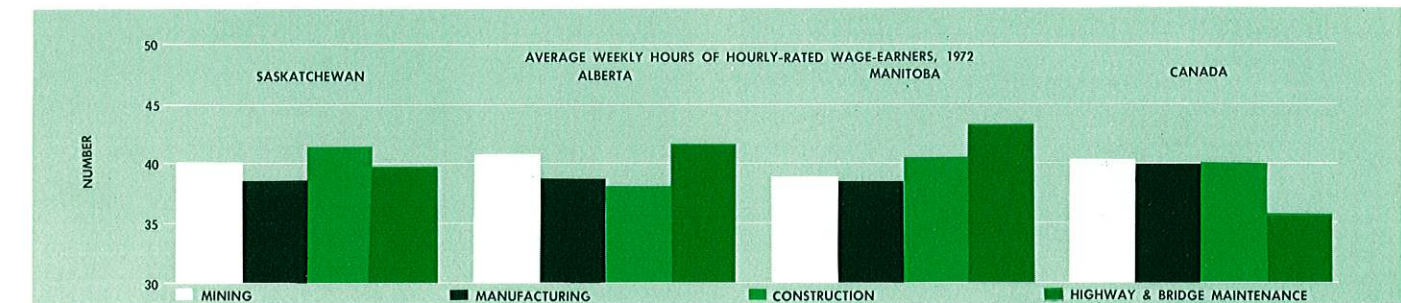

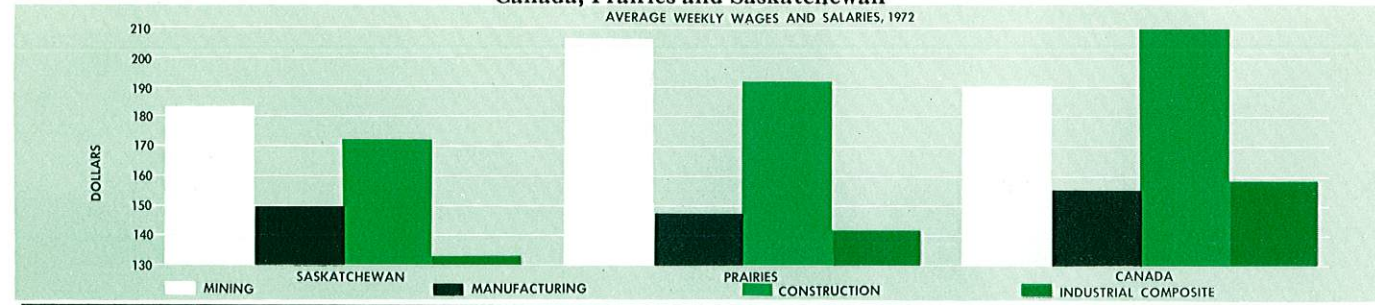

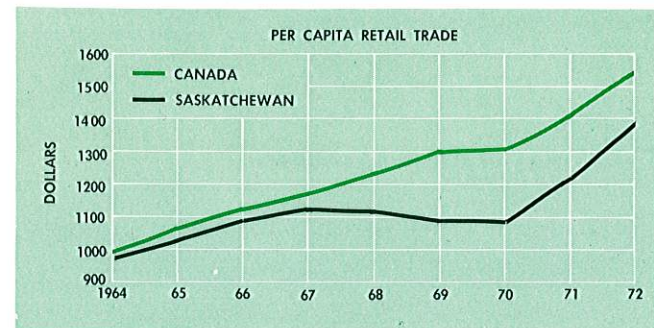

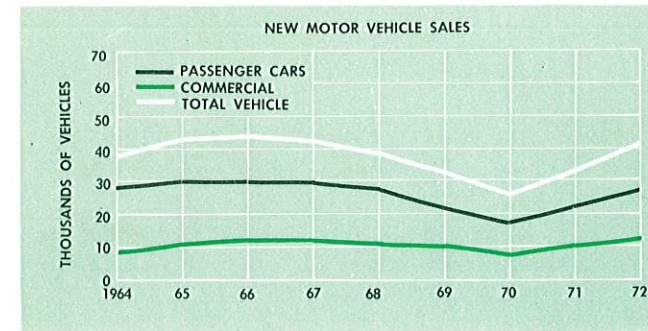

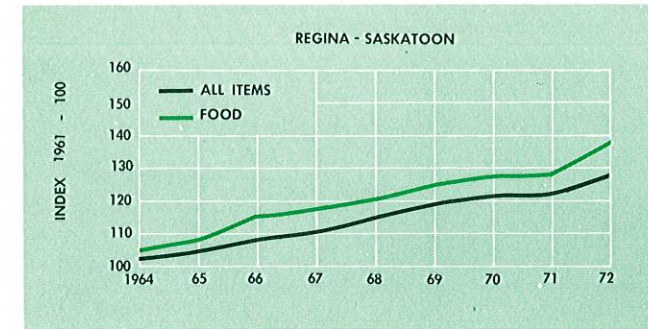

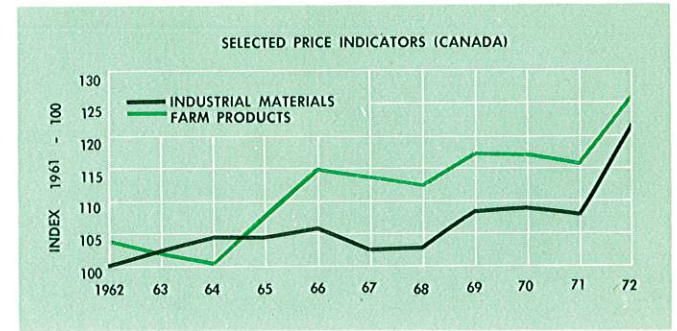

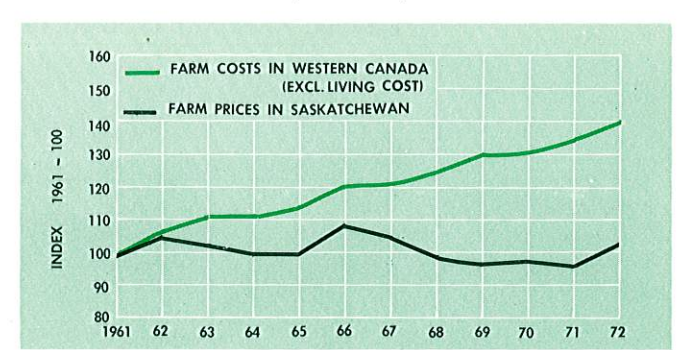

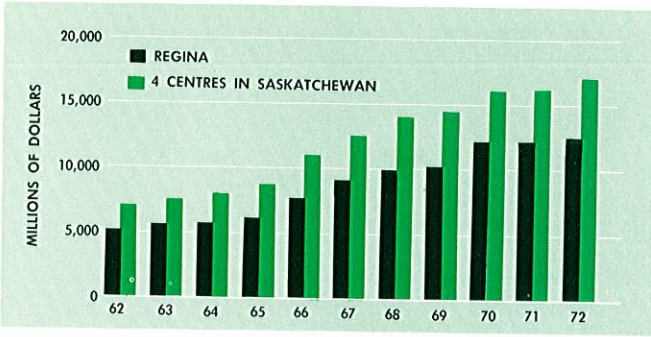

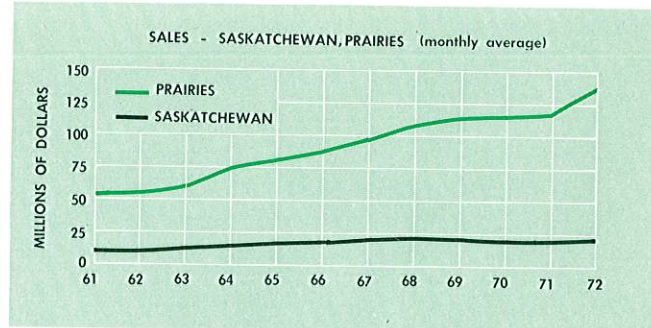

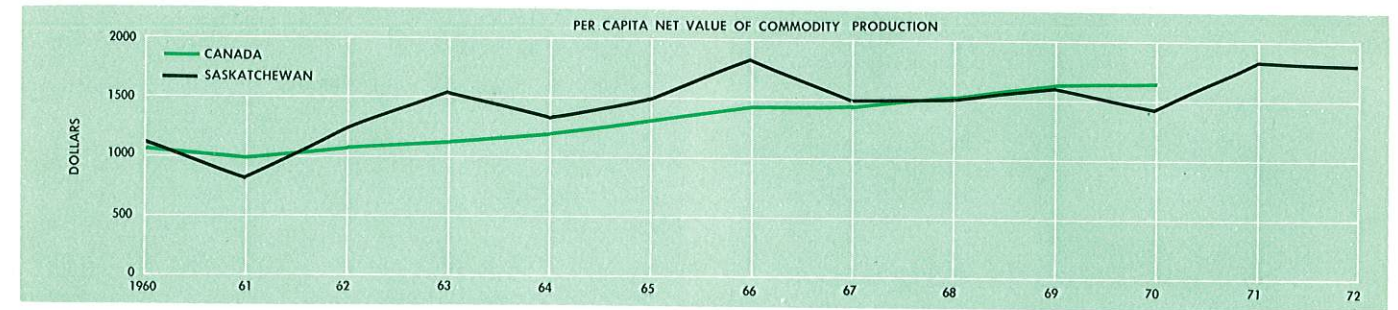

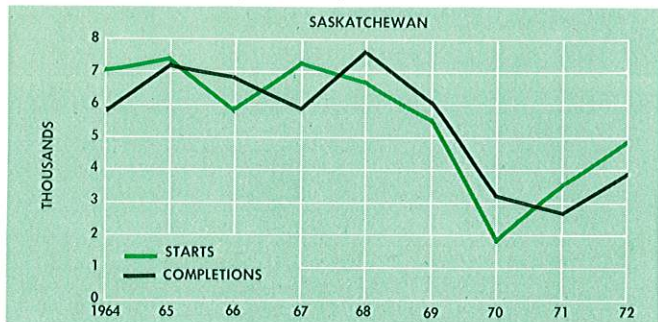

Table 24: NEW DWELLING UNITS: STARTS AND COMPLETIONS, Canada, Prairies, Saskatchewan



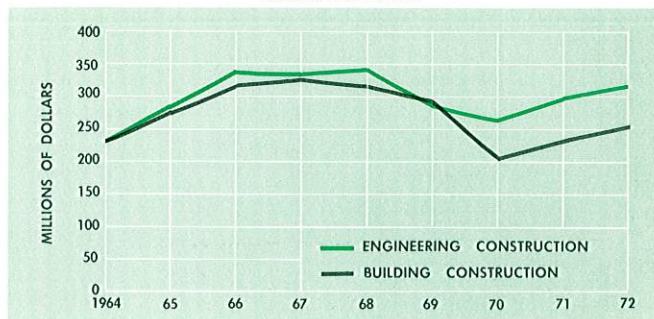

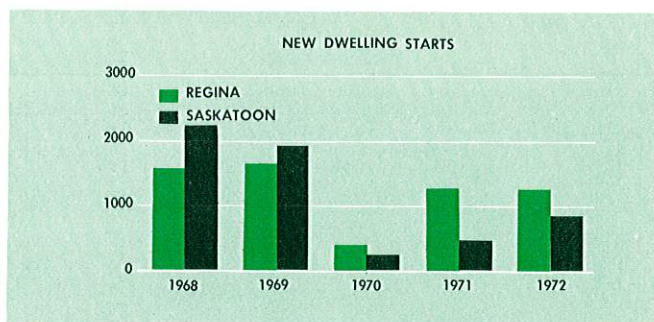

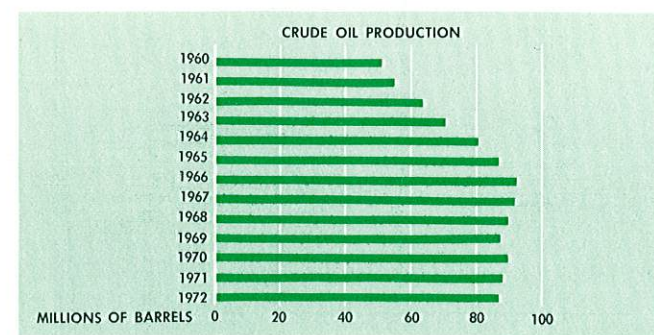

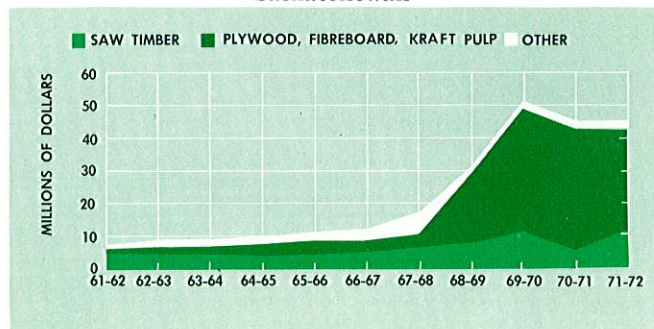

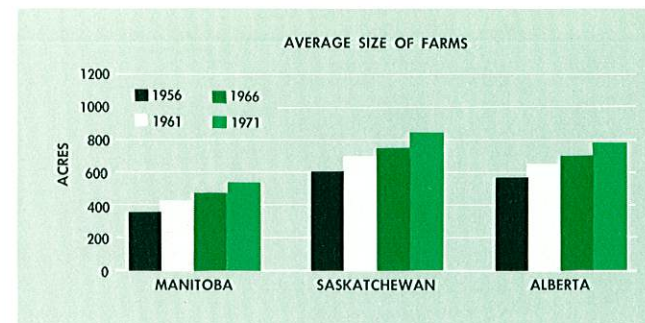

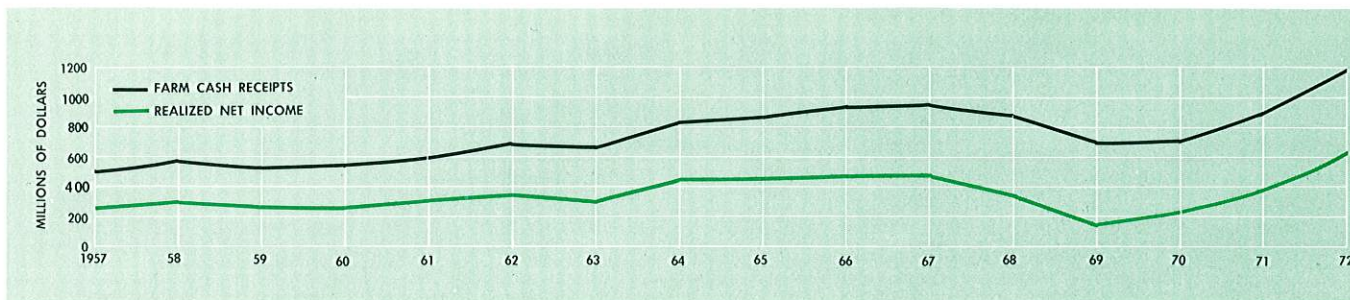

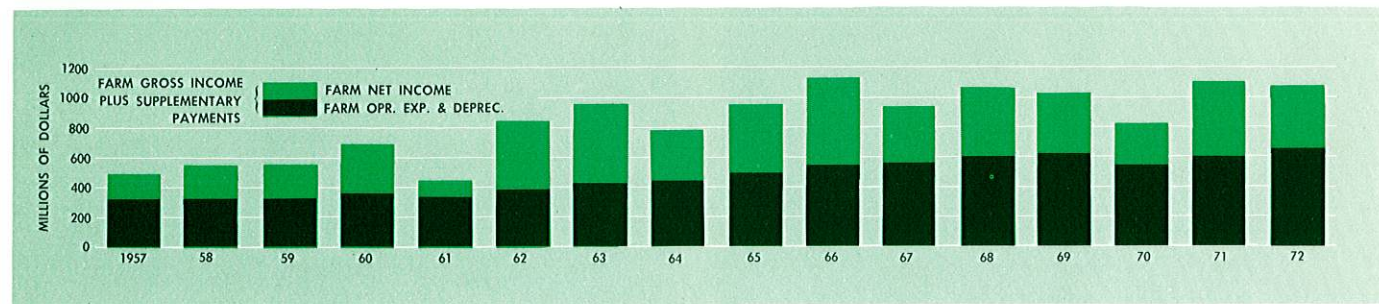

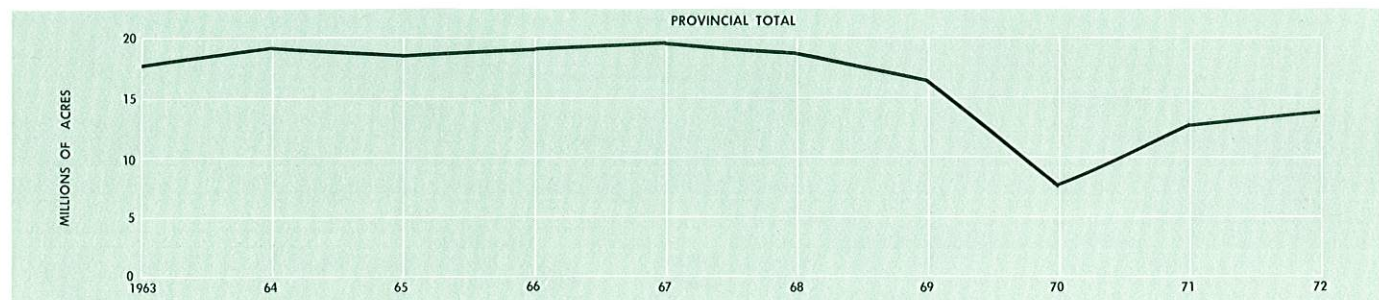

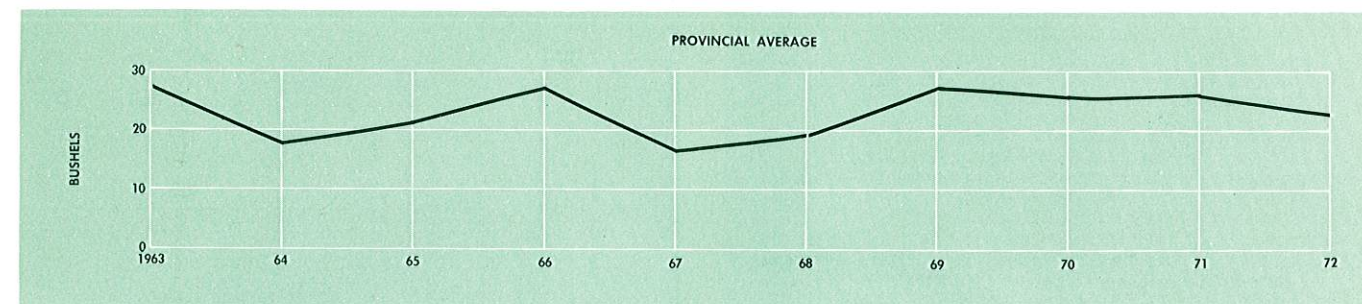

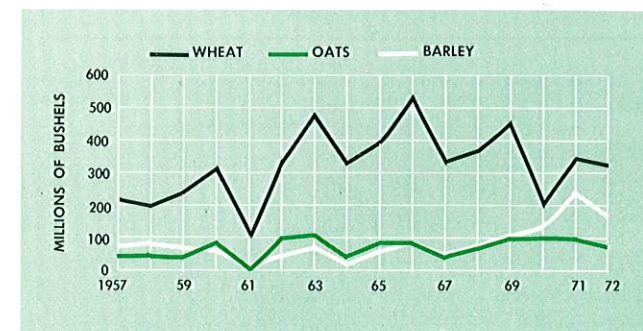

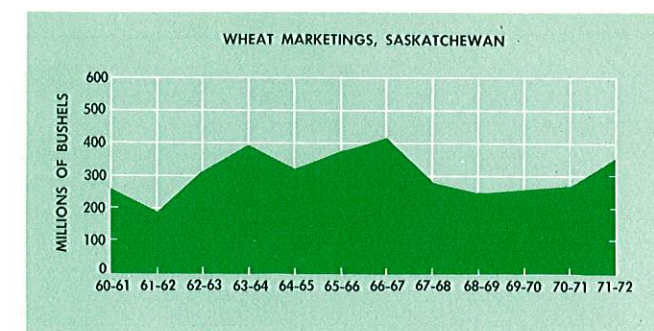

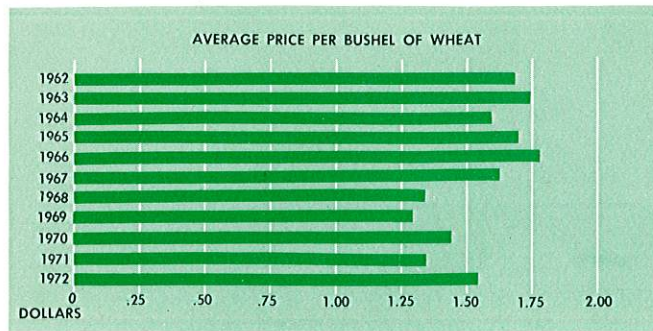

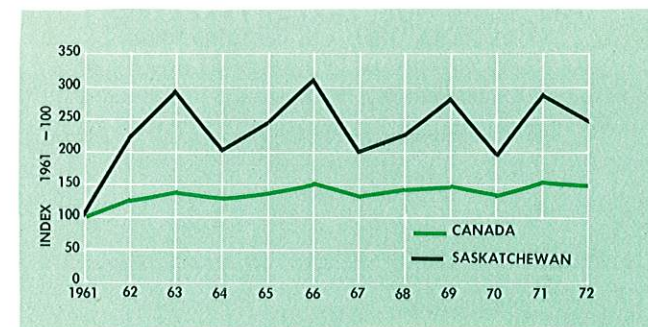

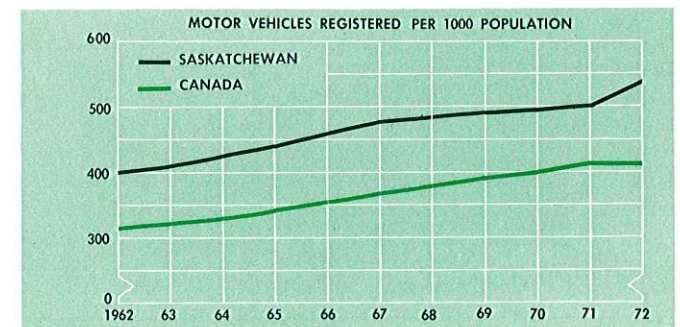

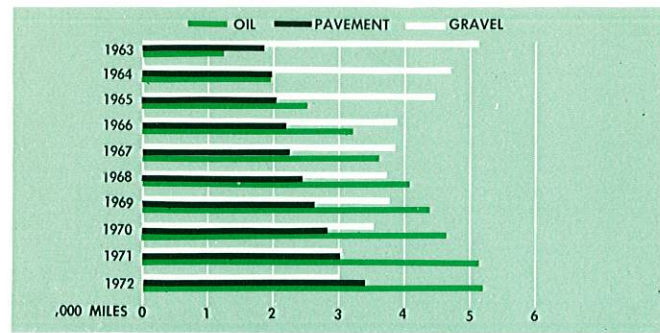

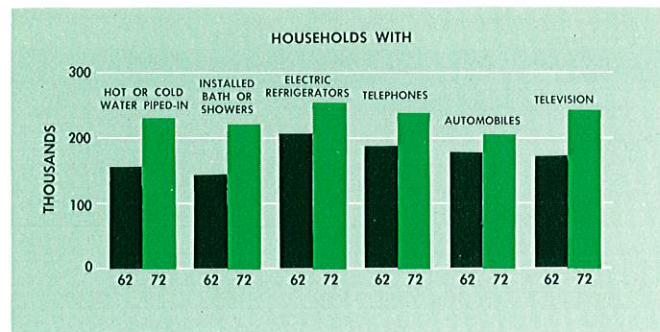

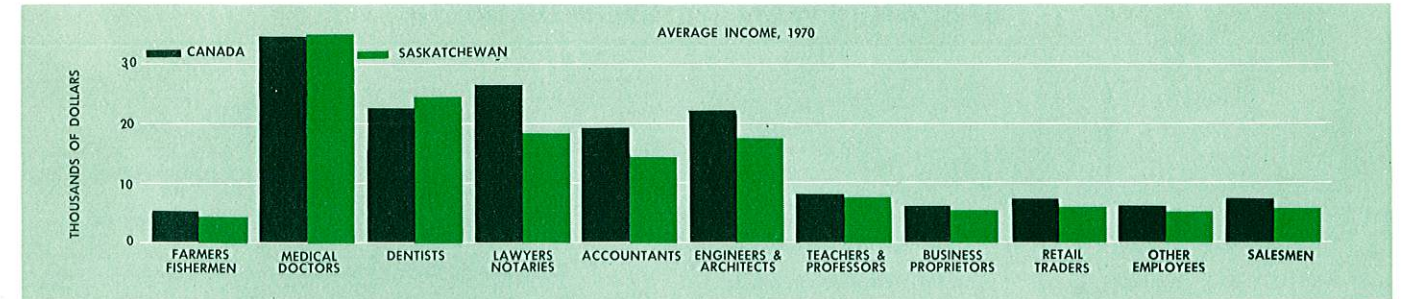

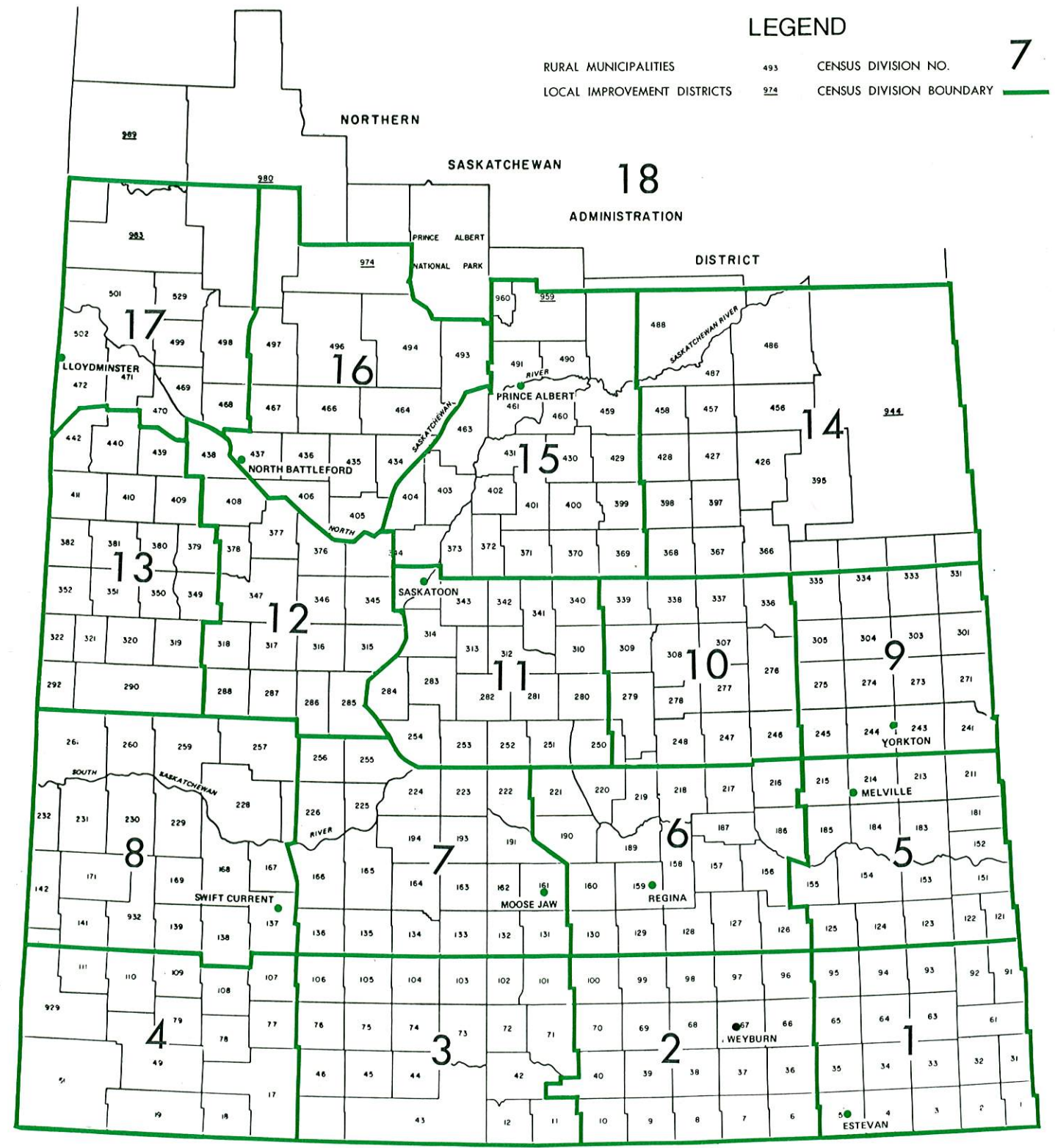
