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FOREWORD

In compiling the 1972 edition of the Economic Review, we have made a number of changes in an attempt to provide a more useful statistical reference document for public use. These revisions have taken two forms.

First, we are including a narrative commentary in conjunction with the statistical tables normally included, so that the key information contained in the tables is highlighted more adequately for the reader.

Second, short term forecasting of economic performance among the major sectors of the provincial economy is included within the narrative, where information is sufficiently reliable to permit the assessment of economic activity for the latter half of 1972.

We hope the above revisions are useful to you. Any suggestions which you might have to further improve the Review would be greatly appreciated. In future issues of the Review, we would hope to provide, in addition to the more conventional statistical and historical material, a more penetrating analysis of economic developments, and the results of various special studies.

ECONOMIC OVERVIEW AND PROSPECTS FOR 1972

1. POPULATION AND LABOUR FORCE CHARACTERISTICS

As the summary table indicates, the total Saskatchewan population declined to approximately 926,000 (1971 Census) on June 1, 1971. After reaching a peak of about 960,000 in 1968, the population has declined rapidly as employment opportunities have contracted. The population decline, largely attributable to out-migration of people in the younger age categories, has been reinforced by a declining rate of natural increase. The province's total population in 1971 stood at a level comparable to that of 1961. Prospects for 1972 are for a reduction in the rate of decline relative to 1971. As of June 1, 1972, Saskatchewan's population stood at about 916,000 (Statistics Canada estimate). By the end of 1972, Saskatchewan's population will be approximately 915,000.

Saskatchewan's total labour force declined slightly in 1971 to 348,000 persons, down from 350,000 in 1970. In 1972, it is expected that the total labour force will remain the same as last year.

Unemployment rates in 1971 declined to 3.7 per cent from a rate of 4.3 per cent in 1970. Even though the value of provincial output looks promising for 1972, the average unemployment rate is likely to be approximately the same as in 1970. This is largely due to the general state of the Canadian economy.

2. PERSONAL INCOME

Total personal income (as a measure of payments to individual components in the economic system) experienced a strong recovery in 1971. Personal income increased from \$2,252 million in 1970 to about \$2,690 million in 1971. An analysis of the individual components indicates that the strongest incremental contribution was made by farm income, which in 1971 increased by about 1.8 times its 1970 value. These levels represent a recovery from an extremely low position to one which is more in line with the long-term average performance for the farm sector. While sustained improvements were recorded by wages and salaries, increases were not of the magnitude experienced by farm income.

For 1972, total personal income will likely be in the order of \$3 billion. With continued growth in all sectors, particularly agriculture, this level is not overly optimistic.

3. NET VALUE OF COMMODITY PRODUCTION

As a measure of basic economic activity, net value of commodity production in Saskatchewan recorded strong gains in 1971 (\$1,763 million) compared to 1970 (\$1,330 million). The low level recorded in 1970 was due primarily to reduced production in the agricultural sector. Total value of primary economic activity in 1971 was fairly well divided between agricultural and non-agricultural sectors. However, the agricultural sector made the strongest incremental contribution to primary economic activity between 1970 and 1971. The agricultural sector experienced a 71 per cent improvement over its 1970 value, compared with a 7.8 per cent gain by other sectors. Other sectors recorded small but sustained improvements in their performance in 1971.

With respect to 1972, total net value of commodity production will likely approach the \$2 billion mark, with agriculture responsible for about one-half of this value. The balance will be due to small improvements in categories within the non-agricultural sector (mining and construction in particular). Beyond 1972, gains are likely to be constrained by the decline in grain inventories. However, this situation may be neutralized to some extent as livestock marketings are expected to continue their recent surge.

4. AGRICULTURE

Realized farm net income reflects the level of income available to farmers after deducting depreciation and operating expenses (including interest payments). In 1971, farmers received realized farm net income of \$356 million, almost twice that of 1970.

Farm cash receipts (a measure of total cash payments made to farmers) also showed strong improvements in 1971 (\$912 million) over levels recorded in 1970 (\$726 million).

In 1972, realized farm net income can be expected to reach the \$450 million level, with farm cash receipts over \$1 billion.

5. VALUE OF MINERAL PRODUCTION

Historically, the total value of mineral production has registered small but consistent increases. In 1971, total value of all minerals stood at \$429 million. The largest contributor within this category is fuels, with \$237 million of sales.

In 1972, small gains should be made in total mineral production, with strong improvements recorded by potash as marketings of this mineral point to expansion on a sustained basis. Total value of mineral production in 1972 will likely be in the order of \$440 million.

6. OIL PRODUCTION, DEVELOPMENT AND EXPLORATION

The Prairie oil industry is in a state of consolidation as major oil explorations and developments shift to areas outside the Prairie region, and especially to the Arctic region. In Saskatchewan the number of oil wells completed and licences issued in 1971 declined substantially compared to 1970 levels.

While the volume of oil production declined slightly, price increases on crude more than offset the physical production decline to leave the value of crude oil sales with a gain of 9 per cent over 1970 (\$219 million in 1971, compared to \$201 million in 1970).

Explorations are expected to continue their decline in 1972, and crude oil sales will likely not exceed \$210 million.

7. ELECTRIC POWER

Saskatchewan experienced only marginal gains in power generation (6,037 million KWH in 1971 compared to 5,988 million KWH in 1970). Expansion was from existing facilities, rather than from any new generating plants coming on stream.

Power generation in 1972 will not substantially exceed 1971 levels.

8. MANUFACTURING

Manufacturing continues to make small but consistent gains from year to year. In 1971, value of factory shipments reached \$576 million compared to \$545 million the year previous.

Should various prospects associated with processing of agricultural products, such as meat packing and dairy product expansions, develop in 1972, the value of manufacturing shipments in 1972 could reach \$605 million.

9. CONSTRUCTION AND HOUSING

The value of construction in Saskatchewan recovered in 1971 (\$524 million) after a severe decline in 1970 (\$475 million). A resurgence in housing construction, including substantial public expenditures on residential buildings, is largely responsible for this recovery.

Construction prospects for 1972 are optimistic, with a continuation of public and private expenditures on housing, expansion of educational and community

facilities (assisted by federal and provincial grants and loans), and accelerated expenditures associated with the Wollaston Lake Uranium project. Private construction could be dampened somewhat as the result of an increase in interest rates on mortgage funds, which occurred in the spring of 1972. Frequent work stoppages throughout mid-1972 could further cause the total value of construction to fall short of anticipated values. Despite these limiting influences, the total value of construction could reach \$550 million in 1972.

In 1971, Saskatchewan experienced a resurgence in housing after a sharp decline in 1970. With a backlog of demand, coupled with more favourable interest rates on mortgage funds during 1971, dwelling starts jumped to 3,560 units in 1971 as opposed to only 1,743 units in the previous year.

In view of the continued rural-urban population shift, 1972 dwelling starts will likely remain close to their 1971 levels.

10. PRIVATE AND PUBLIC INVESTMENT

Total capital investments in 1971 also experienced a sharp resurgence after a substantial decline in 1970. The main contributor to investment gains was new capital expenditures, although solid increases were recorded for repair investments.

Total investments in 1972 should surpass the \$1 billion mark as major developments get fully under way. Expanded investments in enterprises closely related to growth in the agricultural sector should also reinforce investment prospects in 1972 and subsequent years.

11. RETAIL TRADE

The level of retail trade activity is closely associated with the rate of expansion in the basic income generating sectors. Furthermore, a lag in expenditures on retail goods sometimes exists because of consumer pessimism and/or the durability of certain products. Retail trade in 1971 rebounded from the decline incurred in 1970 (\$1,018 million) to \$1,139 million in 1971.

With improved prospects for most basic sectors in 1972 (particularly agriculture), retail trade should experience gains to a level of \$1,275 million.

12. FARM IMPLEMENT SALES

Sales of farm machinery in 1971 showed signs of recovering from the lows experienced in 1969 and 1970. Investments in farm machinery, postponed in the two previous years because of cash shortages, are starting to recover as farmers generally find themselves in a more favourable cash position.

With the momentum gained in 1971, and the prospect for improved crop and livestock sales in the foreseeable future, farm implement sales in 1972 are likely to go beyond \$100 million.

13. GENERAL OVERVIEW AND PROSPECTS FOR 1972

The Saskatchewan economy, in aggregate terms, is continuing to recover from the depressed economic circumstances which prevailed in the late sixties. While the non-agricultural sectors continued to develop at their historical rates, the improved economic perfor-

mance of the provincial economy is largely attributable to expanded wheat, feed grain and oilseed sales, and to more buoyant livestock markets. The improvements in the agricultural sector represent a basic recovery to levels experienced in the mid-1960's and therefore do not represent an expansion above long-term averages.

Despite the improved growth in 1971, and the projected growth in 1972, the performance and employment capacity of the Saskatchewan economy continue to be hampered by significant adjustment forces in both its agricultural and non-agricultural sectors. In agriculture, technological change, working through increased mechanization and farm size, is having an adverse effect on farm numbers. Job creation in primary agricultural production is, therefore, continually declining. In the non-agricultural sectors, centralizing forces in other parts of Canada limit the rate of expansion in employment within Saskatchewan, often as a result of branch plant decisions of large national companies who choose to consolidate their operations in centres outside the province.

These forces are important constraints that impede the rate at which the provincial economy can grow and provide employment. Even though 1971 was a year of improved economic activity, the increase was not of the magnitude or diversity required to employ all of the people seeking jobs. The net result of this was continued out-migration of people seeking job opportunities elsewhere.

Prospects for 1972 are for continued aggregate improvement in Saskatchewan's economic activity. As in 1971, this year's expansion is spurred on by significant improvements in farm sales. In addition, it can be expected that those sectors closely related to agriculture (service and retailing) will also show significant gains as the lag in farm expenditures reaches these sectors.

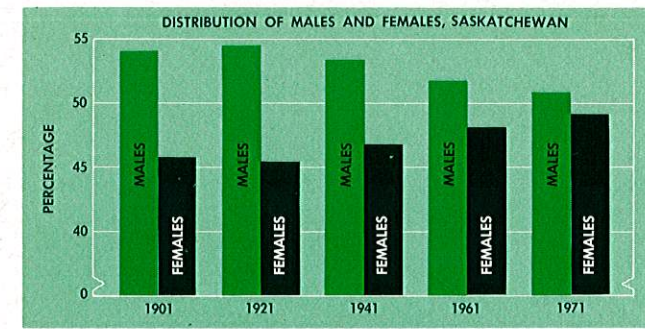
There is no guarantee, however, that the level of income from grain sales can be maintained beyond 1972 (particularly if current prices prevail in the future), since a significant proportion of current sales are out of inventory. A less rapid, but more stable growth in the agricultural sector will likely emerge from the livestock sector of agriculture in which long-term market prospects are optimistic.

Prospects in the non-agricultural sectors continue to improve for 1972, but on a more stable, less dramatic basis than in the agricultural sector. Indicators are that for 1972 growth in these sectors will be based on gradual expansion of existing activities as markets show signs of improvement.

The rate of total economic growth in 1972 will be greater than that of 1971. Nevertheless, structural adjustments in both agriculture and other sectors will result in a relatively slow rate of job increases.

The preceding brief analysis does not give the entire picture of the Saskatchewan economy as it affects the lives of Saskatchewan people. It is a more traditional analysis which concentrates on overall growth measures, and does not take fully into account the distribution of the benefits of developing economic activity among the population. In the future, we hope to present a more complete picture of the economic well-being of individual Saskatchewan residents and their families.

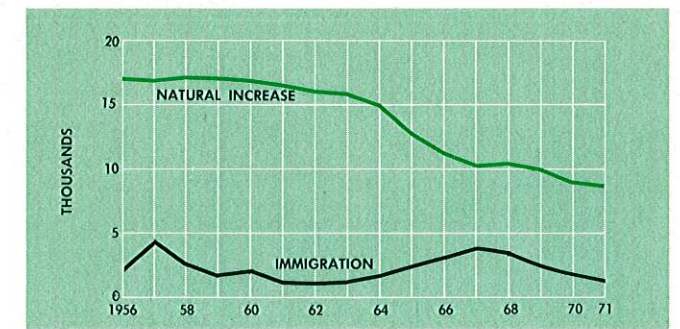
Table 1: POPULATION, Canada, and Saskatchewan by Sex

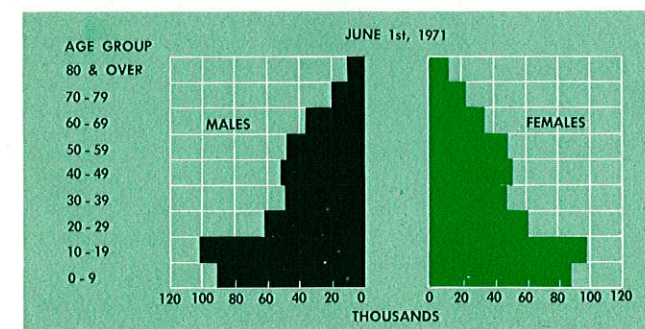

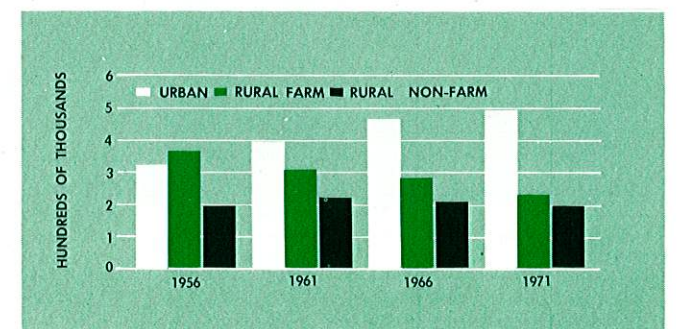
Table 3: POPULATION, Saskatchewan Distribution by Age Groups

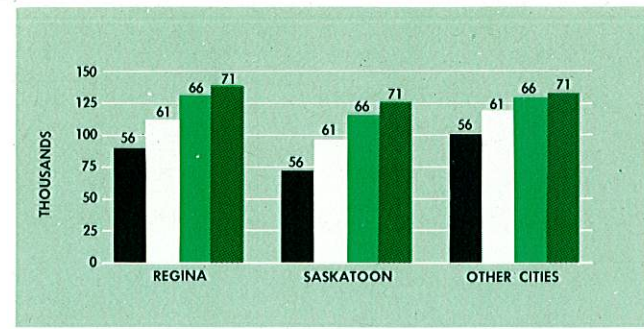

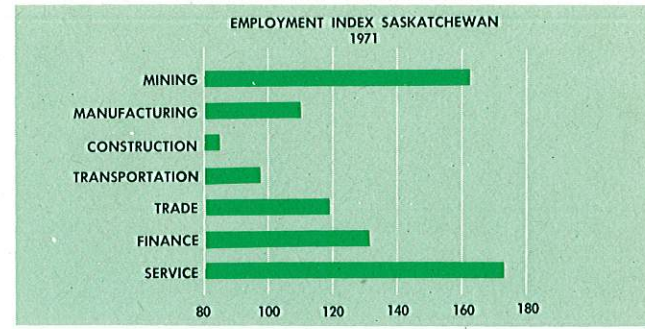

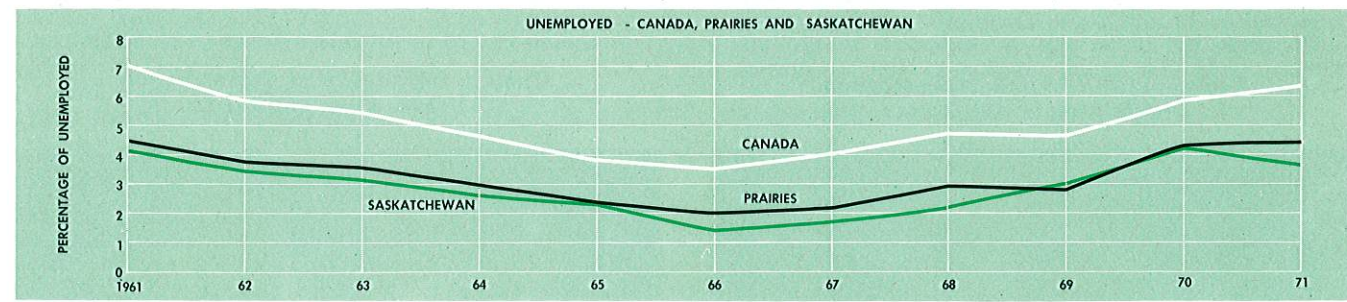
Table 6: INDEX OF EMPLOYMENT¹, (1961 = 100), by Industries, Saskatchewan

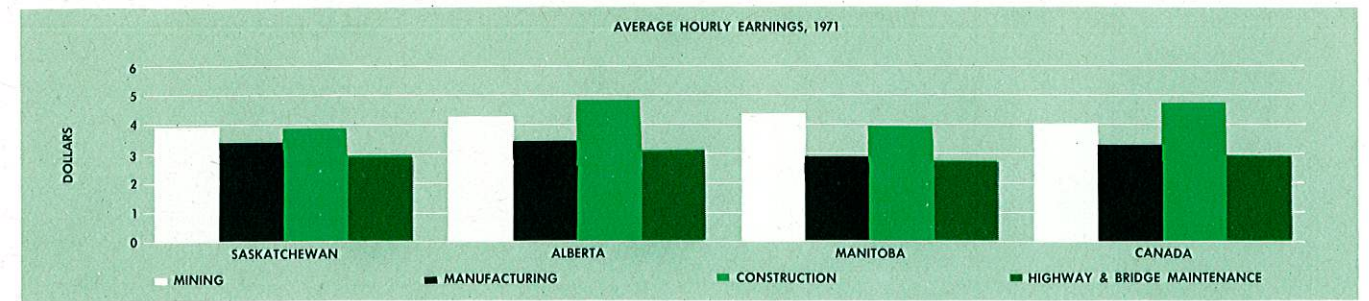

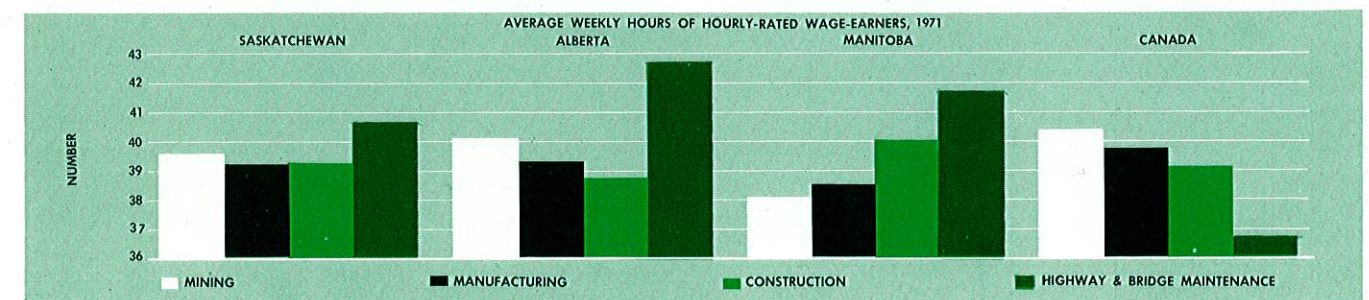

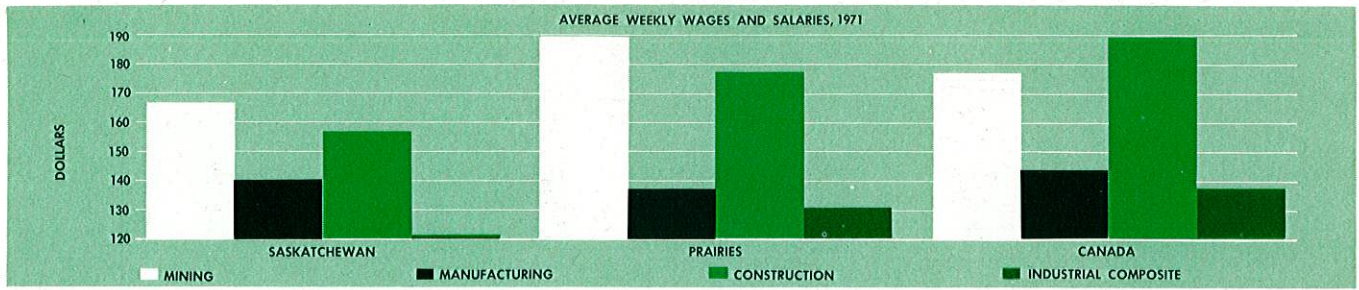

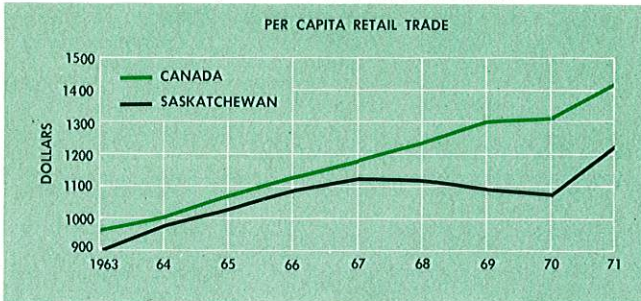

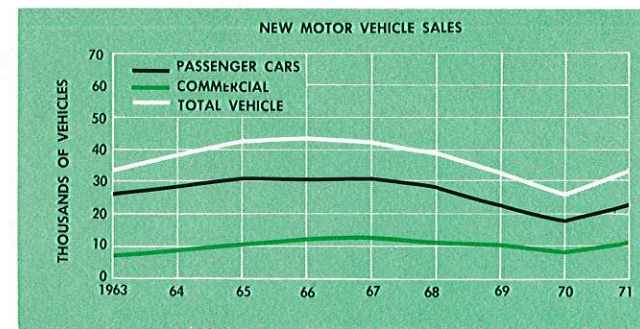

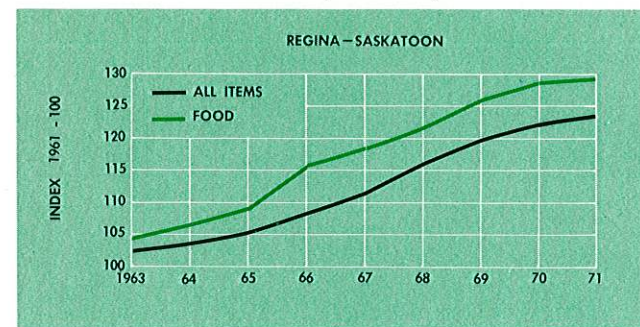

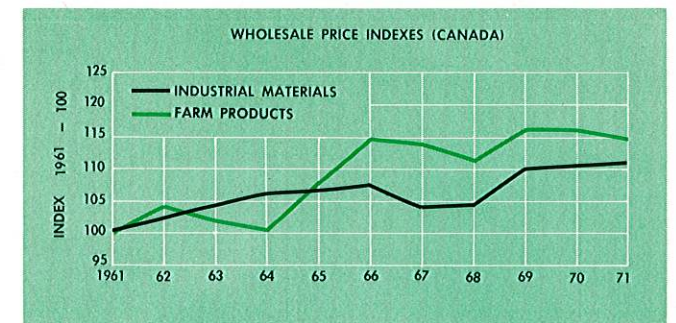

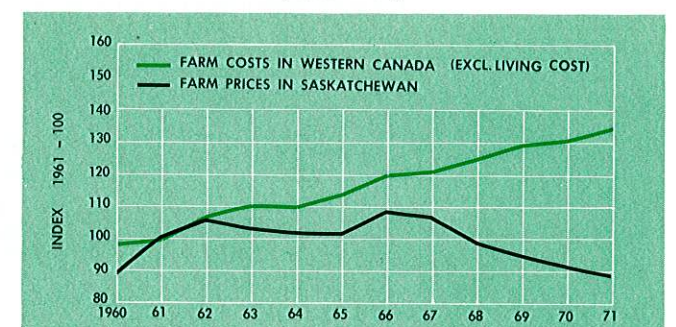

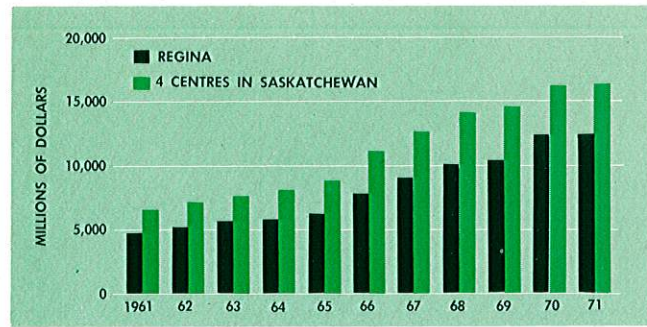

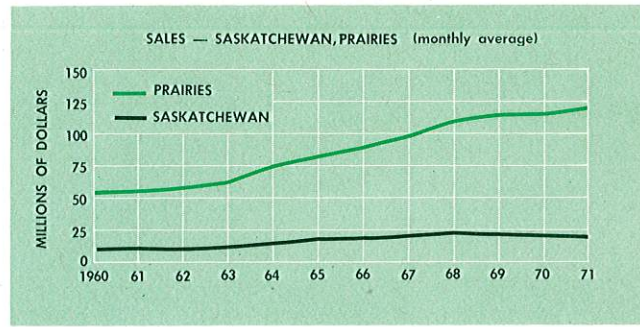

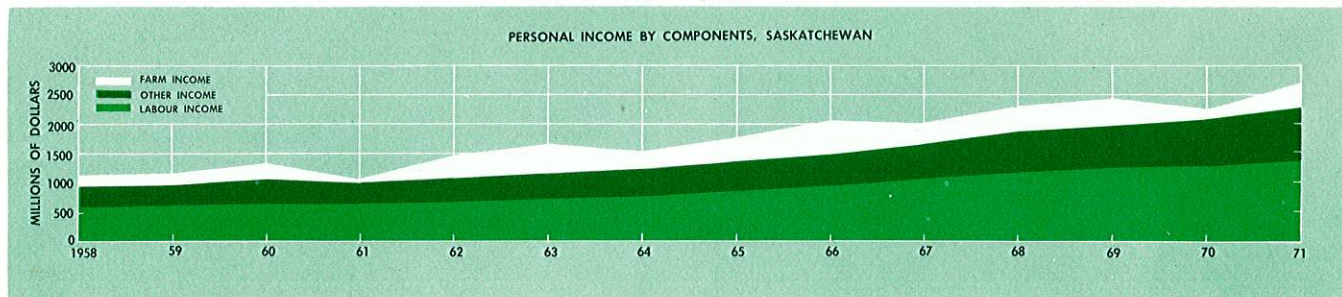

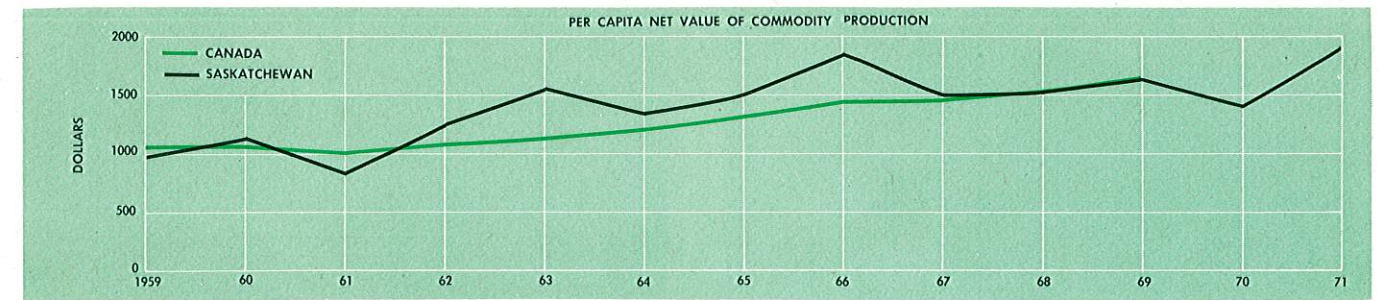

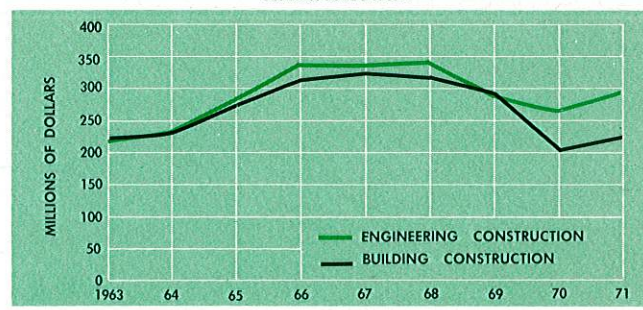

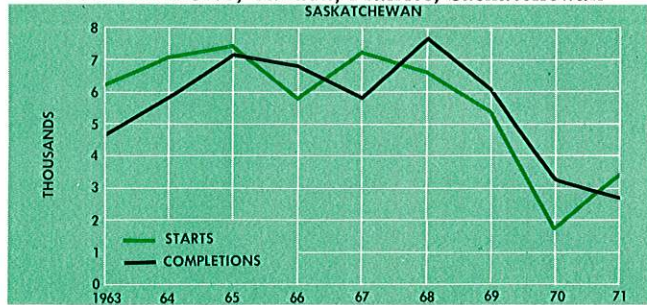

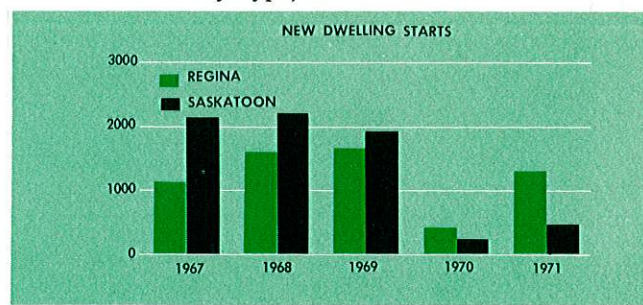

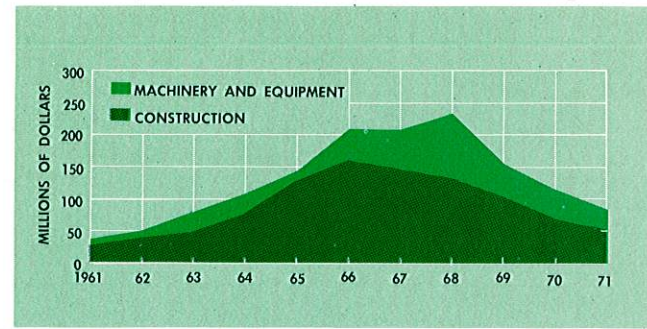

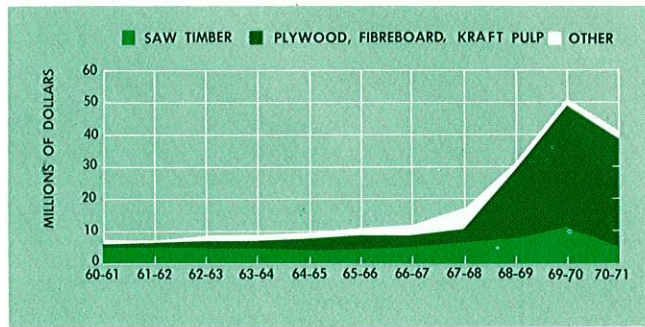

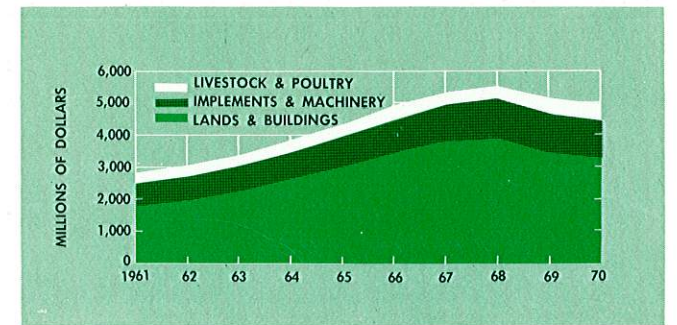

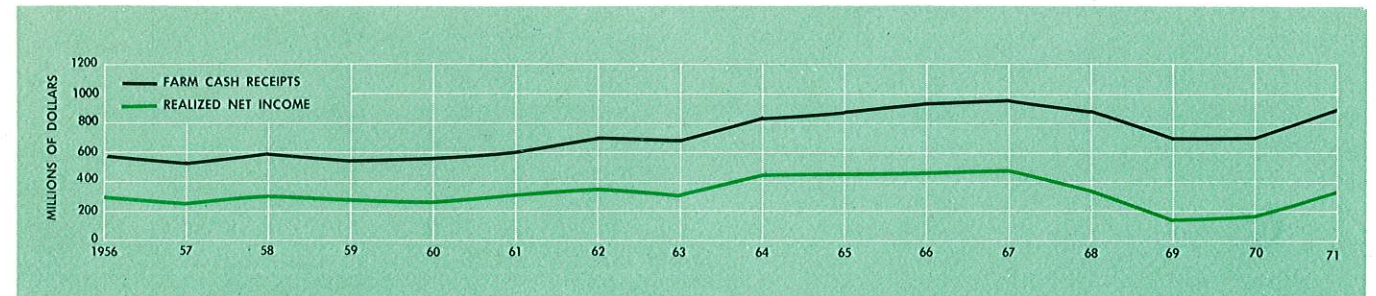

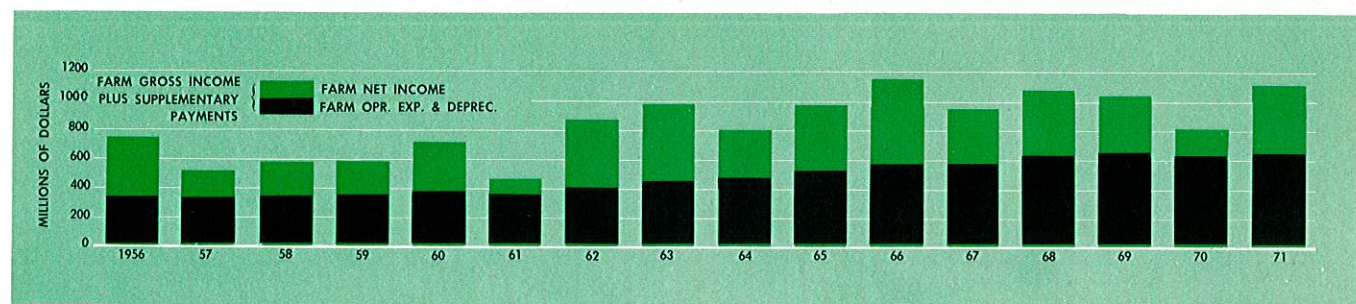

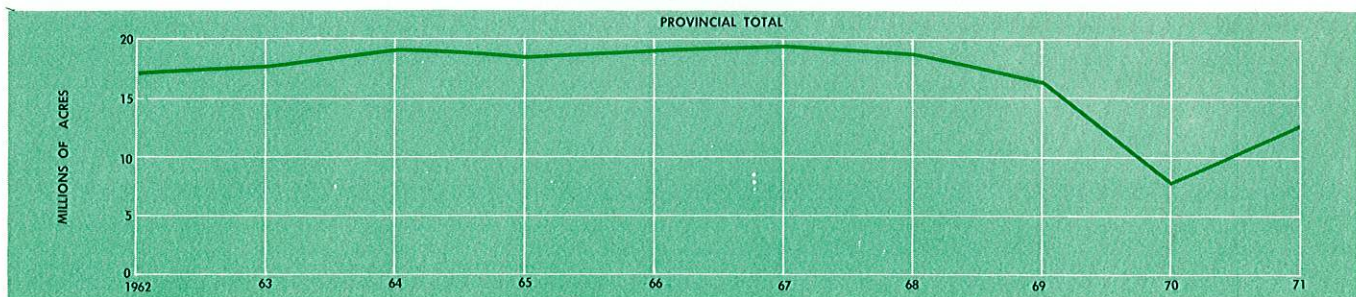

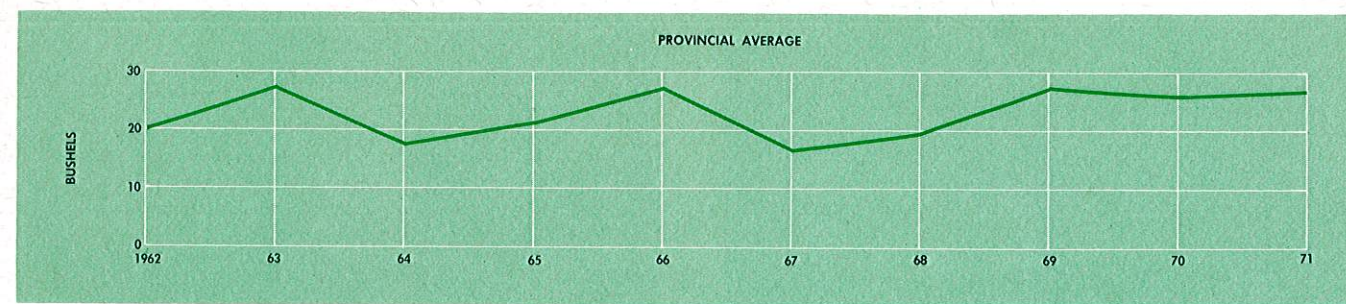

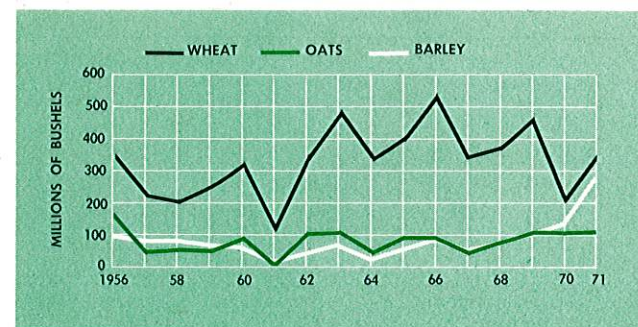

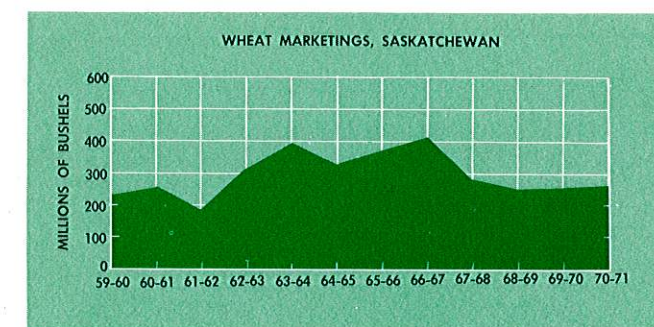

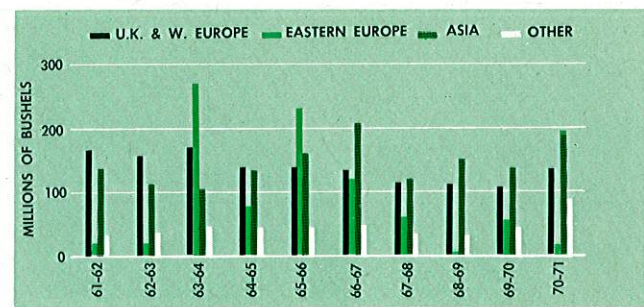

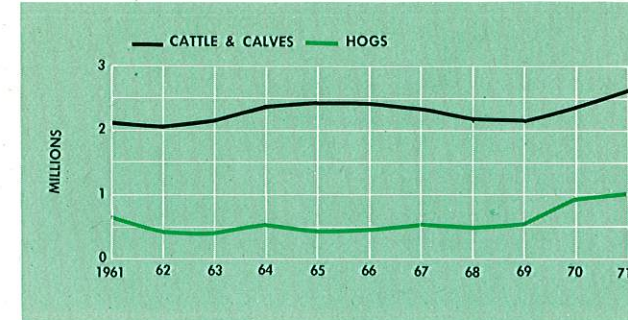

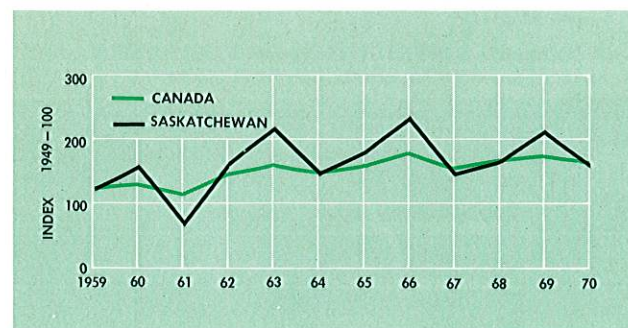

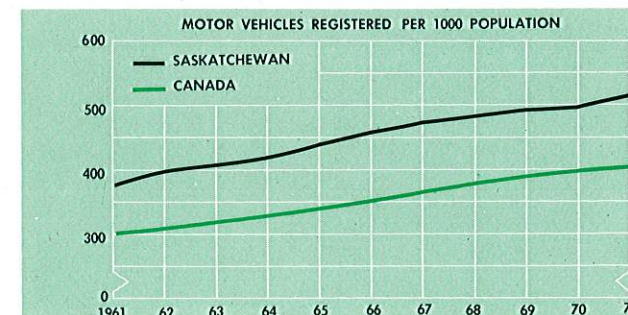

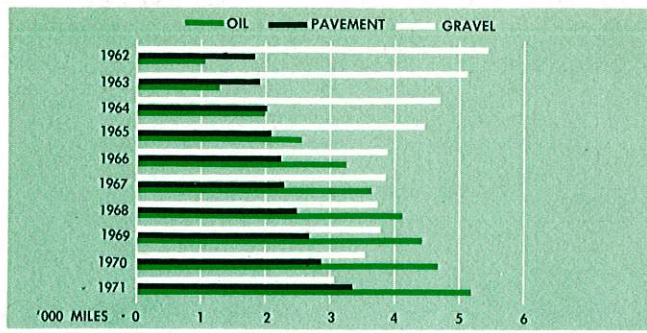

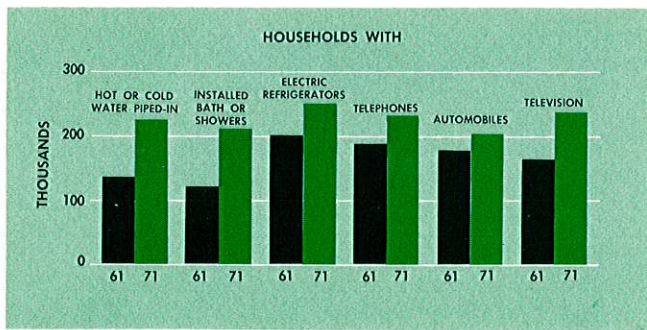

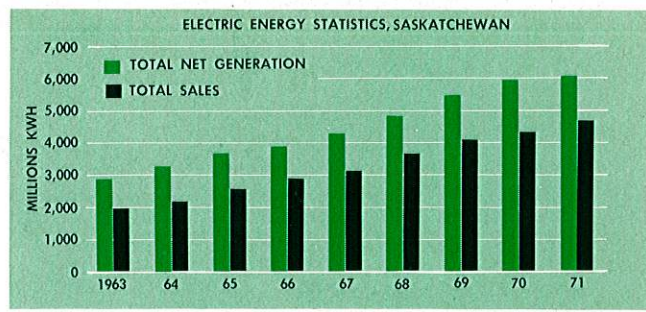

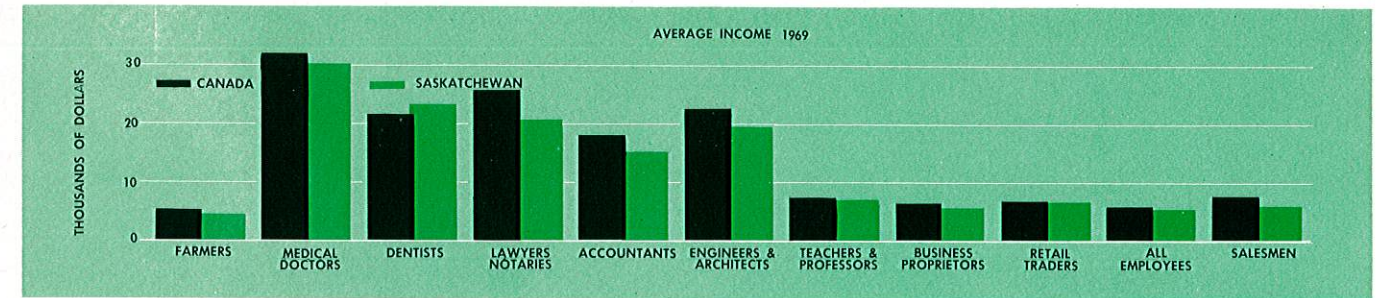

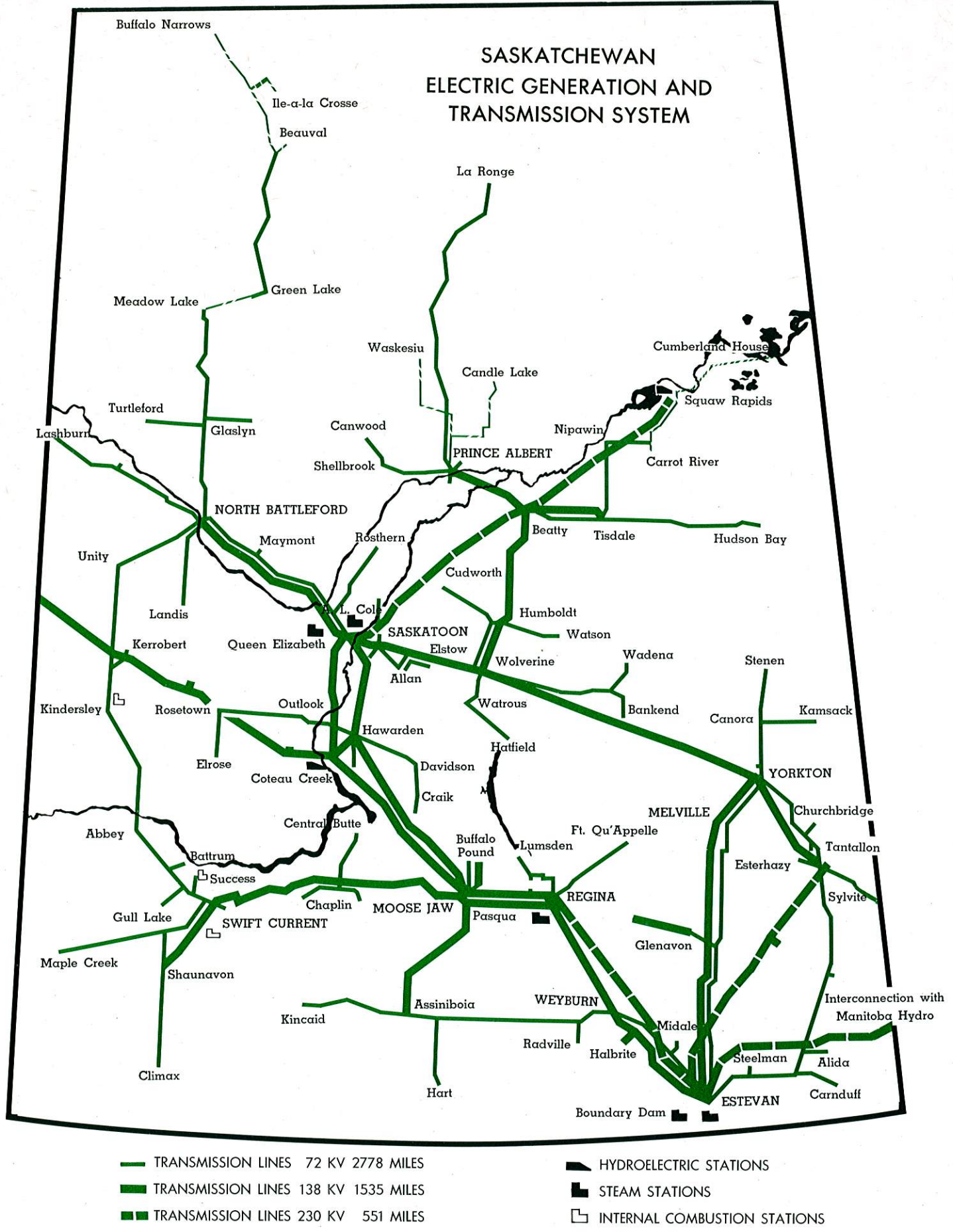
SASKATCHEWAN BY CROP DISTRICTS

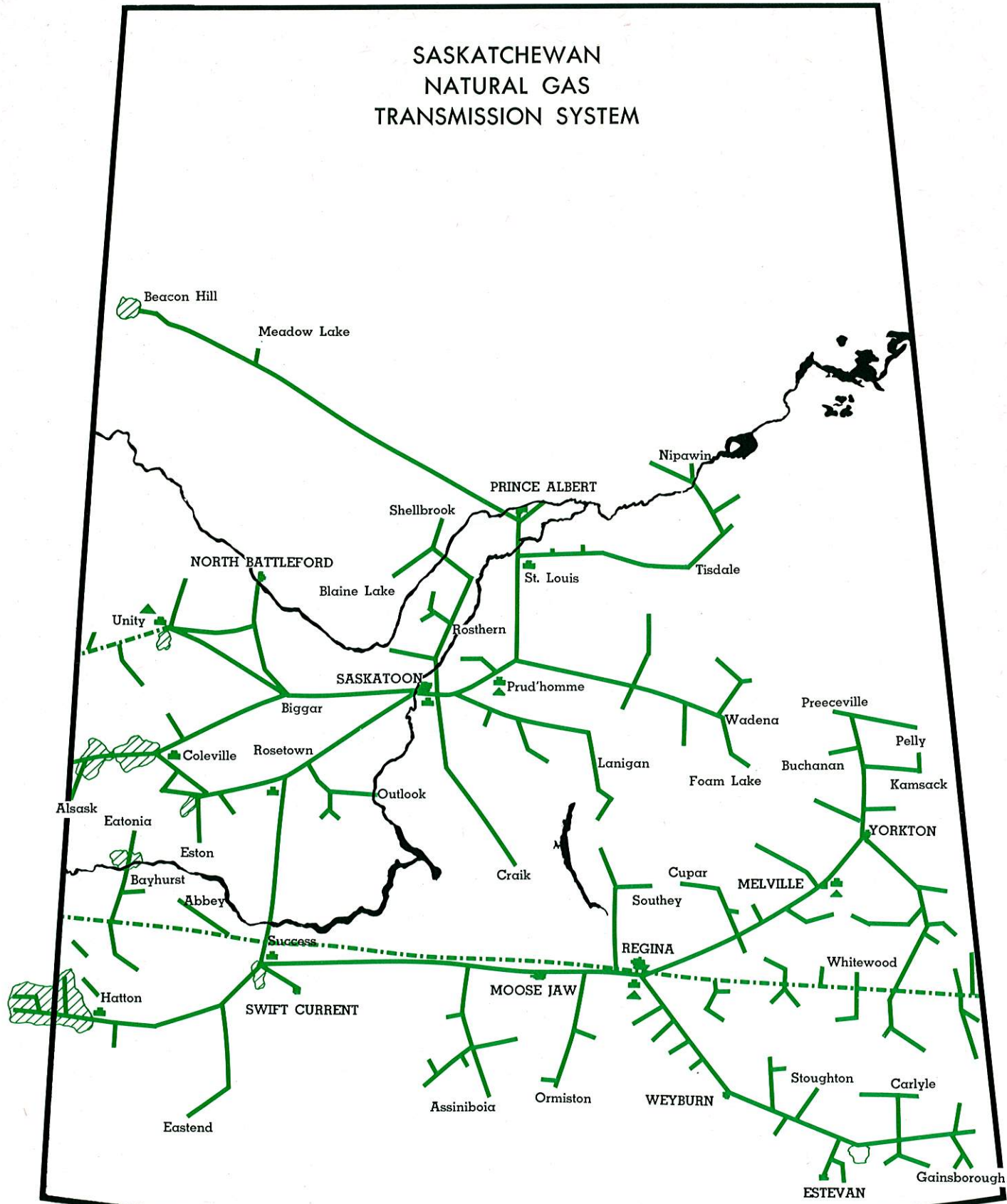
