Dear Victor Fern:

The 2022-23 Budget is focused on Saskatchewan being *back on track*, with a fiscal plan to return the budget to balance. Our resurgent economy and sound fiscal management ensure the services, programs, and infrastructure investments Saskatchewan people value are sustainable today and into the future.

In 2022-23, the Government of Saskatchewan will continue to invest in the second year of our multi-year funding commitment in post-secondary education. This four-year commitment to the sector supports your continued efforts to improve long-term financial sustainability at your institution. We look forward to learning more about how your multi-year funding initiatives progress over the next year and we applaud your commitment to achieving the priorities of *Saskatchewan's Growth Plan for the Next Decade of Growth 2020-2030*.

This year, we are pleased to provide a total investment of \$14,950,700 for Northlands College, which includes \$440,000 in accordance with the multi-year funding commitment negotiated last year. The following appendices provide additional details about government's investment and its intended uses:

- Appendix 1 – Detailed Schedule of Funding; and,
- Appendix 2 – Targeted Funding.

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Ministry officials will be in contact with representatives at your institution to discuss the following accountability requirements and due dates for 2022-23:

- **Agreement to Submit Required Accountability Reports** – due April 15, 2022 (as per Eligibility Criteria 1 in the “Saskatchewan Post-Secondary Multi-Year Operating Funding Memorandum of Understanding”);
- **Multi-Year Business Plan** – due May 2, 2022 (40 days after budget allocation notification);
- **Multi-Year Funding Accountability Reports** – two reports, one due with Multi-Year Business Plan submission due May 2, 2022, and the other due by January 31, 2023, (as per Eligibility Criteria 2 and 3 in the MOU); and,
- **Performance Framework Reports** – due June 30, 2022, and January 31, 2023.

Post-secondary education and skills training are crucial to Saskatchewan’s post-pandemic economic recovery. We look forward to our ongoing work together.

APPENDIX 2

Targeted Funding

Northlands College

Operating Funding

For 2022-23, the Ministry of Advanced Education will provide Northlands College \$6,947,700 in operating funding. This contribution includes \$438,000 to assist with collective bargaining agreement and salary support costs, and \$440,000 for the second-year provision of the Multi-Year Funding Allocation.

Higher Education Enterprise Resource Planning Project

Although not reflected in your Budget Letter, the Government of Saskatchewan has provided Carlton Trail College with \$2,900,000 in project funding to administer on behalf of all regional colleges and Gabriel Dumont Institute for the implementation of a comprehensive Higher Education Enterprise Resource Planning System. The new system will support current and future business requirements (e.g., student information system, human resource, and finance components) to meet student and institution needs.

University Programming and Services

The 2022-23 Budget includes \$2,658,000 in targeted funding to support the continuation of university programs coordinated by Northlands College. This total does not include \$365,500 paid by Advanced Education directly to the Ministry of SaskBuilds and Procurement for the Mistasinihk Place lease.

Training Programs and Services

Essential Skills Programming

For 2022-23, Northlands College will be provided with a total of \$2,240,000 for the delivery of Adult Basic Education, Adult Basic Education-Essential Skills for the Workplace and On-Reserve Adult Basic Education. This funding is intended to support adult learners to develop basic employment skills, increase education and/or certification levels and gain prerequisites for further training that will lead to labour market attachment.

Skills Training Allocation

For 2022-23, Northlands College will be provided with \$2,110,000 for Skills Training funding. The Skills Training Allocation is for the delivery of accredited training programs that meet the labour market needs of employers across various sectors in your region and of the provincial economy.

Northern Skills Training

For 2022-23, the Ministry of Immigration and Career Training will provide Northlands College \$520,000 in funding for Northern Skills Training, which is a reduction from previous fiscal years to bring this allocation in line with recent annual expenditures. Northlands College may use restricted Northern Skills Training reserve funds to offset the reduction and expend up to the previous program allocation of \$1,373,000, thereby maintaining the total investment in the North. The Northern Skills Training funding is for the delivery of training programs to meet labour market priorities in northern Saskatchewan. Northlands College has been granted the role of administrator to allocate and collaborate with other institutions to deliver education and skills training programming in the North. The Ministry of Immigration and Career Training is

working with Northlands College to formalize the program policy and procedures and enhance outcomes reporting to demonstrate the success of this program. Additionally, Northlands College will be provided with \$360,000 for the Northern Health Initiative.

Provincial Training Allowance

Effective July 1, 2022, the province will launch a new training incentive to replace the Provincial Training Allowance program. The Ministry of Immigration and Career Training will continue to work with training institutions to administer the program and provide benefits to low-income learners enrolled in eligible Adult Basic Education and workforce development programs from April 1 to June 30, 2022. When the program transitions to the Ministry of Social Services in July 2022, they will oversee the administration of client benefits and your institution will no longer be required to manage a shadow allocation.

Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunity Scholarship

The 2022-23 Budget includes \$5,000 targeted funding for the Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunity Scholarship, which will be disbursed to your institution in October 2022.

Post-secondary institutions are required to report annual Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunity Scholarship activity from July 1st to June 30th of each year and will have until July 31st to submit their reporting to the Ministry of Advanced Education. Institutions are to advise the Ministry in writing by June 30th of their priorities for scholarships over the upcoming year and include the areas of study and student categories the institution will focus on.

Annual allocations are subject to budget appropriation and are based on each institution's ability to match funds in the previous year. The Ministry of Advanced Education will revisit the Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunity Scholarship reporting and fundraising progress with all institutions prior to the 2023-24 Budget.

Capital Funding

The 2022-23 Budget includes \$110,000 in Preventative Maintenance and Renewal funding for Northlands College. Reporting on this allocation will be developed in year. Your base allocation plus any individual projects that have received approval and funding are shown below.
