MRO 235/91 PB 36. Pursuant to section 17 of *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act*, MRO 45/90 PB 6, published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* on April 20, 1990, is rescinded effective September 1, 1991, and it is ordered that the area comprising the lands described is designated and identified as the area of a gas pool named the “Bigstick Second White Specks Gas Pool”, effective September 1, 1991.

BIGSTICK SECOND WHITE SPECKS GAS POOL

MRO 236/91 PO 33. Pursuant to section 17 of *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act*, MRO 43/90 PO 9, published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* on April 20, 1990, is rescinded effective September 1, 1991, and it is ordered that the pool provisions set forth in this schedule shall apply to the drilling of and production from gas wells in the "Bigstick Second White Specks Gas Pool", effective on and after September 1, 1991.

Dated at Regina, Sask., August 19, 1991.

Schedule

Pool provisions applicable to the drilling of and production from gas wells in the Bigstick Second White Specks Gas Pool.

Interpretation

1 These provisions shall be construed with reference to the terms and expressions contained in *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act* and the regulations made pursuant to that Act as amended from time to time.

Drainage Unit

2 The drainage unit for the drilling and completion of a gas well shall be:

(a) one Section for wells drilled except within the areas described in clauses 4(a), (b), (c) and (d);

(b) the fractional Section containing approximately 140 hectares within the area described in clause 4(a);

(c) the north half of a Section and the south half of a Section within the area described in clauses 4(b) and (d);

(d) the fractional north half of a Section and the fractional south half of a Section containing approximately 105 hectares within the area described in clause 4(c).

Target Area

3 The target area shall be inside the drainage unit and have sides located 500 m from and parallel to the corresponding sides of the drainage unit, except for the areas described in clauses 4(a), (b), (c) and (d).

4(a) For lands lying West of the Third Meridian in Saskatchewan:

in Township 15, in Range 30: fractional Sections 1 and 12.

(i) the west side of the target area shall be located 609 m from the east side of the drainage unit.

(ii) the east, north and south sides of the target area shall be located 200 m from the east, north and south sides of the south-east quarter in the Section, respectively.

(b) For lands lying West of the Third Meridian in Saskatchewan:

in Township 12, in Range 25: Sections 17 to 20 and 29 to 32;

in Township 13, in Range 25: Sections 3 to 10, 15, 16, 21 and 22;

in Township 12, in Range 26: Sections 13 to 36;

in Township 13, in Range 26: Sections 4 and 5;

in Township 12, in Range 27: Sections 13 to 17, 19 to 27, and 34 to 36;

in Township 12, in Range 28: Section 24;

in Township 13, in Range 28: Sections 6, 7, 17 to 19 and 29 to 35;

in Township 13, in Range 29: All Sections;

in Township 14, in Range 29: Sections 1 to 6;

in Township 13, in Range 30: Sections 1, 12, 13, 24, 25 and 36;

in Township 14, in Range 30: Sections 1, 12, 13, 24, 25 and 36.

(i) in the drainage unit consisting of the north half of the Section, the sides of the target area shall be located 200 m from the corresponding sides of the north-east quarter of the Section.

(ii) in the drainage unit consisting of the south half of the Section, the sides of the target area shall be located 200 m from the corresponding sides of the south-west quarter of the Section.

(c) For lands lying West of the Third Meridian in Saskatchewan:

in Township 13, in Range 30: fractional Sections 2, 11, 14, 23, 26 and 35;

in Township 14, in Range 30: fractional Sections 2, 11, 14, 23, 26 and 35.

(i) the east and west sides of the target area shall be located 406 m from the east and west sides of the drainage unit respectively;

(ii) the north and south sides of the target area shall be located 200 m from the north and south sides of the drainage unit respectively.

(d) For lands lying West of the Third Meridian in Saskatchewan:

in Township 12, in Range 27: Sections 28 to 33;

in Township 13, in Range 27: Sections 4 to 9, 15 to 21 and 28 to 30;

in Township 12, in Range 28: Sections 25 to 27 and 33 to 36;

in Township 13, in Range 28: Sections 1 to 5, 8 to 16 and 20 to 28.

(i) in the drainage unit consisting of the north half of the Section, the target area shall be a square with sides of 235 m situated in the north-east corner of legal subdivision 16 in a Section;

(ii) in the drainage unit consisting of the south half of the Section, the target area shall be a square with sides of 235 m situated in the north-east corner of legal subdivision 6 in a Section;

(iii) the approval of the Rural Municipality shall be obtained prior to drilling a well closer than 75 m to a road allowance but no wells shall be drilled within 35 m of a road allowance.

Off-Target Allowables

5 The production allowable for a drainage unit as established shall be modified according to the

principles set out in *The Oil and Gas Conservation Regulations, 1985* if a well is drilled outside of the target area prescribed in Sections 3 and 4.

Production Allowables

6 Unless otherwise ordered by the minister, wells drilled within the target area and producing from the Bigstick Second White Specks Gas Pool shall not be subject to a production allowable with the exception of the following off-target gas wells which shall produce in accordance with their latest established Daily Allowable:

Coseka et al Hatton 6-20-14-26; and

Coseka et al Hatton 4-9-14-27.

Status of Off-Pattern Wells

7 Unless otherwise ordered by the minister, wells previously drilled within the target area for a one Section drainage unit shall be considered as being on-target within the reduced spacing area as described in clauses 4(b) and (d).

Flow Testing

8 Unless otherwise ordered by the minister, every well shall be flow tested prior to being placed on production with testing requirements as follows:

(a) for all wells except those located within the area described in clauses 4(b), (c) and (d), the test shall be in accordance with section 73 of *The Oil and Gas Conservation Regulations, 1985*;

(b) for all wells located within the area described in clauses 4(b), (c) and (d), the test shall be a single point flow test of a minimum duration of 48 hours followed by a buildup or any other test as may be approved by the minister.

Logging Requirements

9 For all gas wells drilled the operator shall have taken as minimum requirement an approved density-neutron-gamma ray combination log or standard electric log excluding contact logs, from surface casing shoe to total depth.

Special Provisions

10 These provisions shall be subject to such special provisions as may be established by order of the minister.

ROSEBANK SOUTH ALIDA BEDS POOL — HORIZONTAL WELL PROJECT

MRO 238/91. Minister's Approval MA 51/90, dated May 23, 1990, is rescinded and the application submitted by Novalta Resources Inc. to conduct a horizontal well project in the Rosebank South Alida Beds Pool is approved pursuant to *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act*, and permission is granted to construct the facilities and to drill and complete one well with a proposed horizontal section of up to 600 m in the Alida Beds underlying legal subdivisions 1 and 8 of Section 26, in Township 4, in Range 32, West of the First Meridian, in accordance with plans and specifications filed with Saskatchewan Energy and Mines as Document No. H.W. 19 and subject to the following provisions:

1 The horizontal well shall not be subject to the provisions of MRO 112/86 A 67 or to the target area and production allowable provisions of

MRO 99/89 PO 17. Production shall be limited to what can, on the basis of technical parameters, be produced without adversely and significantly affecting the ultimate recovery of oil or the opportunity of other owners to obtain their share of production from the pool. The minister may assign a numeric production allowable if there is evidence, satisfactory to the minister, that inequitable drainage is occurring or ultimate recovery is being adversely affected.

2 Without the consent of all potentially affected owners, no portion of the horizontal section is to be located closer than 100 m from lands where the mineral or working interest ownership differs from that within the lands where the horizontal section of the well is situated.

3 Annual progress reports for the project shall be submitted to the Engineering Services Branch of Saskatchewan Energy and Mines.

INGOLDSBY EAST ALIDA BEDS POOL

MRO 247/91 PB 37. Pursuant to section 17 of *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act*, MRO 201/91 PB 30 published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* on August 2, 1991 is rescinded effective September 1, 1991, and it is ordered that the area comprising the lands described below is designated and identified as the area of an oil and gas pool named the "Ingoldsbys East Alida Beds Pool."

1 Installations shall be subject to the approval of a field representative of the Department prior to the commencement of salt water injection and subsequent to any modifications to such installations.

2 The wellhead injection pressure shall be limited to a maximum of 10 300 kilopascals.

3 All injection volumes shall be metered with a Department approved method.

This approval does not authorize the applicant to dispose of salt water without the consent of all the mineral owners, other than the Crown, that might reasonably be adversely affected by such disposal.

MIDALE CENTRAL FROBISHER BEDS POOL — OFF-TARGET WELL

MRO 246/91 A 86. The Department of Energy and Mines has received no objections regarding the application by Saskatchewan Oil and Gas Corporation for waiver of the off-target penalty for the proposed off-target Frobisher Beds oil well to be located in legal subdivision 12 of Section 14, in Township 5, in Range 12, West of the Second Meridian; and

It is deemed advisable to permit the company to drill the said off-target well and to waive the off-target penalty in determining a production allowable.

Pursuant to section 27 of *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act*, MRO 202/91 A 71 published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* on August 2, 1991, is rescinded and permission is granted to Saskatchewan Oil and Gas Corporation to drill the off-target well with waiver of the off-target penalty, to be located in legal subdivision 12 of Section 14, in Township 5, in Range 12, West of the Second Meridian in Saskatchewan.

INGOLDSBY FROBISHER-ALIDA BEDS POOL — HORIZONTAL WELL PROJECT

MRO 241/91. The application submitted by Tai Resources Ltd. to conduct a horizontal well project in the Ingoldsby Frobisher-Alida Beds Pool is approved pursuant to *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act*. Permission is granted to construct the facilities and to drill and complete one well with a proposed horizontal section of 500 m in the Frobisher-Alida Beds underlying legal subdivision 7 of Section 13, in Township 4, in Range 32, West of the First Meridian, in accordance with plans and specifications filed with Saskatchewan Energy and Mines as Document No. H.W. 75 and subject to the following provisions:

1 The horizontal well shall not be subject to the provisions of MRO 112/86 A 67 or to the target area and production allowable provisions of MRO 95/90 PO 14. Production shall be limited to what can, on the basis of technical parameters, be produced without adversely and significantly affecting the ultimate recovery of oil or the opportunity of other owners to obtain their share of production from the pool. The minister may assign a numeric production allowable if there is evidence, satisfactory to the minister, that inequitable drainage is occurring or ultimate recovery is being adversely affected.

2 Annual progress reports for the project shall be submitted to the Engineering Services Branch of Saskatchewan Energy and Mines.

OTHER AREAS — SALT WATER DISPOSAL

MRO 244/91. Pursuant to section 17.1 of *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act*, the application submitted by Koch Exploration Canada, Ltd. for disposing of salt water recovered from oilfield production by injection into the McLaren Sand through the well Koch Eyehill 8-25-39-27, located in legal subdivision 8 of Section 25, in Township 39, in Range 27, West of the Third Meridian in the Province of Saskatchewan, is approved all in accordance with plans and specifications filed with the Department as S.W.D. 342 and subject to the following conditions:

1 Installations shall be subject to the approval of a field representative of the Department prior to the commencement of salt water injection and subsequent to any modifications to such installations.

2 The wellhead injection pressure shall be limited to a maximum of 7 000 kilopascals.

3 All injection volumes shall be metered with a Department approved method.

4 The perforations in the Sparky Sand must be cement squeezed subject to the approval of the Department field office.

This approval does not authorize the applicant to dispose of salt water without the consent of all the mineral owners, other than the Crown, that might reasonably be adversely affected by such disposal.

KISBEY FROBISHER-ALIDA BEDS POOL

MRO 248/91 PO 34. Pursuant to section 17 of *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act*, MRO 229/88 PO 51, published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* on December 9, 1988 is rescinded and the pool provisions set forth in the following schedule shall apply to the drilling of and production from vertical oil wells in the Kisbey Frobisher-Alida Beds pool effective September 1, 1991.

Schedule

Pool provisions applicable to the drilling of and production from vertical oil wells in the Kisbey Frobisher-Alida Beds Pool.

Interpretation

1 These provisions shall be construed with reference to the terms and expressions contained in *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act* and the regulations made pursuant to this Act as amended from time to time.

Drainage Unit — Oil Wells

2 The drainage unit for the drilling and completion of an oil well shall comprise one legal subdivision in a Section.

Production Allowables — Oil Wells

3 The production allowable for a drainage unit as established shall be determined as follows:

(a) wells drilled and completed within the target area which are on production or capable of

production prior to the date of this order shall retain a production allowable based on an area of two legal subdivisions;

(b) wells drilled and completed after the date of this order within the target area shall have a production allowable based on an area of one legal subdivision for 12 months beginning with the first day of the month in which the well commences production. After this period the production allowable shall be based on an area of two legal subdivisions;

provided that, if a well is not completed within the target area as prescribed by section 5, the minister may prescribe the area to be used as a factor in determining the production allowable and may, upon application and after public notice, vary the prescribed area.

Target Area

4 The location of an oil well within a drainage unit shall be within the target area prescribed by section 5, or such other location within the drainage unit as may be approved by the minister.

5 The sides of the target area shall be 100 m within the corresponding sides of the drainage unit.

Samples

6(1) For the first well drilled in each Section the operator shall submit samples of the interval from the top of the Second White Specks to total depth.

(2) For all subsequent wells drilled in each section the operator shall submit samples of the interval from the top of the Paleozoic strata to total depth if such wells are intended to be drilled down to or below the top of the Bakken Formation.

Logs

7 For all wells drilled the operator shall have the following logs taken as a minimum requirement:

A resistivity log and either a sonic log or an approved radioactivity log from total depth to surface casing shoe.

Special Provisions

8 These pool provisions shall be subject to such special provisions as may be established by order of the minister.

BENNETT LAKE ALIDA BEDS POOL — HORIZONTAL WELL PROJECT

MRO 251/91. The application submitted by Wiliston Wildcatters Corporation to conduct a horizontal well project in the Bennett Lake Alida Beds Pool is approved pursuant to *The Oil and Gas Conservation Act*. Permission is granted to construct the facilities and to drill and complete one well with a proposed horizontal section of up to 600 m in the Alida Beds underlying the north-east quarter of Section 23, in Township 9, in Range 4, West of the Second Meridian, in accordance with plans and specifications filed with Saskatchewan Energy and Mines as Document No. H.W. 76 and subject to the following provisions:

1 The horizontal well shall not be subject to the provisions of MRO 112/86 A 67. Production shall be limited to what can, on the basis of technical

parameters, be produced without adversely and significantly affecting the ultimate recovery of oil or the opportunity of other owners to obtain their share of production from the pool. The minister may assign a numeric production allowable if there is evidence, satisfactory to the minister, that inequitable drainage is occurring or ultimate recovery is being adversely affected.

2 Without the consent of all potentially affected owners, no portion of the horizontal section is to be located closer than 100 m from lands where the mineral or working interest ownership differs from that within the lands where the horizontal section of the well is situated.

3 Annual progress reports for the project shall be submitted to the Engineering Services Branch of Saskatchewan Energy and Mines.

The Medical Profession Act, 1981**BYLAWS**

All bylaws enacted pursuant to *The Medical Profession Act, 1981* or any previous *Medical Profession Act* other than Bylaw 46 are repealed and the following substituted:

PART I — INTERPRETATION

In these bylaws, unless there is something in the subject of the context inconsistent therewith, the words:

"Act"

— means an act respecting the medical profession, commonly referred to as *The Medical Profession Act*.

"Acupuncture"

— means the medical procedure of inserting needles through the skin or mucous membrane, with or without electrical stimulation applied, at one or more specific points, without the injection

or withdrawal of any substance, to affect a therapeutic and/or analgesic response in a patient, with the intent to stimulate the neuroendocrine system.

"Approved"

— means approved by the Council.

"Annual License Fee"

— means the annual fee paid by physicians to maintain registration as determined annually by resolution of Council.

"Bylaw"

— means the rules and regulations whereby the business of the College is transacted.

"College"

— means the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Saskatchewan.

"College of Medicine"

— means the College of Medicine of the University of Saskatchewan.

"Council"

— means the Council of the College.

"Intern"

— means a graduate physician entered in an approved internship program in the Province of Saskatchewan.

"Jursi"

— (Junior Undergraduate Rotating Student Intern) means an undergraduate in his final year (commonly known elsewhere as a Clinical Clerk) enrolled in an approved teaching program in the Province of Saskatchewan.

"Member"

— means a member of the College registered under Section 4, 23, 29 or 30 of the Act.

"Registrar"

— means the Chief Executive Officer of the Council.

"Resident"

— means a graduate physician entered in an approved residency training program in the Province of Saskatchewan.

"Resident of Canada"

— means a Canadian Citizen or Landed Immigrant or a person who has resided in Canada continuously for a minimum of three months.

"Training Fellow"

— means a graduate physician who is on the Educational Register and has completed the post graduate requirements for a specialty but is not yet certified.

PART II — ELECTION OF OFFICERS

1. The Council shall each year at its first meeting after the regular annual election of members of Council, elect from amongst its members:

(a) a President and a Vice-President; and an Executive Committee composed of the President, Vice-President, and three members elected at large from and by Council.

(b) All officers of the Council shall hold office until their successors are elected or appointed.

(c) The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Registrar on the direction of the

President or person acting in place of the President. Three members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum.

(d) The Executive Committee shall have and exercise all the power and direction of the Council, but shall not enact, repeal, or amend bylaws or made regulations inconsistent with existing regulations. Minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee shall be presented at the next following meeting of Council and when adopted by the Council shall be entered as if they were the minutes of the Council.

(e) In the event of death, incapacitation, vacancy from office of a permanent nature, of the President, and/or Vice-President, Council shall elect members to fill the vacancies.

(f) The President shall preside at all meetings of the Council, in his absence the Vice-President shall take the Chair, and in the absence of both of these officers, the members of the Council then present shall choose one of their number as chairman.

(g) The Vice-President shall be vested with all the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President in the absence of the President.

PART III — MEETINGS OF THE COLLEGE AND COUNCIL

2. Meetings of the Council and the Committees of Council shall be conducted in accordance with the Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure, unless otherwise specified herein.

3. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

(a) There shall be an Annual General Meeting of the members of the College to:

- (i) receive the reports of the Council; and,
- (ii) consider the matters of general interest to the members of the profession; and,
- (iii) provide a forum for individual members to express concerns; and,
- (iv) to adopt a Code of Ethics

(b) A formally proposed Notice of Motion to be considered at the Annual General Meeting shall be submitted to the Registrar's office at least ten days before the date of the Annual General Meeting.

(c) The Annual General Meeting shall be held at a time and place to be determined by the Council. At least 21 days notice by the Registrar of such meetings shall be given to all members resident in the province.

(d) The order of proceedings at annual general meetings shall so far as is practicable follow an agenda or program prepared by Council.

4. SPECIAL GENERAL MEETINGS

A Special General Meeting can be called by Council under the provisions laid down for an Annual General Meeting.

5. COUNCIL MEETINGS

(a) At least two (2) regular meetings shall be held in each year. The first meeting shall be called by the Registrar within sixty days of the Annual General Election after consultation with the President.

(b) At least seven (7) days notice shall be given to all Councillors of all regular meetings of Council.

6. A special meeting is a meeting not regularly scheduled and is held to transact specified business only and requires 7 days notice.

7. An Emergency meeting may be held by arrangement and with two days notice. A copy of the Minutes of any such meeting shall forthwith after the close of the meeting be sent by the Registrar to all members of Council.

8. A copy of the notice of meeting held under (6) and (7) shall be included in the minutes of the meeting.

9. A majority of the members of the Council constitutes a quorum.

10. VOTING

At all meetings of the College at all levels, an affirmative vote is by a simple majority of those members present.

11. COMMITTEE MEETINGS

(a) The Legislated Committees shall meet as required by Council and function in accordance with the provisions of the Act and bylaws.

4. Preliminary Inquiry Committee

(b) The Standing Committees meet under the terms of reference specified in the bylaws.

1. Advisory Committee on Medical Imaging

3. Committee on Family Practitioner Interpretations of Electrocardiograms
4. Complaints Committee
5. Finance Committee
6. Hospital Credentials Committee
7. Perinatal and Maternal Mortality Study Committee

12. STANDING COMMITTEES TERMS OF REFERENCE

(a) Fifty percent plus one of committee members shall constitute a quorum.

(b) ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON MEDICAL IMAGING

Composition

The Chairman and members of the Committee shall be appointed annually by Council. The committee shall include representatives from radiology, ultrasonography, nuclear medicine, representatives from the Department of Health and may include others.

Objectives

(1) Study and advise upon the best possible, safe and required medical imaging services.

(2) Consideration of the appropriate economic implications involved in the provision of such services.

(3) Advise S.H.S.P. on Medical Imaging Equipment.

Methods

(1) The establishment and maintenance of standards of quality of the medical imaging services.

(2) The establishment and maintenance of standards for the appropriate and proper use of medical imaging equipment.

(3) The inspection and evaluation of the existing medical imaging services and facilities as required.

(4) A review of manpower and equipment needs with respect to the provision of medical imaging services and facilities.

(5) A study and recommendations on mechanisms which might control the elements of possible over-servicing and over-utilization of medical imaging services in relation to overall medical imaging costs.

(6) The continuing education of the medical and allied professions and workers with respect to medical imaging usage, procedure, hazards, and safety.

(7) Offering advice on credentialing of physicians in imaging services.

(8) Any other matter related to the above areas which appear pertinent to the committee within the broad framework listed above.

Reporting

(1) The Chairman reports the findings and recommendations of the committee to the Council for Council's consideration.

(2) The Chairman reports to the Annual Meeting of the College.

Meetings

The Committee will meet at the call of the Chair.

(c) ANAESTHETIC & OPERATIVE DEATHS STUDY COMMITTEE

Composition

The Chairman and members of the committee shall be appointed annually by Council. The membership shall include General Practitioners and Specialists from the following disciplines: Internal Medicine, General Surgery, Orthopaedics, Obstetrics & Gynaecology, Urology, Pathology, Anaesthesia, and may include others.

Objectives

This committee reviews all deaths occurring within 10 days of surgery and/or anaesthesia in the Province of Saskatchewan for purposes of assuring quality care. The cases are categorized using the following classifications:

Classification of Death

- (1) Preventable
- (2) Non-Preventable
- (3) Humane Non-Intervention
- (4) Non-Assessable

Contributing Factors

- (A) Patient failure of compliance
- (B) Family failure of compliance
- (C) Physician error in judgement
- (D) Physician error in technique
- (E) Nursing error
- (F) Equipment failure
- (G) Inadequate facilities

Method

(1) The Director of Vital Statistics of the Saskatchewan Health Department forwards to the Registrar copies of the Death Certificates of all patients dying within 10 days of an operative procedure.

(2) Under the authority of Regulation 16(4)(b) of the Hospital Standards Acts, the following information is released to the committee when a patient dies in the hospital during the administration of the anaesthetic or within 10 days thereafter, or during the surgical operation or within 10 days thereafter as the case may be: —

- (i) The admission history and physical examination;
- (ii) consultation reports;
- (iii) the operative record or records;
- (iv) the anaesthetic record or records;
- (v) the laboratory, tissue and autopsy reports;
- (vi) postoperative notes;
- (vii) statement completed by the attending anaesthetists and surgeon on the form described (Clinical Summary of Death within 10 days of Surgery) — (Appendix I)

(3) If the initial documents obtained from the hospital is not complete, the Registrar contacts the hospital and/or physician(s) concerned requesting the further documentation required.

Reporting

(1) The Chairman reports the finding and recommendations of the committee to Council for Council's consideration.

(2) Following the Chairman's report to Council, letters are sent to the physicians involved, informing them of the committee's conclusions.

(3) The Chairman reports to the Annual Meeting of College.

Meetings

The Committee will meet at the call of the Chair.

(d) COMMITTEE ON FAMILY PRACTITIONER INTERPRETATION OF ELECTROCARDIOGRAMS**Composition**

(1) The Chairman and members of the Committee shall be appointed annually by Council.

(2) The Committee shall include internists and general practitioners, and may include others.

Objectives

To assess members who wish to demonstrate their competence to interpret electrocardiograms.

Method

(1) The Committee is responsible for the development, review, and grading of the E.C.G. Examination.

(2) The pass mark is determined by resolution of Council.

Reporting

(1) The Chairman reports the findings and recommendations to Council for Council's consideration.

(2) Following the Chairman's report to Council, letters are sent to the physicians tested informing them of the Committee's conclusions.

(3) The Chairman reports to the Annual Meeting of the College.

Meetings

(1) The Committee shall meet at the call of the chair.

(e) COMPLAINTS COMMITTEE**(1) Composition**

The Complaints Committee Chairman and members are appointed by Council annually.

(a) Three members of the College.

(b) One person recommended by the Minister of Health.

(c) One person recommended by the Saskatchewan Branch of the Consumer's Association of Canada.

(d) One person recommended by the Saskatoon Board of Trade.

(2) Objectives

To receive, investigate and, if possible, resolve complaints regarding the conduct of physicians.

(3) Method

Complaints are received by the Registrar. By personal or telephone interview, complainants are informed of the role of the College in protecting the public interest, including the working of the Complaints Committee. The complainant is asked to submit the complaint in writing. An authorization for release of information (preferably from the patient) is obtained before the investigation proceeds.

Complaints may be resolved by the Registrar.

Unresolved complaints are forwarded to the Committee. Physician comments are requested and hospital records are obtained. The Committee may resolve the complaint from the information available or request the complainant and/or the physicians to attend for interview.

Consultants may be asked to review certain aspects of the case and give a written opinion.

The written decision of the committee shall be forwarded to the complainant and physician(s) upon resolution of the complaint.

(4) Reporting

(a) The Chairman reports the findings and recommendations of the Committee to Council for Council's consideration.

(5) Meetings

The Committee will meet at the call of the chair.

(f) FINANCE COMMITTEE**(1) Composition**

The Chairman and members of the Committee shall be appointed annually by Council.

The Committee shall be composed of five or more members of the College with working knowledge of finance.

(2) Objective

To ensure responsible management of the affairs and finances of the College.

(3) Method

(a) By preparation of an annual budget through the Administration Officers of the College.

(b) By preparation of a meaningful annual financial statement of the College operation through the Administrative Officers of the College.

(c) By recommending to Council the amount of the annual fee for membership in the College.

(d) By acting as a resource body and advising Council on major expenditures and acquisition.

(e) By acting as a resource body and advising Council on matters relating to staffing of the College office.

(f) By performing other duties which, from time to time, Council may require.

(4) Reporting

The Chairman or his designate shall present the annual budget and his committee's recommendations to Council.

The Chairman or his designate shall present his report, the approved annual budget and the annual financial statement to the Annual Meeting of the College.

(5) Meetings

Shall be at the call of the chair.

(g) HOSPITAL CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

(1) Composition

The Chairman and members of the committee shall be appointed annually by Council.

The membership shall consist of: —

(1) a Specialist from each of the following disciplines: General Surgery; Obstetrics & Gynaecology; Internal Medicine and Anaesthesia;

(2) three General Practitioners;

(3) two Hospital Administrators (limited to 2 one year appointments);

(4) and additional members as required.

(2) Objectives

For the purpose of making recommendations to the Board of Governors of hospitals, the committee shall assess the qualification training and experience of:

(a) new registrants of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Saskatchewan applying for privileges in hospitals of 100-beds, or less;

(b) registered practitioners moving from one location to another and applying for privileges in a hospital;

(c) members of the Medical staff of a hospital as part of a Hospital Assessment;

(d) members of the Medical Staff of any hospital, upon request by the Board of Governors.

(e) any physicians requesting this service for self-assessment or reassessment.

(3) Carry out Hospital Assessments upon receipt of a request from a Hospital Board of Governors.

(4) Method

Physicians' Privileges

The committee in making recommendations shall take the following factors into consideration:

(a) the qualifications, training and medical experience of the physicians;

(b) the physical facilities available;

(c) the backup personnel available, i.e. physicians, nurses, laboratory and x-ray technicians, physiotherapists, and others;

(d) location of the hospital; and,

(e) transport facilities available.

The committee makes recommendations for privileges as they apply to elective procedures only. The applicants and Hospital Boards are advised physicians must be given every opportunity to deal with an emergency to the best of his/her knowledge, training and ability.

Applicant-physicians are required to complete the prescribed application in a form approved by Council and present it to the Registrar. A provisional list of recommended privileges (to Level 1 only) is forwarded to the hospital and physician based on the documented postgraduate training and experience presented by the applicant. When applicants request privileges beyond Level 1, and appropriate documentation of formal training and experience is available, provisional privileges up to Level II, may be recommended by the committee, via a telephone conference call.

Applicants applying for privileges beyond the Level II category, or privileges that are not consistent with the guidelines, are required to meet with the committee, to review their requests for privileges.

The provisional lists of recommendations are presented to the next regular meeting of the Hospital Credentials Committee for review, modification, and/or ratification, and therefore, to Council for review, modification and/or ratification. The final recommendation of Council shall be communicated to the hospital Board of Governors and its physicians.

(5) Hospital Assessments

Hospital Assessments are carried out by a subcommittee of the Hospital Credentials Committee. The Hospital Assessment Team may include members who are not members of the Hospital Credentials Committee.

Hospital Assessments will be carried out at the request of a Hospital Board of Governors.

Hospitals requesting assessments will be required to complete documentation relating to facilities, personnel, and any other relevant matter.

The Hospital Assessment Team appointed to carry out the assessment may make recommendations with respect to: —

(a) privileges of individual physicians;

- (b) medical staff changes;
- (c) facility improvements;
- (d) ancillary staff;
- (e) equipment, etc.;
- (f) any other relevant matter.

The Hospital Assessment Team reports to the Hospital Credentials Committee and subsequently to Council. The final written assessment report is communicated to the Hospital Board of Governors of the Hospital after approval of Council.

(6) Reporting

(a) The Chairman reports the findings and recommendations of the Committee to Council for Council's consideration.

(b) Following the Chairman's report to Council letters are sent to the hospital and physicians involved advising them of the Committee's conclusions.

(c) The Chairman reports to the Annual Meeting of the College.

(7) Meetings

The Committee will meet at the call of the chair.

(h) PERINATAL & MATERNAL MORTALITY STUDY COMMITTEE

(1) Composition

The Chairman and membership of the committee shall be appointed annually by Council.

The membership of the committee shall consist of Obstetricians, Paediatricians and/or Neonatologists, General Practitioners, and may include others.

(2) Objectives

(a) Study of matters which pertain to the quality of obstetrical practice and neonatal care identified by the committee through review of medical records.

(b) The committee will review the medical records of: —

(i) Perinatal Deaths: —

(a) Stillborn — all infants, weighing 500 grams or more at birth, who show no sign of life at or after birth.

(b) Early Neonatal Deaths — all infants, weighing 500 grams or more at birth, who die before they have completed 7 full days of life (168 hours).

(ii) Maternal Deaths — occurring in the province either during pregnancy or within 42 days following termination of pregnancy.

(iii) Other matters pertaining to quality control that are presented to the committee by Council for study.

(3) Method

(a) Copies of Certificates of Neonatal Deaths, Stillbirths and Maternal Deaths are forwarded to the Registrar from the Division of Vital Statistics, Saskatchewan Department of Health.

(b) The Perinatal Mortality Report Form is completed by the attending physician(s) for all infants weighing 500 grams or more

at birth who are stillborn or die before they have completed seven full days of life. The physician(s) involved should provide, for the use of the committee in its deliberations, full information including copies of: —

- the Prenatal Record;
- Autopsy Report;
- Consultation Reports;
- Intrapartum Records;
- Delivery Record;
- Discharge Summaries (Mother) & (Newborn);
- Fetal Monitor Tracings;
- Narrative Summary.

If additional information is required the hospital concerned may be written requesting a copy of the mother's and/or infant's complete hospital chart.

(4) Under the authority of Regulation 16(g) of the Hospital Standards Act, copies of the hospital charts of patients dying either during pregnancy or within 42 days following termination of pregnancy may be obtained for the committee's assessment.

(5) Deaths and contributing factors are classified as follows: —

Classification of Death

- (a) Preventable
- (b) Non-Preventable
- (c) Ideally Preventable
- (d) Non assessable

Contributing Factors

- (i) Patient failure of compliance
- (ii) Family failure of compliance
- (iii) Physician error in judgement
- (iv) Physician error in technique
- (v) Nursing error
- (vi) Equipment failure
- (vii) Inadequate facilities
- (viii) Difficult diagnostic problem
- (ix) Unavoidable medical or surgical complications
- (x) Other — specify

(6) Reporting

(a) The Chairman reports the findings and recommendations of the Committee to Council for Council's consideration.

(b) Following the Chairman's report to Council, letters are sent to the physicians involved, informing them of the Committee's conclusions.

(c) The Chairman reports to the Annual Meeting of the College.

(7) Meetings

The Committee will meet at the call of the chair.

(i) COMPETENCY COMMITTEE

(1) Composition

(a) The Chairman and members of the committee shall be appointed by Council.

(b) A competency committee shall be composed of one or more members whose train-

ing and experience lie within the same field of medicine as the member being evaluated.

(2) Objective

To determine whether a member has adequate skill and knowledge to practice in Saskatchewan.

(3) Method

The methods of evaluation to determine skill and knowledge may include one or more of the following:

- (a) case discussion;
- (b) observation of the performance of the physician in an office setting;
- (c) observation of the performance of the physician in hospital;
- (d) written examination;
- (e) the use of JURSI, Intern, Family Medicine, or Royal College evaluation forms;
- (f) a medical examination to determine the physician's health;
- (g) any other method deemed appropriate by the Committee;

(4) Reporting

Upon completion of its assigned task the Committee shall prepare for Council a written report of its activities, findings and conclusions, to be signed by each member of the Committee concurring. A minority report may be submitted. Council may require the presence of the Chairman or his designate at a meeting of Council to present the report and answer questions. The report should state one of the following:

- (a) that the physician had adequate skill and knowledge to practice; or
- (b) that the physician lacks adequate skill and knowledge in a particular discipline or disciplines; or
- (c) that the physician lacks adequate skill and knowledge to practice.

(j) AD HOC COMMITTEE

(1) Composition

(a) Council may appoint an Ad Hoc Committee to investigate and report to Council upon any matter.

(b) The Ad Hoc Committee may consist of such number of members as the Council deems advisable. All members shall be duly registered and in good standing with the College. One of the members shall be named by the Council to be the Chairman of the Committee.

(2) Method

The Council will set out, in writing, to the members of the committee the matter to be dealt with in such detail as it deems necessary.

(a) The Ad Hoc Committee may, subject to the Medical Profession Act, and the Regulations, regulate its own manner of proceeding, with due regard for time and costs.

(b) An Ad Hoc Committee may take any steps that it considers proper and may summon before it any person who is under investigation.

(c) No statement or answer given by a person under investigation before the Ad Hoc Committee is to be used in evidence in a proceeding before a Discipline Committee appointed under section 43 of the Act but is to be used only for the purpose of the Ad Hoc Committee.

(d) Upon the completion of its assigned task, the Ad Hoc Committee shall prepare for Council a written report of its activities, findings, conclusions, and recommendations, to be signed by each member of the committee concurring. A minority report may be submitted. Council may require the presence of the Chairman at a meeting to present the report and to answer questions.

PART IV — THE REGISTER

13. THE REGISTER

The Registrar shall keep a Register, in which shall be entered the name of every person entitled to be registered according to the provisions of the Act.

14. ADMISSION TO THE REGISTER

A person desiring to register shall:

Comply with the provisions for registration and licensing under the Act, and the Bylaws there under.

15. CATEGORIES OF MEMBERSHIP

- (a) Regular Member
- (b) Senior Life Member (Active and Inactive)
- (c) Inactive Member
- (d) Honorary Member (Medical and Non-Medical)

(a) Regular Member

(i) Is registered under Section 4, 28, 29, or 30 of the Act.

(ii) A Provisional member is a regular member registered under Section 29 of the Act, and shall provide documentary evidence of having passed the Evaluating Examination of the Medical Council of Canada.

(iii) A Special License is for registration under Section 30 of the Act.

(iv)(a) Members registered under Section 29 of the Medical Profession Act who leave the province with the permission of Council may remain registered for the remainder of their current licence year (M.P.A. — Section 29(2)(b)).

(b) The member would then be entitled, by the annual payment of the Inactive fee, to be placed on the Inactive Register for the remaining years of the three year Provisional license.

(c) If the member does not become fully registered before the end of the three year term the license shall be revoked (M.P.A. — Section 29(2)(c)).

(b) Senior Life Member — Active

(i) Is registered under Section 4 or 28 of The Act.

(ii) Has been fully registered continually in Saskatchewan for forty (40) consecutive years. War service with the Canadian and/or allied Forces after registration is included.

(iii) Is required to pay the annual license fee established by Council.

Senior Life Member — Inactive

(i) Is registered under Section 4 or 28 of The Act.

(ii) Has been fully registered in Saskatchewan for forty (40) consecutive years. War service with the Canadian and/or allied Forces after registration is included.

(iii) Has voluntarily withdrawn from active practice.

(iv) Is not required to pay an annual license fee.

(c) Inactive Member

(i) Is registered under Section 4 or 28 of the Medical Profession Act as an Inactive Member.

(ii) Has voluntarily withdrawn from active medical practice in Saskatchewan.

(iii) Has paid the annual fee for inactive status.

(d) Honorary Member — Medical

(i) For exceptional service to medicine for the affairs of the College, Honorary Medical Members may be elected by resolution of Council.

(ii) No rights or privileges to practice medicine, hold office or vote are conferred by this designation.

(iii) An Honorary Member may attend the annual meeting of the College.

(e) Honorary Member — Non Medical

(i) For exceptional service to medicine for the affairs of the College, Honorary Non Medical Members may be elected by resolution of Council.

(ii) No rights or privileges to practice medicine, hold office or vote are conferred by this designation.

(iii) An Honorary Member may attend the annual meeting of the College.

16. THE EDUCATION REGISTER OF PERSONS IN TRAINING

(a) The Registrar shall keep a register of the names of person in Medical Training in Saskatchewan and shall enter:

(i) Those undergraduate students enrolled in the College of Medicine, University of Saskatchewan who are recommended by the Dean of that College.

(ii) Those undergraduates of any other College of Medicine approved by Council and recommended by the Dean of the College.

(iii) Those post graduate students who have been appointed as an intern, resident or fellow in a training program in Saskatchewan.

(iv) Graduates of approved Medical Schools other than L.C.M.E./C.A.C.M.E. approved schools require evidence of passing the Medical Council of Canada Evaluating Exam.

(b) Medical Students, JURISIS, Interns, Residents and Fellows shall:

(i) Complete the application form provided.

(ii) Present the necessary original documents at interview.

(iii) Satisfy Council of their good character.

(iv) Pay the fee.

A person so registered may practice Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery in a hospital or facility to which he has been appointed.

(c) A person's name shall be removed from the education register.

(a) Upon completion of the training program.

(b) With revocation of the Trainee's status with the training program.

(c) By Council for cause.

17. SATISFACTORY POST GRADUATE TRAINING

A. For the purpose of registration under Section 28 of The Medical Profession Act, the following shall constitute evidence of satisfactory postgraduate training.

I. For applicants who shall practice as a consultant specialist and restrict practice to one of the disciplines recognized by the R.C.P.S.C. certification in that specialty by the R.C.P.S.C. shall be required.

II. For applicants who shall practice primary care medicine, the following shall satisfy postgraduate training requirements.

a) Certification by the C.F.P.C.

b) Satisfactory completion of a C.F.P.C. accredited residency in family medicine and eligibility to undertake the C.F.P.C. certification examination.

c) Satisfactory completion of 24 months of postgraduate training in programs affiliated with an L.C.M.E./C.A.C.M.S. accredited medical school and accredited by the R.C.P.S.C. or C.A.P.P.T.P. which shall include the following elements:

Mandatory Educational Elements

The mandatory portion of the 24 month pre-registration training period shall consist of 60 weeks of training to be made up of the following rotations:

1. Twelve weeks of supervised training in an approved family medicine program.

2. Eight weeks emergency medicine/critical care.

3. Eight weeks internal medicine with an ambulatory component.

4. Eight weeks general surgery with an ambulatory component.

5. Eight weeks obstetrics and gynaecology with an ambulatory component.

6. Eight weeks paediatrics with an ambulatory component.

7. Eight weeks psychiatry with an ambulatory component.

Elective Education Elements

The elective portion of the 24 month pre-registration training period shall consist of 36 weeks of training, to be made up of one to three of the following rotations (each rotation to be a minimum of 12 weeks duration).

1. Twelve, twenty-four, or thirty-six weeks of medicine and/or its sub-specialties, or

2. Twelve, twenty-four, or thirty-six weeks of surgery and/or its sub-specialties, or

3. Twelve, twenty-four, or thirty-six weeks of obstetrics and gynaecology and/or its sub-specialties, or

4. Twelve, twenty-four, or thirty-six weeks of paediatrics and/or its sub-specialties, or

5. Twelve, twenty-four, or thirty-six weeks of psychiatry and/or its sub-specialties, or

6. Twelve, twenty-four, or thirty-six weeks of family medicine, or

7. Twelve, twenty-four, or thirty-six weeks of anaesthesia.

Note: One 12 week block (one rotation) of this 36 weeks of elective training may be taken in a R.C.P.S.C. recognized discipline which is not listed above.

And a recommendation for licensure from the Assistant Dean for Postgraduate Studies of the medical school in which the major portion of this postgraduate training has been completed.

d) Satisfactory completion of 24 months of postgraduate training in programs affiliated with a university outside of Canada or the United States which is approved by the Council of the College where such training is directed towards the education of primary care physicians and is under the supervision of a program director, and includes all of the educational elements listed 2)c) above.

B. For purpose of registration under Section 29 of The Medical Professional Act the following shall constitute evidence of satisfactory post-graduate training:

1. Physicians who have completed a Royal College specialty training program in Canada or a specialty training program in the U.S.A. and are eligible to sit the exam of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada and who are recommended for licensure by the Dean of Postgraduate Studies who oversees their program may be provisionally registered, with practice restricted to the discipline in which they have satisfactorily completed postgraduate training.

2. Physicians who hold a specialty qualification from Great Britain, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, or the Republic of South Africa and who are eligible to sit the examination of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada may be provisionally registered with practice restricted to the discipline in which they have satisfactorily completed post-graduate training.

3. Physicians who are graduates from medical schools in Great Britain, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, or the Republic of South Africa, who meet the postgraduate training requirements for Section 28 and who have passed the M.C.C.E.E. may be provisionally registered.

4. Physicians who are graduates of other approved university medical schools, who are fully registered with the G.M.C. and hold the M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P. or the Triple Conjoint (L.R.C.P., L.R.C.S., L.R.C.P.S.), who have met the postgraduate training requirements for section 28, and who have passed the M.C.C.E.E. may be provisionally registered.

C. Clinical Assessments

Graduates of all Foreign Medical Schools may be required to undergo an evaluation of their clinical skills before entering:

a) A postgraduate training program in Saskatchewan, or

b) private practice in Saskatchewan.

Where the Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons has reason to believe that the postgraduate training completed by such an applicant is not educationally equivalent to that obtained in an L.C.M.E./C.A.C.M.S. program, the Council may require the applicant to submit to an assessment of the applicant's current clinical skills and knowledge with the cost of that assessment to be borne by the applicant.

SECTION 17(2)

Retraining of Inactive Physicians

I. Physicians who have been inactive in their field of practice for 24 to 36 months must obtain one month of retraining for every twelve months out of practice.

II. Physicians who are inactive in their field of practice for a period of greater than three years must undergo an assessment of their skills and knowledge by examination. After the assessment the period of retraining, and specific areas of retraining, will be determined. The cost of the assessment will be the responsibility of the applicant.

III. Physicians who change their field of practice will be assessed as II above.

IV. Physicians who have been inactive due to illness or disability will be evaluated on an individual basis as to the need for a formal assessment, irrespective of the length of time they have been absent from practice.

PART V — ELECTION OF COUNCIL

18. The nine medical Electoral Divisions required by Section 11(1) of the Medical Professional Act, 1981 are

Division No. 1: All that portion of the Province of Saskatchewan north of 53° latitude and east of 107° longitude.

Division No. 2: All that portion of the Province of Saskatchewan north of 52° latitude and west of 107° longitude.

Division No. 3: All that portion of the Province of Saskatchewan known as the City of Saskatoon.

Division No. 4: All that portion of the Province of Saskatchewan between 51° and 53° lines of latitude and east of 104° longitude.

Division No. 5: All that portion of the Province of Saskatchewan south of 52° latitude and west of 107° longitude.

Division No. 6: All that portion of the Province of Saskatchewan south of 51° latitude, bordered on the west by 107° longitude and on the east by 104° longitude, excluding the City of Regina.

Division No. 7: All that portion of the Province of Saskatchewan known as the City of Regina.

Division No. 8: All that portion of the Province of Saskatchewan south of 51° latitude and east of 104° longitude.

Division No. 9: All that portion of the Province of Saskatchewan bordered by 51° and 53° lines of latitude and 104° and 105° lines of longitude, excluding the City of Saskatoon.

19. ELECTIONS TO BE HELD

(a) For Medical Electoral Divisions 1, 5, and 9 in each odd numbered year; and

(b) For Medical Electoral Divisions 2, 4 and 8 in each even numbered year; and

(c) For Medical Electoral Division 3 and 7 each year in respect to one member of Council for each division; and

(d) In the case of the death or resignation of a member of Council as soon as practicable thereafter.

(e) The election shall, as far as practicable, be held in December of each year in accordance with Subsections (a) to (c) inclusive, above.

20. NOMINATION AND VOTING PAPERS

(a) At least six weeks prior to the date fixed for the election, the Registrar shall mail to each member entitled to vote, a complete list of all members in his medical electoral division who are qualified for election under this Act together with a nomination paper.

(b) Each candidate shall be nominated by three other members in his or her medical electoral division who are qualified to vote in the election.

(c) Nominations shall be signed by the three nominating members and each nomination shall be accepted in writing by the candidate.

(d) At least three weeks prior to the date of the election, the Registrar shall mail to each member entitled to vote:

(i) a ballot listing the candidates nominated in the medical electoral division in which he or she is entitled to vote;

(ii) an envelope marked "place and seal ballot in the envelope to ensure secrecy";

(iii) an envelope marked "voting paper" and having on it a declaration of identification;

(iv) a self-addressed envelope marked "voting paper";

(v) a notice of the date of the election and the place fixed for the counting of votes.

(e) Only such members are duly nominated shall be eligible for election as members of the Council.

21. VOTING

Every member voting shall:

(a) Mark an X in the ballot provided opposite or in the space containing the name of the candidate for whom he intends to vote;

(b) Place the ballot in the envelope marked "place and seal ballot in the envelope to ensure secrecy";

(c) Place the enveloped ballot in the envelope marked "voting paper" and containing the declaration of identification.

(d) After sealing the envelope, complete and sign the declaration contained on the envelope, and;

(e) Return the envelope to the Registrar in a sealed self-addressed envelope marked "voting paper" so as to be received by the Registrar on or before the day of the election.

22. COUNTING THE BALLOTS

At the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon of the day following the election, the Registrar, in the view of the scrutineers present, shall in respect of each Medical Electoral Division:

(a) Open the envelopes marked "voting paper";

(b) Open the declaration envelopes;

(c) Open the envelopes marked "place and seal ballot in envelope to ensure secrecy" and deposit votes in a ballot box;

(d) Count the votes cast for each candidate and record the results in a book provided by the Council.

The Registrar shall inform each member of the College of the results of the election in his or her medical electoral division.

PART VI — FLEX

23. The College may, at the discretion of Council, enter into agreement with the Federation of State Medical Boards of the U.S.A. to stage the Federation Licensing Examinations (F.L.E.X.) in the Province of Saskatchewan.

24. Acceptable candidates to write the examination in Saskatchewan shall:

(a) Complete and submit the application form provided by the College.

(b) Complete and submit the Federation Computer form.

(c) Submit three letters of reference relative to the applicant's character and professional competence.

(d) Provide as evidence of graduation from a University approved by the Council an original document of a degree in Medicine.

(e) Submit two (2) photographs of the candidate.

(f) Submit a Curriculum Vitae.

(g) Pay the fee prescribed by resolution of Council.

(h) Be a resident of Canada as defined in the Bylaws.

25. Eligibility to rewrite the examination may be limited by the Council in the event of failure to obtain acceptable grades on three occasions.

26. An acceptable passing score on the examination shall be that prescribed by resolution of Council.

PART VII — ADVERTISING

27.(a) A member or clinic may make information about the member and services provided or the clinic and the services it provides available to any patient, potential patient or the public generally, subject to the limitations contained herein.

(b) The word "advertising" in relation to the medical profession must be taken in its broadest sense. It includes all those methods by which a practicing physician is made known to the public either by himself or by others without his objections, in a manner which can be fairly

regarded as having for its purpose the obtaining of patients or the promotion in other ways of the physicians individual professional advantage.

(c) A member or clinic may participate in or donate services to charitable endeavors.

(d) Any member who advertises in a manner contrary to this bylaw, or who permits such advertising to be done on the member's behalf or permits any clinic with which the member is associated to advertise contrary to this bylaw shall be guilty of unprofessional conduct and shall be subject to the provisions of The Medical Profession Act, 1981.

28. ETHICAL, PROFESSIONAL, ADVERTISING CRITERIA

(a) Advertising, promotion, and other marketing activities must be in good taste, accurate, and not capable of misleading the public. Any conduct, either directly or indirectly or through any medium or agent that:

(i) Misrepresents facts;

(ii) Compares either directly, indirectly or by innuendo, the member's services or ability with that of any other practitioner or clinic, or promises or offers more effective service or better results than those available elsewhere;

(iii) Deprecates another member or clinic as to service, ability or fees;

(iv) Creates an unjustified expectation about the results the member can achieve;

(v) Is made under any false or misleading guise, or takes advantage, either physical, emotional, or financial of any patient or uses, coercion, duress or harassment;

(vi) Is undignified, in bad taste or otherwise offensive so as to be incompatible with the best interests of the public or members under The Medical Profession Act, or tends to harm the standing of the medical profession generally;

(vii) Discloses the names of patients or,

(viii) Makes statements which are not statements of fact or makes statements that cannot be proven to be accurate by the member or clinic is to be strictly avoided as such conduct is contrary to the interest of the public and the profession.

29. TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES

A physician may place his name, address and telephone number in two areas of a telephone directory, the white and the yellow pages.

(a) The white pages may indicate, in alphabetical order in bold print, the physician's name and address and telephone number of, if he so wishes, his home and his office.

(b) The yellow pages may indicate in bold print the physician's name, office address and office telephone number.

(c) The name of the physician in the yellow pages may be followed, in regular print, by a brief reference to the physician's field of practice i.e., Family Practice, etc.

30.(a) A physician whose name appears on the Specialist list of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Saskatchewan may indicate "Specialist in _____". The physician shall limit practice exclusively to that area.

(b) A physician who has special training or practice experience, deemed satisfactory by the Council, may indicate, "Practice Limited to _____", or "Special Interest in _____".

31. STATEMENTS TO AND INTERVIEWS WITH THE MEDIA

Media and Public Interest in medicine is growing and there is increasing pressure on physicians to participate in radio, television and newspaper interviews.

(a) Physicians may initiate a press release or media interview to disseminate information of an educational nature designed to warn of a current, proven health hazard or inform of a technique of preventive medicine.

(b) Physicians shall not initiate but may respond to request for interviews exploring new research break-throughs, proven effective innovations in treatment, and philosophical examination of medical history and changing trends.

(c) Physicians shall not participate in interviews extolling their personal professional accomplishments or the availability through the physician of a facility, medical device, or mode of treatment.

(d) In all statements and interviews the physician will exercise caution that he be seen as speaking for the profession rather than promoting his own qualifications and professional services.

(e) The conduct of interviews with the media concerning medical matters should be carried out so as to conform with the relevant provisions of the Code of Ethics of the Canadian Medical Association as adopted annually by the Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Saskatchewan.

32. CLINIC AND OFFICE SIGNS

(a) A free standing Clinic with direct patient access from the street may erect a sign on the hoarding usually provided for advertising purposes. The sign shall be restricted to two contrasting colours, may be illuminated and shall indicate:

(i) the name of the Clinic

(ii) office hours

(b) Printing on or in a door or window may indicate the names and medical degrees of physicians practicing in the Clinic and specialists certificates if any.

(c) Clinics located in separate non commercial structures in residential areas may erect a tasteful sign on or adjacent to the building indicating:

(i) the name of the Clinic

(ii) office hours

(iii) the names and medical degrees of physicians practising in the Clinic.

(d) Physicians practicing within the confines of establishments housing several medical services in rented or leased space shall confine the advertisement on their individual office entrance to their name, medical degrees and room number. The same information and an indication of specialty may be included in the directory usually found in the public entrance to these establishments.

(e) All permitted advertisements referred to above shall be in good taste and acceptably proportional to the size of the structure adjacent or on which they are located.

(f) The facility, clinic or office name shall not have the connotation of particular excellence or superiority, but may reflect the physician's certifications or registrations, as recognized by the Council.

(g) Physicians may list on office letterhead and business cards:

- (i) Only those qualifications they hold, and
- (ii) any restrictions they place on their practice pursuant to Bylaw 30(a) and (b).

PART VIII — COMMUNICATION WITH COUNCIL AND COMMITTEES

33. Council and the committees of Council frequently request information, explanations and documents from physicians. Prompt response to such requests are required if the College is to expeditiously and effectively comply with the mandate imposed on it by the Act.

34. RESPONSE

(a) Physicians shall reply to any communication from Council or a committee of Council within 14 days of personal receipt on such communication.

(b) Council or a committee of Council may extend the deadlines for reply to communication, at its discretion, upon receipt of a written request for extension from the physician queried.

(c) Failure to comply with (a) and (b) is unprofessional conduct and subject to the provisions of the Act.

35. COMPLIANCE

(a) Physicians will, in their response to Council and committee communication, comply to the best of their ability, fully and accurately with all lawful requests for information and documents.

(b) Failure to comply with (a) is unprofessional conduct and subject to the provisions of the Act.

PART IX

36. ENABLING CERTIFICATES

(a) Only physicians on the Educational or Full Register shall qualify for issuance of an Enabling Certificate.

37. PAIN CLINICS

(a) The Registrar shall keep a list of physicians eligible to bill under the pain clinic codes in the M.C.I.C. payment schedule.

(b) Physicians eligible must have proof of a rotation through a pain management service in a L.C.M.E./C.A.C.M.E. accredited training program in Canada, Continental United States, or an approved pain management program in the United Kingdom.

38. ACUPUNCTURE

(a) The College recognizes acupuncture as a Medical Act.

(b) Physicians wishing to practice acupuncture shall submit to the Registrar their qualifications and experience.

(c) The minimum qualification is the Diploma from the Acupuncture Foundation of Canada.

39. PAYMENT AT SPECIALIST RATES

(a) The College recognizes only Certification with the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada.

(b) The paying agencies will be appraised of the members specialty status eligibility for payment purposes on the date that an original document from the Royal College is received in the Registrar's office.

(c) Having satisfied the requirements of (b) above physicians applying for payment at specialists rates will sign a declaration of their intention to limit their practice to the practice of a specialty as defined by Council.

(d) Failure to comply with (c) above will result in the physician's name being removed from the list of physician's eligible for payment at specialist rates.

40. ABORTION

No member of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Saskatchewan shall perform an abortion except

(a) in a hospital holding accreditation from the Canadian Council of Hospital Accreditation, and

(b) where the member is satisfied that the patient has received the benefit of professional counselling with regard to abortion and alternative options from one other physician or a non-medical counselling service which has been approved by the Council of the College.

41. Failure to comply with Bylaw 40 is unprofessional conduct and subject to the provisions of The Act.

42. ANABOLIC STEROIDS

(a) A physician shall not utilize anabolic steroids, growth hormones, testosterone or its analogs, human chorionic gonadotropin (HCQ), or other hormones for the purpose of enhancing athletic ability.

(b) A physician shall complete and maintain patient medical records which accurately reflect the utilization of any substance or drug described in (a) above. Patient medical records shall indicate the diagnosis and purpose for which the substance or drug is utilized, and any additional information upon which the diagnosis is based. Records on these patients must be produced for inspection by the College.

(c) Failure to follow this bylaw shall be considered unprofessional conduct under Section 46 of the Medical Profession Act.

43. THE TRIPLICATE PRESCRIPTION PROGRAM

With the agreement of the College of Dental Surgeons of Saskatchewan, the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Saskatchewan and The Saskatchewan Pharmaceutical Association,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT, beginning August 1, 1988, a triplicate prescription is required from a physician or dentist in Saskatchewan in order that a pharmacist may fill a prescription for the following drugs:

and other drugs as may from time to time be agreed to between the aforementioned organizations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that triplicate prescriptions for these drugs be issued and dispensed according to the policies and procedures agreed to, and amended from time to time, by the aforementioned organizations.

44. DIAGNOSTIC ULTRASOUND

That effective July 1, 1988, the following policy shall take effect in relation to all diagnostic ultrasound facilities and services:

1. In communities which have a resident full-time recognized Ultrasonologist, he or she shall be on site at the facility for consultation, supervision and interpretation of all ultrasound examinations.

2. In communities which do not have a resident full-time Ultrasonologist to be fully responsible for the supervision and interpretation of all ultrasound examinations done in the facility, the Ultrasonologist shall be on site for consultation, supervision and interpretation of at least 50% of examinations where annual volume of less than 1,000 and full-time where annual volume exceeds 1,000.

45. BYLAW FOR TEMPORARY REGISTRATION

1. In order to be eligible for a Locum Tenens permit under Section 31 of The Medical Profession Act, 1981 a physician must meet the following requirements:

1. The physician shall be a graduate in medicine from a University approved by the Council.

2. The physician shall have:

(a) Obtained the L.M.C.C., F.L.E.X., or N.B.M.E. qualification, or

(b) Graduated from a medical school approved by the Council in Great Britain, Eire, Australia, New Zealand, or South Africa and shall, at the time of application, have full registration with the Licensing Body in Britain, Eire, Australia, New Zealand or South Africa, or

(c) Graduated from a medical school approved by the Council and hold full registration with a Licensing Body in Great Britain, Eire, Australia, New Zealand or South Africa and have passed the conjoint exam from either London (M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P.) or Glasgow (L.R.C.P., L.R.C.S., L.R.C.P.S.).

3. The physician shall have post graduate training of a minimum of one year including eight weeks in each of Medicine, General Surgery, Obstetrics and Gynaecology and Paediatrics in order to carry out a general practice locum, or appropriate specialty training approved by the Council in order to carry out a locum in a specialty.

4. The physician shall provide proof, to the satisfaction of the Council, the he/she is the

person named in the documentation and is of good character.

II. A graduate of a Canadian medical school who is in their PG I or PG II years may undertake a locum in a medical practice which contains more than one physician.

III. A locum who will practice with a hospital appointment must be employed by a member of the College who holds a staff appointment at the hospital in which the locum will practice.

IV. A locum who will practice thirteen days or less in the same practice and who is employed through the Saskatchewan Medical Association Locum Services need not comply with III above. August 14, 1991.

All material for publication in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* must be in the Office of the Queen's Printer, Saskatchewan Justice, 8th Floor, 1874 Scarth Street, Regina, Sask. S4P 3V7 (Copy must be addressed to the Editor, Marilyn McEwen) by noon on the Friday previous to the week of publication. If a holiday occurs within the week of publication, the deadline is set back to noon of the previous Thursday. At least one full week should be allowed for mail delivery.
