

# Duck Mountain Provincial Park

## 2022 Education Programs

*Guided school programs are offered in the spring and fall at Duck Mountain Provincial Park and are a great opportunity to immerse students in nature while investigating and applying learning objectives. Sask Parks' guided school programming connects the Saskatchewan Curriculum to nature-based learning.*



### Booking:

Bookings are accepted starting on Tuesday, January 4, on a first-come, first-served basis. Please complete the attached form and return by email to [outdoorclassroom@gov.sk.ca](mailto:outdoorclassroom@gov.sk.ca).

### Cost:

School groups are no longer required to pay a program fee. A vehicle entry permit is required upon entry to the park for \$10/vehicle (buses and chaperone vehicles included). Permits are available for purchase from the entry gate and/or park office.

### Program Dates:

Monday to Friday, May 16 to June 24, 2022. Fall programs are available September 6 to early October, weather and park conditions permitting. Winter programs are available upon request.

### Park Quick Facts:

- Located 100 km northeast of Yorkton or 22 km east of Kamsack.
- Rare calcareous fen ecosystem home to unique carnivorous plants. Approximately 600 meters of wheelchair accessible boardwalk runs through the trail.
- Large picnic area with covered picnic shelter and barbecues available for use.

### Programs

Most programs can be adapted for any grade level, however, suggested grades are included.

### Aquatic Programs

#### Aquatic Ecosystem Exploration (Grade K-12)

This investigative program takes place at Ministik Beach where students will explore aquatic habitats through a pond dipping study. Using dipping nets, students will attempt to collect living invertebrate near the shoreline of the lake. Living organisms will be placed in an aquarium where they can be inspected and identified using biological keys.

The content and detail of this program is tailored to fit the grade level. Students that are at a grade 7 level or higher will be given the tools they need to discover the impacts of fertilizer and chemical use in Saskatchewan. Groups will test the pH, turbidity and amount

of dissolved oxygen, phosphate and nitrate in a lake sample. Students will use the results of their qualitative and quantitative assessments to determine the health of the lake and discuss the importance of a healthy ecosystem.

### Guided Hikes

#### Boreal Basics Hike (Grade K-7)

The forests of Duck Mountain Provincial Park are a southern representation of the vast boreal forest that stretches across three-quarters of Canada.

With a mixture of deciduous and coniferous trees, the boreal forest takes on its own unique character in Duck Mountain Provincial Park. On this hike, students will learn about this unique forest and explore the flora and fauna along the trail.

#### Explore the Calcareous Fen (Grade K-7)

Wander along 600 meters of accessible boardwalk through the unique calcareous fen ecosystem. Learn about the various carnivorous plants, unique flora and rare wildlife that inhabit this area. The trail is on the south end of the park and therefore transportation is required to get there.

#### Grassland Ghosts Hike (Grade K-7)

While predominantly forested, Duck Mountain Provincial Park harbors isolated pockets of native grassland. In Little Boggie Creek Valley, prairie remnants are covered in flowers and grasses that are becoming increasingly rare outside of protected areas. The hot, dry conditions on the south-facing slopes of the valley discourage the growth of trees, allowing the prairie community to thrive. Controlled burning of this area keeps the aspen forests at bay and preserves an ecosystem that once dominated Saskatchewan. This hike is a good extension

of the Calcareous Fen hike due to its proximity.

**Suggested Curriculum:** LTK, LT1, SE1, PL3, HC4, DL6, IE7

#### Biodiversity at its Best Hike (Grade 4-7)

Hike through the southern part of the park's boreal forest, located on the western edge of the Duck Mountain Uplands. The richness of plant and animal life on the Great Trail can only be appreciated by a visit to the park. Over 180 species of birds and 35 species of mammals can be seen on this route. Such a wealth of life is possible due to the variety of settings and ecosystems found within the park. In addition to old growth aspen forests, there are forests of white spruce and balsam fir, black spruce bogs, paper birch stands, and lake shorelines that extend for miles.

#### Skill Development Programs

##### Fire Starting (Grade 5-7)

The objective of this program is to understand the importance of fire and how to safely build and handle fire. Connections to the importance of wildfires and controlled burns to forest ecology are discussed.

#### Geocaching Adventure (Grade 5-12)

This program engages students with the worldwide treasure hunt activity called geocaching! Students will be given hands-on experience using a Global Positioning System (GPS) unit and then be invited to enhance their team building skills by participating in a geocaching adventure throughout Duck Mountain Provincial Park. Please wear running shoes or hiking boots.

##### Group Camping:

Group camping is available to school groups free of charge from September 7, 2021 to June 23, 2022. To book group campsites, please contact the park office at 306-792-4750. When reserving online, standard nightly group camping fees apply from June 24, 2022 until September 6, 2022, in addition to a \$12 non-refundable reservation fee. 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## Know Before You Go

Note: teachers and chaperones are required to participate in all programs.

### Be Prepared for the Weather:

Bring sunscreen, insect repellent and warm and waterproof clothing. Rubber boots may also be required for your program.

### Cell Coverage:

There is good cell service at Duck Mountain Provincial Park, though it may be limited in some areas. Wi-Fi is not available.

### Late Arrivals or Cancellations:

Programs are not usually cancelled due to weather unless requested by the school or in extreme/unsafe situations. Please phone us to let us know if you are late arriving. We will try to accommodate changes, however, late arrivals may result in program reduction or cancellation due to other school booking commitments.

### Campfires:

Campfires are allowed in the park. Please bring matches, roasting sticks and an axe. Wood is provided on site. Please discuss campfire needs during your booking. In the case of a fire ban, campfires are prohibited. To find out if the park is under a fire restriction, head to [saskparks.com](http://saskparks.com).

### Drinking Water:

Drinking water may not be available at your program location. Plan ahead and bring filled water bottles.

### Safety:

In case of medical or other emergencies, all groups must maintain their own transportation while visiting the park.

### In the Classroom:

Discuss with your students ways that they can reduce their impact—reduce packaging on food items, recycle materials and respect the natural environment during your visit.
