ORDERS IN COUNCIL

The Urban Municipality Act, 1984

[O.C. 41/1998]
4 February 1998

TO THE HONOURABLE

THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL

The undersigned has the honour to report that:

1 Section 12 of *The Urban Municipality Act, 1984*, provides, in part, as follows:

12(l) On the recommendation of the minister, the Lieutenant Governor in Council may, by order, dissolve a ... village:

(a) if the council of the ... village, by resolution, requests it be dissolved, or there is a failure to elect a council; or ...

(3) An order made pursuant to subsection (1) is to provide for the inclusion in a rural municipality of the area that has ceased to be a ... village.

(4) An order dissolving a ... village may appoint one or more persons to adjust and settle the assets and liabilities of the ... village and, if any such appointments are made, is to specify the remuneration payable to them.

(5) Subject to the other provisions of this Act and to any directions that may be specified in a dissolution order, the persons appointed pursuant to subsection (4) shall sell, dispose of and convert into money sufficient assets of the ... village to liquidate its liabilities and to pay their own remuneration as fixed by the order, and shall dispose of any remaining assets as directed by the minister.

(7) When an order dissolving a ... village is made:

(a) the members of the council and all the employees of the ... village cease to have any further authority;

(b) all taxes and revenues due to the former ... village are deemed to be taxes and revenues due to the rural municipality in which the ... village is included;

(c) all rights of action and actions by or against the former ... village may be commenced, continued or maintained by or against the rural municipality in which the ... village is included;

(d) all land and improvements vested in the former ... village is vested in the rural municipality in which the ... village is included, and, subject to any trusts or other conditions that may be applicable, may be dealt with by it in its own name; and

(e) ... all other assets, liabilities, rights, duties, functions and obligations of the former ... village are vested in the rural municipality in which the ... village is included and may be dealt with by it in its own name.

2 The 1996 census taken pursuant to the *Statistics Act* (Canada) determined that the Village of Madison had a population of 11.

3 By resolution dated October 14, 1997, the Council of the Village of Madison requested that the village be dissolved.

4 It is deemed appropriate and in the public interest to dissolve the Village of Madison at this time.

The undersigned, has the honour, therefore, to recommend that Your Honour's Order do issue pursuant to section 12 of *The Urban Municipality Act, 1984*:

(a) dissolving the Village of Madison and including its area within the Rural Municipality of Newcombe No. 260;

(b) confirming that the dissolution shall take effect on and from February 1, 1998;

(c) appointing Fred J. Sutter of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, to adjust and settle the assets and liabilities of the Village of Madison; and

(d) determining the remuneration payable to Fred J. Sutter to be \$15.00 per hour of work, and \$.3120 per travelled kilometre and reimbursement of related miscellaneous expenses.

THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL

The undersigned has the honour to report that:

1 Section 12 of *The Urban Municipality Act, 1984*, provides, in part, as follows:

12(1) On the recommendation of the minister, the Lieutenant Governor in Council may, by order, dissolve a ... village:

(a) if the council of the ... village, by resolution, requests it be dissolved, or there is a failure to elect a council; or ...

(7) When an order dissolving a ... village is made:

(a) the members of the council and all the employees of the ... village cease to have any further authority;

(b) all taxes and revenues due to the former ... village are deemed to be taxes and revenues due to the rural municipality in which the ... village is included;

(c) all rights of action and actions by or against the former ... village may be commenced, continued or maintained by or against the rural municipality in which the ... village is included;

(d) all land and improvements vested in the former ... village is vested in the rural municipality in which the ... village is included, and, subject to any trusts or other conditions that may be applicable, may be dealt with by it in its own name; and

(e) ... all other assets, liabilities, rights, duties, functions and obligations of the former ... village are vested in the rural municipality in which the ... village is included and may be dealt with by it in its own name.

2 The 1996 census taken pursuant to the *Statistics Act* (Canada) determined that the Village of Salvador has a population of 42.

3 By resolution dated October 20, 1997, the Council of the Village of Salvador requested that the village be dissolved.

4 It is deemed appropriate and in the public interest to dissolve the Village of Salvador at this time.

The undersigned, has the honour, therefore, to recommend that Your Honour's Order do issue pursuant to section 12 of *The Urban Municipality Act, 1984*:

(a) dissolving the Village of Salvador and including its area within the Rural Municipality of Grass Lake No. 381;

(b) confirming that the dissolution shall take effect on and from February 1, 1998;

(c) appointing Kim G. Gartner of Macklin, Saskatchewan, to adjust and settle the assets and liabilities of the Village of Salvador; and

(d) determining the remuneration payable to Kim G. Gartner to be \$15.00 per hour of work, and \$.3120 per travelled kilometre and reimbursement of related miscellaneous expenses.

SASKATCHEWAN COMMERCIAL EGG PRODUCERS' MARKETING BOARD

No. 33/98. The Saskatchewan Commercial Egg Producers' Marketing Board, pursuant to the provisions of the Saskatchewan Commercial Egg Producers' Marketing Plan, 1976 and *The Agri-Food Act*, hereby determines and orders as follows:

QUOTAS, PERMITS AND PRODUCTION UNITS

Producers and persons in respect of production units, quotas and permits and allocation of quotas and permits shall be subject to the following requirements, conditions and restrictions namely:

1 A quota shall be allotted by the Board only on the basis of an application which satisfies the following conditions:

- The application for quota is in the form prescribed by the Board.
- The applicant is of the full age of eighteen years or more on the date of application.
- The applicant is a resident of Saskatchewan.
- If the applicant is a partnership, co-operative, corporation, body corporate, unincorporated group or association, each person who has a beneficial interest therein is of the full age of eighteen years or more and is a resident of Saskatchewan.
- The applicant has not negotiated nor accepted a loan or financial assistance for the purpose of building or purchasing a production unit from a source other than a chartered bank, credit union, trust company or a like recognized financial institution, federal or provincial government credit and lending institution the vendor or a related person as defined in subsection 251(6) of the *Income Tax Act* (Canada).

2 (a) A quota that is allotted to an eligible person or producer shall relate to and be attached to a particular production unit situated on a legally defined parcel of land registered at the Land Titles Office and that complies with all related municipal and provincial codes and regulations.

(b) In order to be eligible for quota, a person shall not have more than one production unit on any land owned or leased or otherwise controlled by that person, without written permission of the Board.

(c) Quotas shall cover layers and all eggs produced by the layers.

(d) Allotted quotas shall be stated in numbers of layers.

(e) The quota period shall be for a calendar year or parts thereof.

(f) Each registered producer, who is licensed and in compliance with all Orders and Regulations, shall be eligible for quota renewal.

3 In order to be eligible for quota:

(a) The owner, lessee or major shareholder of a body corporate shall be personally engaged in the management and daily operation of the production unit.

(b) A production unit shall not be re-located without prior approval of the Board.

(c) Any person who sells a production unit or a part thereof, is not eligible to purchase a production unit or part thereof for a period of three years.

(d) The vendor and purchaser of a production unit shall attest and supply documentation upon Board request to verify that a monetary value is not attached to a quota.

4 New producers may apply for quota and existing licensed producers may apply for increased quota on an application form provided by the Board. Applications must be received by the Board and quota allotted by the Board at least 24 weeks prior to the placement of layers in a production unit.

5 Permits covering specific numbers of layers and for specific periods of time, may be allotted to licensed producers by the Board. Permit allotments shall not alter the producer's quota status.

6 Order No. 31/86 of the Saskatchewan Commercial Egg Producers' Marketing Board, effective the 21st day of September, 1984, is hereby revoked.

7 Order No. 33/98 is made pursuant to sections 15(p), 20 and 21 of the Saskatchewan Commercial Egg Producers' Marketing Plan, 1976, and shall be effective on, from and after the 26th day of January, 1998.

The Dental Disciplines Act

SASKATCHEWAN DENTAL HYGIENISTS ASSOCIATION BYLAWS

PART II – REGULATORY BYLAWS

Section 39 – Professional Conduct Committee

1 The professional conduct committee is responsible for carrying out the duties prescribed to it under the Act and these bylaws including investigating and reporting on all complaints.

2 Subject to subsection 29(5) of the Act, the professional conduct committee shall hold in confidence all sessions, documentation and information received. The professional conduct committee may provide to the council, the person, if any, who made the complaint and the member whose conduct is the subject of the complaint such information as the professional conduct committee deems advisable.

Section 40 – Discipline Committee

1 The duties of this committee shall be to:

(a) review the reports of the professional conduct committee and, where recommended by the professional conduct committee that the discipline committee hear and determine a complaint,

to conduct hearings to review the complaint set out in the written report including that a registrant has violated the provisions of the Act or bylaws of the association;

(b) determine whether the person whose conduct is the subject of a complaint or allegation is guilty of professional incompetence and/or professional misconduct;

(c) provide a written decision respecting the determination of the committee subsequent to any hearing conducted;

(d) exercise the disciplinary powers and authorities and conduct the procedures contained in the Act; and

(e) prepare and to provide to council an annual report of the number and nature of hearings conducted.

2 The discipline committee may hold in confidence any documentation or information before the committee if it is satisfied that:

(a) financial or personal or other matters may be disclosed of such a nature that the desirability of avoiding public disclosure of them in the interest of any person affected or in the public interest outweighs the desirability of adhering to the principle that hearings be open to the public;

(b) a person involved in a criminal proceeding or civil suit or proceedings may be prejudiced; and/or

(c) the action is required for any other reason which the discipline committee considers sufficient.

3 Where the committee determines that the person is not guilty of professional incompetence and/or professional misconduct, written notice that the complaint has been dismissed shall be provided to:

(a) the person who was the subject of the complaint; and

(b) the person who made the complaint.

REGISTRATION AND LICENSURE

Section 41 – Categories of Registration

1 A person may be registered in one of the following categories:

(a) full registration; or

(b) restricted registration.

Full Registration

2 A person will be granted approval for full registration with the association if the person:

(a) has graduated from a Canadian Dental Association (CDA) or American Dental Association (ADA) accredited dental hygiene education program approved by the council, and delivers to the registrar:

(i) a completed Application for Registration form;

(ii) a notarized copy, or other satisfactory evidence of his or her degree, diploma or certificate in dental hygiene;

(iii) proof of national certification in Canada;

(iv) proof of good character;

(v) notarized proof or other satisfactory evidence of good standing from the jurisdiction in which currently or last licensed; or

(b) has graduated from a dental hygiene education program which is not CDA or ADA accredited, but has had her or his qualifications approved by the registrar, and delivers to the registrar:

(i) proof of successful completion of the required practical examinations approved by the council; and

(ii) all items listed in subsection 41(2)(a)(i) to (v).

3 If the applicant for registration is registering for the first time following completion of dental hygiene education, the registrar may waive subsection 41(2)(a)(v).

4 Upon being granted full registration approval, the applicant must pay the non-refundable registration fee in order to be placed on the register of the association as a full registrant.

Restricted Registration

5 A person will be granted restricted registration and placed on the register of the association as a restricted registrant if the person:

- (a) provides proof of current licensure in another jurisdiction approved by the council;
- (b) undertakes to practise dental hygiene in the province of Saskatchewan only during a specified period of time and only for the purpose of participating in or conducting a clinical course, study club or research program sponsored by an agency approved by the credentials committee; and
- (c) delivers to the registrar a completed application for restricted registration together with the non-refundable registration fee.

Section 42 – Certificate of Registration

1 Upon approval of full registration and receipt of the registration fee, the registrar will issue to the applicant a certificate of full registration which may contain limitations specified by the Act, or these bylaws.

2 A certificate of full registration is valid until removed by the council or if the registrant does not hold a full, conditional or non-practising licence for a period of six months.

3 Upon approval of restricted registration, the registrar will issue to the applicant a certificate of restricted registration.

4 A certificate of restricted registration is valid until the end of the time specified in the certificate; or, until removed by the council.

Section 43 – Requirements for Practise

1 In order to practise as a dental hygienist in the province of Saskatchewan a person must:

- (a) be registered with the association as a full or restricted registrant; and
- (b) hold a current full or conditional licence to practise; or
- (c) hold a temporary permit to practise.

2 Registrants must display their certificates of registration in a conspicuous place at their place of practice.

Section 44 – Licences to Practise

1 A registrant may be issued one of the following licences to practise:

- (a) full licence;
- (b) conditional licence; or
- (c) non-practising licence.

Full Licence

2 A person shall be granted a full licence as a dental hygienist if the person:

- (a) is registered with the association as a full registrant;
- (b) pays the appropriate annual licence fee;
- (c) provides satisfactory evidence that she or he has successfully completed a council approved education program in the administration of local anesthesia; and
- (d) provides evidence of liability insurance as outlined in section 49 of these bylaws.

Conditional Licence

3 A person shall be granted a conditional licence as a dental hygienist if the person:

- (a) satisfies all the conditions in subsection 44(2) of these bylaws with the exception of subsection 44(2)(c); and
- (b) undertakes to participate in a council approved education program in administering local anesthesia within two years of when the conditional licence is granted;
- (c) a conditional licence holder shall only administer local anesthesia as part of her or his council approved education program.

4 A conditional licence holder shall be granted a full licence by the registrar upon successfully fulfilling the requirements of subsection 44(2)(c) of these bylaws.

5 A conditional licence holder who does not successfully complete a council approved local anesthesia education program within the two-year period stated in subsection 44(3)(b) of these bylaws will not be issued a further conditional licence.

Non-practising Licence

6 A person shall be granted a non-practising licence as a dental hygienist if the person:

- (a) holds full registration with the association;
- (b) pays the appropriate annual licence fee; and
- (c) is not practising dental hygiene in the current licensing period.

7 A person may be granted a non-practising licence for a total of no more than three consecutive licensing periods.

8 Non-practising members who apply for a full licence at any time in the current licensing period will have the non-practising licence fees credited towards the fee for a full licence.

Section 45 – Temporary Permit to Practise

1 A person shall be granted a temporary permit to practise as a dental hygienist if the person:

- (a) satisfies all the conditions for restricted registration outlined in subsection 41(5) of these bylaws; and
- (b) pays the appropriate temporary permit fee.

2 A temporary permit to practise will outline the services which the holder may perform and all terms, conditions and limitations that the credentials committee deems fit.

3 A temporary permit to practise is valid for a period of no more than two months from the date of issue.

Section 46 – Procedure for Registration and Licensing

1 Applications for full and/or restricted registration, all categories of licences, and temporary permits to practise shall be submitted by the applicant to the registrar upon:

- (a) completing the applicable application form(s);
- (b) providing evidence that the applicant has the prerequisite qualifications, as outlined in these bylaws, for the registration, licence, and/or temporary permit to practise applied for; and
- (c) paying the applicable registration, licence, and/or temporary permit to practise fee.

Section 47 – Licence Renewal

1 No later than 45 days before licences expire, the registrar must notify full registrants by regular mail at their last known address of the amount of their licence renewal fee, and the day on which the fee is due.

2 The registrar may renew a licence to practise if the full registrant submits to the registrar:

- (a) a completed Application For Licence Renewal form;
- (b) evidence of the required continuing education points as set out in section 52 of these bylaws;
- (c) the appropriate fee for renewal of the licence; and
- (d) any other outstanding fee, debt or levy owed to the association.

3 On receipt of the licence renewal fee and any arrears, the registrar must issue to the full registrant making payment a receipt under her or his hand and the seal of the association that the licensee is, subject to her or his compliance with the Act and these bylaws, entitled to practise dental hygiene in the Province of Saskatchewan as a full registrant of the association.

4 Where the registrar does not receive a completed Application For Licence Renewal form along with all required information and fees on or before midnight of January 15th, the licence of the full registrant will automatically expire.

Section 48 – Disclosure of Registration/Licensure Status

1 Where an inquiry about the registration/licensure status of a person is received by the council or registrar, the registrar must disclose whether or not the:

- (a) person is presently a full or restricted registrant;
- (b) person presently has a licence or a temporary permit to practise as a dental hygienist in the province of Saskatchewan;
- (c) person has previously been registered and/or licensed in Saskatchewan and whether her or his registration, licence and/or permit has been revoked as a result of discipline proceedings;

(d) person's practice of dental hygiene is restricted in any way and the nature of the restrictions; and

(e) person has ever had any other penalty pursuant to sections 31 and 34 of the Act imposed upon her or him.

2 Except with the consent of the person affected, the registrar must not release the names of complainants, clients, or their families or information which might otherwise enable a person inquiring about the status of a registrant to establish the identity of complainants, clients or their families.

Section 49 – Liability Insurance

1 Every dental hygienist who holds a full or conditional licence or a temporary permit to practise in the Province of Saskatchewan must be insured against liability for negligence in an amount of at least one million dollars per occurrence.

Section 50 – Reinstatement

1 A person whose registration and/or licence has been revoked or expired may make application to be reinstated by submitting to the credentials committee:

- (a) a completed Application For Reinstatement form;
- (b) any evidence the applicant desires the credentials committee to review in support of the reinstatement application;
- (c) the reinstatement fee(s); and
- (d) the applicable registration and/or licence fee owing.

2 On receipt of an application for reinstatement, the credentials committee shall review the evidence submitted. The credentials committee may conduct such additional investigations as the credentials committee considers appropriate. After reviewing the evidence submitted and completing any additional investigations which it believes warranted, the committee shall submit a report to the council which shall include the committee's opinion whether:

- (a) it is in the public interest to reinstate the applicant;
- (b) if the applicant is to be reinstated, what conditions, if any, should apply to the reinstatement.

3 If council does not grant reinstatement, the person may appeal the decision as outlined in subsections 41(5) and (6) of the Act.

Section 51 – Examinations

1 The council must approve all practical examinations required to be taken by these bylaws.

2 The council may prepare or direct the preparation of, and approve, practical examinations required to be taken under these bylaws.

3 When council prepares or directs the preparation of examinations, council shall:

- (a) determine the time and place for the holding of an examination, designate examiners and substitutes and determine the procedures for the conduct of the examination; and
- (b) review the results of the examination or re-examination for each applicant and make a determination as to that applicant's qualification for registration and licensure.

4 Applicants for examination shall pay to the association examination fees in the amount set by the council for council prepared examinations.

5 The council may approve practical examinations provided by other dental hygiene licensing bodies in lieu of council prepared examinations. Applicants will pay fees for these examinations directly to the licensing body providing the examination.

Section 52 – Continuing Education

1 Full registrants are not entitled to renew or obtain full or conditional licences unless they have filed with the registrar proof of having obtained the required number of continuing education points from council approved courses of continuing education, or have successfully completed council approved licensing examinations.

2 The "required number of continuing education points" referred to in subsection (1) means a minimum of 36 continuing education points over a three-year period for full registrants possessing full, conditional, or non-practising licences.

3 The "council approved courses of continuing education" referred to in subsection (1) means theoretical, practical or other instruction approved by the council.

4 The continuing education requirement begins on the first day of the month following date of issue.

5 A full registrant may elect to take the current council approved licensing examinations in lieu of obtaining the required number of continuing education points from council approved courses of continuing education as outlined in subsections (1), (2) and (3). If a full registrant elects to take the examinations, then the examinations must be successfully completed by the date the full registrant's continuing education points are due.

6 The registrar will provide to all full registrants a record of their continuing education points at least once annually.

Section 53 – Advertising

1 Nature of Advertising:

Advertising, promotion and other marketing activities must be in good taste, accurate and not capable of misleading the public, and observe the dignity and ethics of the profession. Any conduct, either directly or indirectly, or through any medium or agent that:

- (a) misinterprets facts;
- (b) compares either directly, indirectly or by innuendo, the member's services or ability with any other practitioner, or promises or offers more effective service or better results, than those available elsewhere;
- (c) deprecates another member as to service, ability or fees;
- (d) creates an unjustified expectation about the results the member can achieve;
- (e) is made under any false or misleading guise, or takes advantage, either physical, emotional or financial, of any patient or uses coercion, duress or harassment;
- (f) is undignified, in bad taste or otherwise offensive so as to be incompatible with the best interest of the public or members under *The Dental Disciplines Act, 1997*, or tend to harm the standing of the profession generally;
- (g) discloses the names of clients; or
- (h) makes statements which are not statements of fact or makes statements that cannot be proven to be accurate by the member;

is to be strictly avoided as such conduct is contrary to the interests of the public and the profession.

2 Forms of Permitted Advertising:

Subject to subsection (1) the forms and manner of advertising set out below are considered to be proper and in the best interests of the public and the profession and are permissible:

- (a) authorship of books on scientific or professional subjects, or the publication of articles or correspondence in professional journals;
- (b) the use of private professional cards;
- (c) the issuance of accounts and receipts;
- (d) the issuance of appointment cards; and
- (e) the mailing of recall notices.

3 Permitted Information:

It is permissible for a hygienist to include any or all of the following information on letterhead, private professional cards, accounts, receipts, and recall notices: his or her name, accepted abbreviations of recognized diplomas/degrees, profession, address, post box, telephone number and office hours. A dental hygienist's profession is "dental hygienist" or "dental hygiene".

4 Any member who advertises in a manner contrary to this bylaw, or who permits such advertising to be done on the member's behalf or permits any clinic with which the member is associated to advertise contrary to this bylaw, shall be guilty of unprofessional conduct and shall be subject to the provisions of *The Dental Disciplines Act, 1997*.

Section 54 – Code of Professional Ethics and Standards of Practice

1 Every registrant shall comply with the Code of Ethics and Standards of Practice as set out by the Canadian Dental Hygienists' Association (refer to Appendix A).

Section 55 – Conflict of Interest

1 Conflict of interest in matters involving association representatives, shall include:

- (a) elected members of council and executives;
- (b) members appointed to serve as delegates, committee members or committee chairs; and
- (c) employees of the association acting in an official capacity.

2 Members serving in an official capacity such as council members, committee members or executive, shall declare a conflict of interest in matters under discussion or in decisions taken in which they have a vested interest.

3 It shall be the responsibility of the presiding officer to ensure that members identifying a conflict of interest shall leave the meeting during consideration of the pertinent issue and that action shall be recorded by the secretary of the meeting.

4 A conflict of interest may be defined as, but is not limited to, the following:

Where the member is involved in:

- (a) negotiating wages and/or employment contracts, or completing performance appraisals for association staff who may be related to that member;
- (b) determining/reviewing credentials and registration/licensing eligibility for an applicant or another member who may be related to that member;
- (c) the investigation and/or discipline process affecting another member who may be related to that member; and
- (d) the adjudication or appeal of registration examination marks for a person related to that member.

Section 56 – Special Meeting Request

The council shall call a special meeting of the association on the written request of at least ten percent of the registrants.

APPENDIX A**CODE OF ETHICS****CANADIAN DENTAL HYGIENISTS' ASSOCIATION**

1992

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Preamble

The practice of dental hygiene can generally be defined as a helping relationship in which the dental hygienist assists the client, and society in general, in achieving and maintaining optimal oral health. Dental hygiene practitioners, educators, administrators, and researchers have as their ultimate goal, the maintenance and improvement of dental hygiene practice. Dental Hygiene has an identified body of knowledge and a distinctive expertise. The relationship between dentistry and dental hygiene should be one of professional collaboration in the provision of oral health care.

The Code of Ethics sets down the values and standards of the profession of dental hygiene. The values express the broad ideals of dental hygiene while the standards are moral obligations that have their basis in the dental hygiene values. Standards provide more specific direction for conduct than do values, and specify what a value requires under particular circumstances. The Code of Ethics functions as a means to educate the public about the profession's aspirations, ethical values and standards; and, disciplinary governance of the profession's behavior.

The purpose of the Code of Ethics is to:

1 Define and clarify ethical principles. At the beginning of each article, the ethical principles to which the values and standards apply are defined.

2 Identify the basic moral commitments of dental hygienists. These basic moral obligations are described under the standards in each article.

3 Serve as a source for education and reflection. It is the intent that this code of ethics will be used in Ethics courses to educate dental hygiene students to apply it to ethical dilemmas that occur during the education process, and to the work setting post graduation. For dental hygienists who are currently practicing dental hygiene it should serve as a guideline in resolving ethical dilemmas encountered in the employment setting.

4 Serve as a basis for self-evaluation and peer review. Dental hygienists should be able to determine if they practice dental hygiene in accordance with the values and standards outlined in this Code through self-assessment. When hygienists are participating in a peer review program, they should be able to determine if the hygienists being reviewed meets the values and standards of this code.

ETHICAL PROBLEMS

Ethical problems faced by practicing dental hygienists tend to fall into the categories of ethical violations, ethical dilemmas and ethical stress.

Ethical violations occur when dental hygienists fail to meet or neglect their moral obligations to their clients, e.g., a dental hygienist who does not provide competent care because of personal inconvenience has failed the client ethically.

Ethical dilemmas arise when ethical reasons both for and against a particular course of action are present and one option must be selected. There is usually a conflict among two or more ethical principals, e.g., a patient with a hip prosthesis may refuse to be pre-medicated prior to receiving invasive dental treatment. In this case, the principle of "respect for persons" conflicts with the principle of "beneficence".

Ethical distress occurs when dental hygienists experience the imposition of practices that provoke feeling of guilt, concern or distaste. For example, a dental hygienist may be expected by the employer to complete dental hygiene treatment with insufficient time to render quality care, or provide an acceptable level of infection control.

This Code provides clear direction for avoiding ethical violations. When a course of direction is mandated by the Code, and there exists no opposing ethical principle, ethical conduct requires that course of action.

In the case of ethical dilemmas and ethical distress, the Code cannot always provide clear direction. It is important to note that the resolution of any dilemma often depends on the specific circumstances of the case in question, and no particular resolutions may be totally satisfactory to all parties involved. Resolution may also depend upon which opposing ethical principle is considered to be most important, a matter about which reasonable people may disagree.

The Code can serve as a guide in helping dental hygienists consider their responsibilities in the case of ethical distress. Inevitably dental hygienists must reconcile their actions with their consciences in caring for clients.

Some problems are perceived to be "ethical" in nature, when in fact they are problems arising from poor communications among members of the dental profession, and/or with their clientele. It is important to determine if the dilemma is truly an "ethical" dilemma.

It is hoped that this Code will provide guidance to dental hygienists facing ethical problems, and that consideration and reflection of the Code will lead to better decision-making when ethical problems are encountered.

SECTION I – RESPONSIBILITIES TO THE CLIENT

The dental hygienist has a commitment to the welfare of clients in all practice settings, including but not limited to private practice, institutions, research, education, administration and community health.

Principle 1 – Respect for Persons

The ethical principle of Respect for Persons sees all human beings as possessing unconditional intrinsic value and having a capacity for rational choice.

Values

A dental hygienist has an obligation to treat clients with respect for their individual needs and values.

Standards

1(a) Clients seeking dental hygiene care will receive quality care regardless of religion, ethnic origin, social status, sex, sexual orientation, age and health status.

(b) When a client's autonomy is comprised due to psychiatric disorders, age (e.g., a young child) or medical condition (e.g., paralysis), the dental hygienist will facilitate the participation of family members or care givers in the oral health care of the client.

(c) When a client's autonomy is compromised due to illness (e.g., Alzheimer's disease) or other factors, the dental hygienist has an obligation to value autonomy in such clients by providing them with opportunities for choices within the client's capacities, to enhance their autonomy.

Principle 2 – Respect for Persons (Confidentiality)

In order to show proper respect for the client's autonomy and privacy, the dental hygienist must uphold the confidentiality of the professional-client relationship. Violations of confidentiality could make clients unwilling to disclose sensitive information that could be detrimental to the health and safety of both the client and the health care team.

Values

The dental hygienist has an obligation to hold confidential all information regarding a client learned in the health care setting.

Standards

2(a) Generally speaking, it is up to the clients to determine who shall be told of their condition in what detail.

(b) In describing confidentiality to a client, its boundaries should be revealed:

- i) Competent care requires that other members of a team of health personnel have access to or be provided with the relevant details of a client's condition.
- ii) In addition, discussions of the client's care may be required for the purposes of teaching, research or quality assurance. In these cases special care must be taken to protect the client's anonymity.

Whenever possible, the clients should be informed of these necessities prior to the onset of care.

(c) An affirmative duty exists to institute and maintain practices that protect client confidentiality, for example, by limiting access to records.

Principle 3 – Veracity and Informed Consent

Veracity is the ethical principle of honesty which provides meaningful communication in any moral relationship between two or more people.

Informed consent (derived from Respect to Persons): critical elements involved in the process of obtaining and proffering informed consent include disclosure, (i.e. the act of revealing pertinent information) voluntariness, (i.e. the ability to understand the information that is being given) and subject competence (i.e. the clinician's competence regarding subject matter). Health care providers have both a moral and legal obligation to make it possible for clients to decide important matters that effect their health.

Values

Based upon respect for clients and regard for their right to control their own care, dental hygienists must respect the right of choice held by clients.

Standards

3(a) The competent client's consent is an essential precondition to the provision of oral health care. Dental hygienists have a responsibility to inform clients of the dental hygiene care available to them, and to obtain informed consent from the client prior to rendering any treatment.

(b) Informed consent is the process by which a client becomes an active participant in care. All clients should be aided in becoming active participants in their care to the maximum extent that circumstances permit. Children who may be legally incompetent to consent should still be informed in accordance with the child's state of development and capacity to understand and involved in their oral health care. Parents and/or guardians must be fully informed.

(c) Force, coercion or manipulative tactics must not be employed in the obtaining of consent. It is unethical for dental hygienists to advocate a particular treatment plan in the absence of the presentation of alternative treatment plans. The client must be allowed to make an informed choice between treatment plan options as well as the option of no treatment.

(d) Any information being given to a client must be done in a truthful, understandable and sensitive way. It must precede with an awareness of the individual client's needs, interests and values. The information must be supplied in a manner consistent with the client's ability to understand the information being given.

(e) Dental hygienists should respond freely to their clients' requests for information and explanation when in possession of the knowledge to respond accurately. When the questions of the client are beyond the scope of the dental hygienist, the client should be informed of that fact and be referred to a more appropriate health care practitioner for a response.

(f) Dental hygienists should inform their licensing authority when an injury, dependency, infection, condition or any other serious incapacity has immediately affected, or may affect over time, their continuing ability to practice safely and competently.

Principle 4 – Beneficence and Quality Assurance

The ethical principle of beneficence is the doing of good, and the active promotion of good, kindness and charity.

Quality assurance is the assessment or measurement of quality of care and the implementation of any necessary changes to either maintain or improve the quality of care.

Values

The dental hygienist is obligated to provide competent care as currently described in The Clinical Practice Standards for Canadian Dental Hygienists in Canada.

Standards

4(a) The dental hygienist actively promotes educational and clinical procedures to improve the oral health status of clients.

(b) The dental hygienist participates in the assessment, planning, implementation and evaluation of comprehensive programs of oral health care. The scope of a dental hygienist's responsibility should be based on education, and experience, as well as legal considerations of licensure and registration.

(c) Dental hygienists accepting professional employment must determine if the conditions will permit provision of care consistent with the Practice Standards for Canadian Dental Hygienists, and the values and standards of the Code of Ethics for Dental Hygienists. Prospective employers should be informed of the Practice Standards and the Code so that realistic and ethical expectations may be established at the beginning of the employer/employee relationship.

(d) Administrators (e.g., Public Health, Schools of Dental Hygiene) have an ethical responsibility to ensure the competencies of personnel and the welfare of clients.

(e) The dental hygiene student-client relationship must be in keeping with the ethical dental hygiene practice and maintaining the dignity of the client. Dental hygiene educators are obligated to ensure that dental hygiene students are knowledgeable of, and comply with, the provisions of the Code.

(f) Research is necessary for the development of the dental hygiene body of knowledge. Dental hygienists should be knowledgeable of the advances in research so that established results may be incorporated into practice. Dental hygienists are encouraged to engage in, or to assist and encourage, research designed to enhance the health and welfare of clients.

Dental hygiene research must conform to ethical dental hygiene and research practices.

(g) The dental hygienist accepts responsibility for working with provincial and national dental hygiene associations to secure quality care for clients.

(h) Dental hygienists should engage in continuing education and in the advancement of skills relevant to the practice setting.

Principle 5 – Justice

The ethical principle of justice refers to “what is deserved.” People have been treated justly when they have been given what is due or owed, what they deserve, or can legitimately claim.

Values

The dental hygienist, as a member of the dental profession, is obligated to take steps to ensure that the client receives competent ethical care.

Standards

5(a) Client care should represent a collaborative effort, drawing on the expertise of dental hygiene, dentistry and other health professions when appropriate. Recognizing personal and/or professional limitations, the dental hygienist refers clients who require more complex care or care outside the scope of dental hygiene care.

(b) The first consideration of the dental hygienist who suspects incompetence or unethical conduct by members of the dental profession should be the welfare of present clients and/or potential harm to future clients. The following should also be considered.

- i) The dental hygienist is obligated to confirm the facts of the situation to decide on an appropriate course of action.
- ii) Institutional mechanisms (e.g., educational programs, public health) for reporting incidents or risks of incompetent or unethical care should be followed.
- iii) Incidents involving unethical care that cannot be resolved within the practice setting should be reported to the appropriated licensing authority.
- iv) The dental hygienist who attempts to protect clients threatened by incompetent or unethical conduct should not be placed in jeopardy (e.g., loss of employment). Colleagues and professional organizations are morally obligated to support dental hygienists who fulfill their ethical obligations under the Code.

SECTION II – RESPONSIBILITIES TO THE PROFESSION OF DENTAL HYGIENE

Values

The dental hygienist is obligated to uphold the ethics of the dental hygiene profession before colleagues and others.

Standards

6(a) Dental hygienists serving on committees concerned with dental health care or research should see their role as including representation of dental hygiene’s professional ethics.

(b) Dental hygienists should become involved in public issues which relate to oral health care. Involvement in civic activities allows the opportunity to promote dental hygiene care and to fulfill the duties of a citizen.

SECTION III – RESPONSIBILITIES OF C.D.H.A. AND PROVINCIAL ASSOCIATIONS

Values

The Canadian Dental Hygienists’ Association recognizes a responsibility to clarify, secure and sustain ethical dental hygiene practice. The fulfillment of these tasks requires that professional organizations remain responsive to the rights, needs and legitimate interests of clients and dental hygienists.

Standards

7(a) Sustained communication and cooperation between the Canadian Dental Hygienists’ Association, professional associations and other related associations such as the Canadian Dental Association is an essential step towards securing ethical dental hygiene practice.

(b) Provincial and national dental hygiene associations must accept responsibility for assuring quality dental hygiene care for clients.

(c) Professional dental hygiene associations have a role in representing dental hygiene interests and perspectives before non-dental hygiene bodies, including but not limited to legislatures, employers and the professional organizations of other health disciplines and the public media of communication.

(d) Professional dental hygiene associations should provide and encourage organizational structures that facilitate ethical dental hygiene practice.

Changing circumstances may call for reconsideration of the Code. Supplementation of the Code may be necessary to address special situations. Professional associations should consider the ethics of dental hygiene on a regular and continual basis and be prepared to provide assistance to those concerned with its implementation.

Education in the ethical aspects of dental hygiene should be available to dental hygienists throughout their careers. Dental hygiene associations should actively support or develop structures designated toward this end.

**EXTRACTS FROM THE RULES AND
PROCEDURES OF THE LEGISLATIVE
ASSEMBLY OF SASKATCHEWAN
RELATING TO PRIVATE BILLS**

PETITIONS

12(1) A petition to the Assembly may be presented by a Member at any time during the sitting of the Assembly by filing the same with the Clerk of the Assembly.

(6) Petitions may be either written or printed, provided always that when there are three or more petitioners, the signatures of at least three petitioners shall be subscribed on the sheet containing the prayer of the petition.

(9) No petition can be received which prays for any expenditure, grant or charge on the public revenue, whether payable out of the Consolidated Fund or out of moneys to be provided by the Assembly.

NOTE: *A form of Petition can be obtained on application to the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly.*

PRIVATE BILLS

64(1) All petitions for Private Bills shall be in duplicate and shall be filed with the Clerk of the Assembly not later than the twentieth sitting day of the Session.

(2) No petition for any Private Bill shall be received by the Assembly if presented after the first twenty-five sitting days of the Session.

(3) No Private Bill may be introduced in the Assembly after the first thirty sitting days of the Session.

65(1) Every applicant for a Private Bill shall deposit with the Clerk of the Assembly along with the petition for same, two copies of the bill, with marginal notes inserted, and an accepted cheque payable to the Minister of Finance for the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, if the said bill does not exceed ten pages, and fifteen dollars additional for each page over that number, four hundred and fifty words shall be held to constitute a page.

(2) In the case of a bill incorporating a company, a receipt from the Registrar of Joint Stock Companies for any statutory fees required shall also be deposited with the Clerk of the Assembly.

66 No remittance of a deposit on account of a Private Bill or any portion thereof shall be ordered by the Assembly unless the same has been recommended by the committee charged with its consideration, or unless the bill has been withdrawn, rejected or not reported upon, in which cases the actual expenses incurred shall be deducted from the deposit received before making such remittance.

68(1) All petitions to the Legislature for Private Bills of any nature whatsoever, shall require a notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application and where the same refers to any proposed work, indicating generally the location of the work, and signed by and on behalf of the petitioners, with the address of the party signing the same; and when the petition is for an act of incorporation the name of the proposed company shall be stated in the notice.

(2) Such notice shall be published prior to the filing of the petition with the Clerk of the Assembly as required in Rule 64(1) in two consecutive issues of *The Saskatchewan Gazette* and four consecutive issues of a newspaper, published in English and having circulation in the locality affected.

(3) A copy of the notice with a statutory declaration of the several publications of advertisement shall be filed with the Clerk of the Assembly along with the petition and bill.

69(2) Every bill for an act of incorporation, where a form of model bill has been adopted, shall be drawn in accordance with such model bill, copies of which may be obtained from the Clerk of the Assembly. Any provisions contained in any such bill which are not in accord with the model bill shall be inserted between brackets and shall be so printed.

72 When any bill for confirming any agreement is filed with the Clerk of the Assembly a true copy of such agreement must be attached to it.

COMMITTEE RULING

In cases where the proposed bill provides that the property to be used or occupied by the petitioner be exempt from taxation, either in whole or in part, the petitioner must file with the Clerk of the Assembly, along with the petition, a written statement from the local municipal authority in which the said property is situated approving the intent of the provisions of the proposed bill which provide for the exemption from taxation.

The name of the Member who is to present the petition and Private Bill must be furnished to the Clerk of the Assembly at the time of filing the petition. Such Member should not, of course, be a Member of the Cabinet.

PROJETS DE LOI D'INTÉRÊT PRIVÉ

64(1) Deux exemplaires des pétitions introductives de projets de loi d'intérêt privé sont déposés auprès du greffier dans les vingt jours de séance de l'ouverture de la session.

(2) Seules sont recevables par l'Assemblée, les pétitions introductives de projet de loi d'intérêt privé qui sont présentées dans les vingt-cinq jours de séance de l'ouverture de la session.

(3) Les projets de loi d'intérêt privé ne peuvent être déposés à l'Assemblée que dans les trente jours de séance de l'ouverture de la session.

65(1) Les personnes qui demandent un projet de loi d'intérêt privé déposent auprès du greffier, outre la pétition connexe, deux exemplaires du projet de loi qui portent les notes marginales ainsi qu'un chèque visé payable au ministre des Finances, au montant de deux cent cinquante dollars si le projet de loi est composé d'au plus dix pages; ce montant est majoré de quinze dollars par page supplémentaire. Une page est réputée renfermer quatre cent cinquante mots.

(2) Si le projet de loi prévoit la constitution d'une société, le récépissé des droits réglementaires donné par le registraire des sociétés par action est également déposé auprès du greffier.

66 L'Assemblée ne peut ordonner la remise totale ou partielle des dépôts relatifs aux projets de loi d'intérêt privé, sauf recommandation du comité chargé d'étudier le projet en question ou si celui-ci est retiré ou rejeté ou encore n'est pas rapporté. Les dépenses réelles sont déduites du dépôt avant de le remettre.

68(1) Toutes les pétitions introductives de projets de loi d'intérêt privé à l'adresse de la Législature nécessitent un avis qui expose clairement la nature et l'objet de la demande et qui est signé par les requérants et en leur nom, avec mention de l'adresse des signataires. Les avis qui visent des travaux proposés font état de leur site; ceux qui visent une loi de constitution en société font état du nom de la société.

(2) Les avis sont publiés, avant le dépôt de la pétition auprès du greffier de l'Assemblée conformément au paragraphe 64(1), dans deux numéros consécutifs de la *Gazette de la Saskatchewan* ainsi que dans quatre numéros consécutifs d'un journal anglais diffusé dans la région touchée.

(3) Sont déposées auprès du greffier de l'Assemblée, outre la pétition et le projet de loi, copie de l'avis ainsi qu'une déclaration solennelle qui atteste les diverses publications de l'annonce.

69(2) Si une formule-type de projet de loi a été adoptée, les projets de loi portant constitution des sociétés sont rédigés selon cette formule, dont les exemplaires sont disponibles chez le greffier de l'Assemblée. Les dispositions de ces projets de loi qui ne se conforment pas à la formule-type sont indiquées et imprimées entre crochets.

72 Une copie conforme de l'accord est annexée aux projets de loi portant ratification d'un accord, qui sont déposés auprès du greffier de l'Assemblée.

DÉCISION EN COMITÉ

Dans les cas où la proposition de projet de loi prévoit que les biens devant être utilisés ou occupés par le requérant soient exempts d'impôts, que ce soit dans leur ensemble ou partiellement, le requérant devra déposer au bureau du greffier de l'Assemblée en plus de sa pétition, une déclaration par écrit des autorités municipales locales où se trouvent les biens en question approuvant l'objet des dispositions de la proposition de projet de loi qui prévoit l'exemption d'impôts.

Le nom du député qui présentera la pétition et le projet de loi doit être fourni au greffier de l'Assemblée lors du dépôt de la pétition. Il est entendu que le député en question ne peut être un membre du Cabinet.
