**CHAPTER D-8 REG 2**

*The Department of Agriculture Act*

Section 29

Order in Council 900/85, dated August 9, 1985.

(Filed August 12, 1985)

ORDER

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council, on the recommendation of the Minister of Agriculture, pursuant to section 29 of *The Department of Agriculture Act*, makes *The 1985 Livestock Drought Assistance Program Regulations* in accordance with the attached Schedule.

SCHEDULE

- 1 These regulations may be cited as *The 1985 Livestock Drought Assistance Program Regulations*. \*Title
- 2 In these regulations: Interpretation
- (a) "designated area" means an area of Saskatchewan designated by the minister pursuant to section 3; \*designated area\*
- (b) "Drought Assistance Program 1984" means the program established pursuant to an agreement between the Government of Canada and the Government of Saskatchewan dated October 1, 1984 and approved by Order in Council 1091/84; \*Drought Assistance Program 1984\*
- (c) "eligible applicant" means: \*eligible applicant\*
- (i) an individual who is:
- (A) a Canadian citizen or permanent resident of Canada;
- (B) a resident of Saskatchewan; and
- (C) actively engaged in farming;
- (ii) a corporation that is incorporated, continued or registered pursuant to *The Business Corporations Act* whose head office is in Saskatchewan, where all the shareholders of the corporation are individuals described in clause (a);

(iii) a co-operative that is incorporated, continued or registered pursuant to *The Co-operatives Act*, where all the members of the co-operative are persons described in clause (a);

(iv) a partnership where all the partners are individuals described in clause (a);

\*eligible livestock\*

(d) "eligible livestock" means:

(i) beef cattle, dairy cattle and horses, where the beef cattle, dairy cattle or horses, as the case may be:

(A) are owned by an eligible applicant on June 1, 1985;

(B) in the case of females, have been exposed to breeding in 1985;

(C) in the case of sires or stallions, as the case may be, have been used for breeding in 1985; and

(D) were not born in 1985;

(ii) sheep and goats, where the sheep or goats, as the case may be:

(A) are owned by an eligible applicant on June 1, 1985;

(B) in the case of females, have been exposed to breeding in 1985;

(C) in the case of males, have been used for breeding in 1985;

\*moderate zone\*

(e) "moderate zone" means the area within the designated area that is, in the opinion of the minister, moderately affected by drought;

\*payment\*

(f) "payment" means a payment of financial assistance made by the minister pursuant to section 5;

\*rural municipality\*

(g) "rural municipality" means a rural municipality within the meaning of *The Rural Municipality Act*;

\*severe zone\*

(h) "severe zone" means the area within the designated area that is, in the opinion of the minister, severely affected by drought.

Designation

3(1) The minister may designate any area of Saskatchewan as a designated area for the purposes of these regulations where, in his opinion, the area is subject to drought conditions and the owners of eligible livestock are in need of financial assistance.

(2) The minister may designate an area within the designated area as:

(a) a severe zone, where, in his opinion, that area is severely affected by drought;

(b) a moderate zone, where, in his opinion, that area is moderately affected by drought.

**4(1)** Subject to subsections (2) and (3), where an eligible Application applicant:

- (a) conducts a livestock operation within a designated area; and
- (b) wishes to obtain a payment with respect to eligible livestock owned by him;

he shall apply to the minister on an application form provided by the minister on or before December 31, 1985.

(2) Where an eligible applicant applies pursuant to subsection (1), he shall submit his application form to the office of the rural municipality in which he resides.

(3) The application form mentioned in subsection (1) is required to include:

- (a) a list of female eligible livestock and of male eligible livestock owned by the eligible applicant on June 1, 1985;
- (b) a declaration to be signed by the eligible applicant that he agrees to authorize any employees of the department or any other persons the minister may designate to inspect his livestock operations and records on or before July 31, 1986 and to assist those employees and persons in carrying out an audit for the purposes of these regulations; and
- (c) a declaration that at least 50% of the land that the eligible applicant leases or owns and uses to provide hay and pasture for his eligible livestock is located in a designated area.

(4) In order to be eligible for a payment, an eligible applicant shall:

- (a) agree to authorize any employees of the department or any other persons the minister may designate to inspect his livestock operations and records on or before July 31, 1986 and to assist those employees and persons in carrying out an audit for the purposes of these regulations;
- (b) have at least 50% of the land that he owns or leases and uses to provide hay and pasture for his eligible livestock located in a designated area; and
- (c) own, as at June 1, 1985, the eligible livestock with respect to which he is applying for a payment;

and, where an eligible applicant fails to comply with this section, any receipt of a payment by him is deemed to be an overpayment.

**5(1)** Where the minister:

Payment

- (a) receives an application pursuant to section 4; and

(b) is satisfied that the eligible applicant has complied with these regulations;

he may approve the application and make a payment of financial assistance to the eligible applicant in an amount calculated in accordance with subsections (2) and (3).

(2) Subject to subsection (3), where the minister makes a payment of financial assistance to an eligible applicant pursuant to subsection (1), he shall make a payment of financial assistance to the eligible applicant in an amount equal to, for each head of eligible livestock owned by the eligible applicant and for which he is applying for assistance:

(a) where the eligible applicant resides in a severe zone:

- (i) in the case of beef cattle, dairy cattle or horses, \$60;
- (ii) in the case of sheep or goats, \$12;

(b) where the eligible applicant resides in a moderate zone:

- (i) in the case of beef cattle, dairy cattle or horses, \$30;
- (ii) in the case of sheep or goats, \$6.

(3) Where an eligible applicant received an overpayment pursuant to the Drought Assistance Program, 1984, the minister shall make a payment of financial assistance to the eligible applicant in an amount equal to the positive difference between:

(a) the amount calculated pursuant to subsection (2); and

(b) the amount of the overpayment received pursuant to the Drought Assistance Program, 1984 that is due at the date the minister approves the eligible applicant's application.

**Overpayment 6** Where an overpayment pursuant to the regulations occurs for any reason, the overpayment is deemed to be a debt due to Her Majesty in right of Saskatchewan and, in addition to any other manner in which it may be recovered, may be recovered by deducting the amount of the overpayment from any other payments, grants or allowances to which the eligible applicant is entitled pursuant to any other program of the Government of Saskatchewan providing for payments to that eligible applicant.

**Coming into force 7** These regulations come into force on the day on which they are filed with the Registrar of Regulations.

**CHAPTER D-8 REG 3**

*The Department of Agriculture Act*  
Section 29

Order in Council 907/85, dated August 15, 1985.

(Filed August 16, 1985)

ORDER

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council, on the recommendation of the Minister of Agriculture, pursuant to section 29 of *The Department of Agriculture Act*, makes *The Grasshopper Control Assistance Program Regulations* in accordance with the attached Schedule.

SCHEDULE

- 1 These regulations may be cited as *The Grasshopper Control Assistance Program Regulations*. \*Title
- 2 In these regulations: \*Interpretation
- (a) "assistance" means assistance paid by the minister pursuant to section 4; \*assistance\*
- (b) "eligible insecticides" means a control product, as defined in the *Pest Control Products Act* (Canada), as amended from time to time, that is: \*eligible insecticides\*
- (i) used to control grasshoppers; and
- (ii) registered and used in accordance with the *Pest Control Products Act* (Canada), as amended from time to time, and the regulations made pursuant to that Act;
- (c) "individual" means an individual who resides in a rural municipality; \*individual\*
- (d) "road allowance" means a road allowance in a rural municipality that is laid out pursuant to the authority of an Act or an Act of Canada; \*road allowance\*
- (e) "rural municipality" means a rural municipality within the meaning of *The Rural Municipality Act*. \*rural municipality\*
- 3(1) Subject to subsections (2) and (3), where: \*Application
- (a) a rural municipality or individuals have applied eligible insecticides to road allowances during 1985; and
- (b) the rural municipality wishes to obtain assistance to reimburse the rural municipality or individuals for the costs incurred by them in purchasing the eligible insecticides;

the rural municipality shall submit an application to the minister on the form provided by the minister.

(2) In order to be eligible for assistance, a rural municipality must submit its application pursuant to subsection (1) on or before December 31, 1985.

(3) The application mentioned in subsection (1) is to include a schedule, on a form provided by the minister, showing:

(a) the name of the rural municipality and the names of all individuals who have applied eligible insecticides during 1985; and

(b) with respect to each application of an eligible insecticide on a road allowance:

(i) the location of the road allowance;

(ii) the type of eligible insecticide applied;

(iii) the rate at which eligible insecticide was applied;

(iv) the approximate area to which eligible insecticide was applied as expressed in acres; and

(v) the cost of purchasing the eligible insecticide to conduct the application.

(4) Where individuals have applied eligible insecticide on a road allowance and the rural municipality has applied for assistance to the individuals, the application mentioned in subsection (1) is to be accompanied by a declaration, on a form provided by the minister, signed by each individual on whose behalf the rural municipality is applying and witnessed by a commissioner for oaths or a notary public, declaring, with respect to each individual:

(a) his name;

(b) his address;

(c) particulars of each application by him of insecticide and the cost of the eligible insecticide applied; and

(d) a statement that the information contained in the declaration is true to the best of his knowledge and belief.

(5) The reeve of the rural municipality and the administrator, secretary or secretary treasurer of the rural municipality shall sign the application mentioned in subsection (1).

Assistance

**4(1)** Where the minister:

(a) has received an application from a rural municipality pursuant to section 3;

(b) is satisfied that the application conforms to the requirements of section 3;

he may provide assistance to the rural municipality in an amount required to reimburse the rural municipality and the

individuals on whose behalf it is applying for the costs incurred in purchasing eligible insecticides applied on road allowances during 1985.

(2) Where a rural municipality has applied for assistance to reimburse individuals and it receives assistance from the minister, the rural municipality shall pay to those individuals any moneys it receives as assistance to reimburse those individuals in the amounts disclosed on the application as the costs incurred by those individuals in purchasing eligible insecticides.

## CHAPTER D-24.1 REG 7

### *The Department of Urban Affairs Act*

#### Section 20

Order in Council 894/85, dated August 9, 1985.

(Filed August 12, 1985)

#### ORDER

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council, on the recommendation of the Minister of Urban Affairs, pursuant to section 20 of *The Department of Urban Affairs Act*, makes *The Farm Implement Dealers Property Tax Rebate Program Regulations* in accordance with the attached Schedule.

#### SCHEDULE

1 These regulations may be cited as *The Farm Implement Dealers Property Tax Rebate Program Regulations*. Title

2 In these regulations:

Interpretation

(a) "applicant" means a person who during 1985 is a licensed main line farm implement dealer; \*applicant\*

(b) "licensed main line farm implement dealer" means a dealer who sells tractors, combines, swathers, forage harvesters, balers or grinder mixers and is licensed pursuant to section 26 of *The Agricultural Implements Act*; \*licensed main line farm implement dealer\*

(c) "property tax" means:

\*property tax\*

(i) a tax that is levied on the assessment, as shown on the assessment roll of a municipality, for municipal, school or hospital purposes;

- (ii) where levied, a local improvement tax pursuant to *The Local Improvements Act* shown on the tax notice; and
- (iii) where levied, a conservation and development tax pursuant to *The Conservation and Development Act* shown on the tax notice;

\*grant\* (d) "grant" means a rebate payable pursuant to these regulations;

\*municipality\* (e) "municipality" means an urban, rural or northern municipality.

Grant **3(1)** The minister may make a grant to a licensed main line farm implement dealer in the amount of 25% of the property tax levied in 1985.

(2) A grant may be calculated on a portion of the 1985 property taxes.

Application **4(1)** Every applicant for a grant shall complete and submit his application on the form that is provided by the minister and shall include with his application:

(a) a copy or reasonable facsimile of the tax notice issued by the municipality; and

(b) a receipt, certificate or other authentic document indicating that an amount equal to the 1985 property tax has been paid to the municipality before the date of the application and not later than December 31, 1985.

(2) No grant is payable to an applicant who fails to submit his application on or before February 1, 1986.

Minister's decision final **5** A decision of the minister regarding the eligibility of a dealer for a grant is final.

Repayment of grant **6** The minister may order a person who contravenes these regulations to remit to the Minister of Finance, immediately or within a stated period, an amount equal to the amount of the grant paid to the person.

Coming into force **7** These regulations come into force on the day on which they are filed with the Registrar of Regulations.

**CHAPTER N-3 REG 1**

*The Natural Products Marketing Act*

Sections 11, 14 and 31

Order in Council 898/85, dated August 9, 1985.

(Filed August 12, 1985)

**ORDER**

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council, on the recommendation of the Minister of Agriculture and on being satisfied that a vote of producers was held on June 17, 1985 at which not less than 60% of the producers, who voted, voted in favour of the establishment of the plan, pursuant to sections 11, 14 and 31 of *The Natural Products Marketing Act* :

- (a) makes *The Broiler Hatching Egg Marketing Plan Regulations* in accordance with the attached Schedule; and
- (b) appoints as a provisional board of directors for the plan effective on the day on which *The Broiler Hatching Egg Marketing Plan Regulations* come into force the following persons:
  - (i) Mr. Mervin Slater — Tramping Lake
  - (ii) Mr. Gerald Leduc — Assiniboia
  - (iii) Mr. Ralph Isaac — Donavon

**SCHEDULE**

- 1 These regulations may be cited as *The Broiler Hatching Egg Marketing Plan Regulations*. Title
  
- 2 In these regulations: Interpretation
  - (a) "Act" means *The Natural Products Marketing Act*; "Act"
  - (b) "board" means the Saskatchewan Broiler Hatching Egg Producers Marketing Board elected in accordance with sections 22 to 25 and includes any provisional board; "board"
  - (c) "broiler breeder" means that class of meat-type hen that is raised to produce broiler chicken hatching eggs; "broiler, breeder"
  - (d) "hatchery" means any egg hatching facility that is licensed in Saskatchewan or any egg hatching facility that is required by an Act or regulations to be licensed to operate in Saskatchewan; "hatchery"
  - (e) "hatching eggs" means any eggs produced by a producer for the purpose of hatching; "hatching eggs"
  - (f) "plan" means the Saskatchewan Broiler Hatching Egg Marketing Plan established pursuant to section 3; "plan"

- "producer" (g) "producer" means any person who:
- (i) is engaged in the production and marketing within Saskatchewan of hatching eggs from 200 or more broiler breeders and includes the employer of any such person;
  - (ii) is entitled under any lease or agreement to a share of the hatching eggs produced by a person mentioned in subclause (i) or the proceeds from the sale of those eggs; or
  - (iii) takes possession of any hatching eggs pursuant to any form of security or legal proceeding for a debt;
- and for the purposes of section 14 of the Act, means a producer described in subclause (i), (ii) or (iii) who is operating a production unit which was engaged in the production and marketing of hatching eggs from 200 or more broiler breeders during the years 1982, 1983 or 1984 or is so engaging in 1985 before the vote with respect to the establishment of the plan is held, but does not include a person whose hatchery has no production unit;
- "production unit" (h) "production unit" means the buildings, structures, equipment and land used for the production and marketing of hatching eggs;
- "provisional board" (i) "provisional board" means the provisional board of directors appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council;
- "quota" (j) "quota" means the written authority to market the hatching eggs produced from a given number of broiler breeders on an annual basis;
- "registered producer" (k) "registered producer" means a producer who is registered with the board and whose registration is in good standing.

PLAN

- Plan established **3** The Saskatchewan Broiler Hatching Egg Marketing Plan is established.
- Application **4** Subject to the exemptions set out in section 5 and to any exemptions made by the board, the plan and the orders of the board made pursuant to the plan apply to:
- (a) all of Saskatchewan; and
  - (b) all producers.
- Exemptions **5(1)** These regulations do not apply to:
- (a) producers who market hatching eggs only between February 1 and May 31 of each year;
  - (b) research institutions producing hatching eggs for research purposes.

**6(1)** The general purpose and intent of the plan is to provide for orderly marketing in the Saskatchewan hatching egg industry. Purposes

(2) Without limiting the generality of subsection (1), the specific purposes of the plan are:

- (a) to regulate the production and marketing of hatching eggs in an orderly manner in Saskatchewan;
- (b) to maintain a stable price for hatching eggs that is relative to the cost of production;
- (c) to ensure the availability of an adequate supply of hatching eggs to meet the market demand;
- (d) to establish marketing quotas for producers;
- (e) to initiate, or co-operate in, research and education relating to the production and marketing of hatching eggs; and
- (f) to co-operate with federal and extra-provincial marketing bodies with similar purposes.

BOARD

**7(1)** The Saskatchewan Broiler Hatching Egg Producers Marketing Board shall consist of three registered producers elected in accordance with sections 22 to 25. Administra-  
tion

(2) The board shall administer the plan.

(3) The provisional board shall administer the plan until a board is elected in accordance with sections 22 to 25.

**8(1)** The board is vested with the power: Powers of  
board

- (a) to regulate the time and place at which and the agency through which hatching eggs are marketed;
- (b) to regulate the manner of distribution, quantity, grade and class of hatching eggs that are marketed by any producer at any time;
- (c) to prohibit, in whole or in part, the transportation, packing, storing or marketing of any quantity, grade or class of hatching eggs;
- (d) to market, including grading, hatching eggs either as principal or agent;
- (e) to exempt from any order or regulation any person or class of persons engaged in the production or marketing of hatching eggs or any class, variety or grade of hatching eggs;
- (f) to require any or all producers to register with and obtain licences from the board and provide any guarantees of financial responsibility that it considers necessary;

- (g) to issue licences, fix and collect licence fees, collect charges for services rendered by it and collect penalties from any or all producers, and for those purposes to classify such producers into groups and fix the licence fees and charges payable by the members of the different groups, and to recover any such licence fees, charges or penalties by suit in any court of competent jurisdiction;
- (h) to cancel or suspend any licence for violation of any part or provision of the plan, of any order of the board or of the regulations and to reinstate any cancelled or suspended licence;
- (i) to require from all producers full information relating to the production or marketing of hatching eggs, as well as periodic information in any form that it may determine;
- (j) to inspect the records of production of hatching eggs and the premises of producers at its discretion;
- (k) to fix or determine the price or prices or minimum price or prices at which hatching eggs, or any quality, grade or class thereof, may be bought or offered for sale in Saskatchewan;
- (l) to require the person in charge of any vehicle in which hatching eggs may be transported to permit any person designated by the board to search the vehicle;
- (m) to seize, remove and dispose of any hatching eggs marketed in violation of an order of the board and retain or otherwise dispose of the proceeds thereof;
- (n) to use any moneys it receives in carrying out the purposes of the plan and paying its expenses;
- (o) to borrow, raise or secure the payment of money in any manner that it considers appropriate for the proper administration of the plan;
- (p) to draw, make, accept, endorse, execute, issue, hypothecate or assign promissory notes, bills of exchange and other negotiable or transferable instruments;
- (q) to purchase, take on lease or in exchange or otherwise acquire real property for the purpose of its business and to sell or otherwise dispose of, or mortgage, real property acquired by it;
- (r) subject to the approval of the council, to make such orders as in its opinion are necessary or advisable to promote, control and regulate the production and marketing of hatching eggs and to amend or revoke such orders; and
- (s) to carry out educational and research programs relating to hatching eggs.

(2) The board may accept and exercise any power or authority delegated to it by or pursuant to the *Agricultural Products Marketing Act* (Canada), as amended from time to time, in relation to any power, authority or function that may be conferred or imposed pursuant to that Act.

**9(1)** The board shall maintain any books and records that may be required for the proper administration of the plan and keep those books and records open for inspection by the council during normal office hours at the head office of the board. Books and records

(2) The board shall maintain a head office in Saskatchewan.

**10(1)** Subject to subsection (2), the registered producers shall appoint an auditor for the board at the annual or any special meeting of the registered producers, and the auditor shall audit the books and records of the board. Auditor

(2) Where an auditor is not appointed pursuant to subsection (1), the board shall appoint an auditor.

**11(1)** The board may appoint any committees that it considers necessary or desirable for the proper administration of the plan. Committees

(2) The board shall appoint a conciliation committee consisting of:

- (a) a chairman appointed by the board;
- (b) one member appointed by the Saskatchewan Hatchery Association; and
- (c) one member appointed by the Saskatchewan Department of Agriculture;

and the board shall refer all matters in which a person considers that he has been aggrieved by a decision of the board to that committee for recommendation and where the person is not satisfied with the board's decision he may proceed to appeal the grievance to the council pursuant to section 19 of the Act.

(3) The members of a committee appointed pursuant to this section are entitled to any remuneration and reimbursement for expenses that the board may determine.

**12(1)** The board shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman from among its members. Chairman and vice-chairman

(2) The chairman, or in his absence the vice-chairman, shall preside at all meetings of the board.

(3) A majority of the board constitutes a quorum at any meeting of the board.

(4) A resolution of the board is to be passed by a majority of the board except where only two board members are present and in that case the resolution is to be passed unanimously.

(5) A member of the board shall disclose to the board any matter that is to be the subject of a decision of the board with respect to which he has:

(a) a direct financial interest that is different from the financial interest of other producers; or

(b) a bias of any other kind;

and shall excuse himself from voting on the matter.

**Remuneration** 13(1) The board may appoint or hire a manager and any other staff or agents to administer the plan and may fix the remuneration for those employees.

(2) The registered producers shall, at each annual meeting, fix the remuneration to be paid to the board.

**Financial provisions**

14(1) The board may open accounts in banks, credit unions or trust corporations in its name and appoint signing officers.

(2) The board may invest any money in its possession or control that is not immediately required for the purpose of its operations in securities approved by the Investment Board established pursuant to *The Department of Finance Act, 1983*, and may sell any securities so acquired by it and reinvest any of the proceeds of those securities in a similar manner.

(3) The fiscal year of the board is the period commencing on January 1 in one year and ending on December 31 in the same year.

#### REGISTRATION

**Registration and licensing of producers**

15(1) Every producer shall register with the board.

(2) The board shall maintain at its head office a register containing the name and address of each producer.

(3) The board shall remove from the register of producers the name of any person who ceases to be a producer.

(4) Every producer shall obtain an annual licence from the board, and no producer shall produce or market hatching eggs without a licence.

(5) The fee for the annual registration and licensing of a producer is \$10.

**Registration**

16(1) Every person who owns or operates a hatchery that purchases hatching eggs shall register with the board at the time and in the manner required by the board.

(2) The board shall maintain at its head office a register containing the name and address of each hatchery purchasing hatching eggs.

(3) Every owner or operator of a hatchery shall obtain an annual licence from the board, and no person shall operate a hatchery without a licence.

**17(1)** Where the board cancels or suspends a licence of any person pursuant to clause 8(1)(h), written notice of the cancellation or suspension, including the reasons for the cancellation or suspension, shall be served on the person by registered mail or personally at least four weeks prior to the cancellation or suspension.

Notice of  
cancellation  
or suspension

(2) A notice pursuant to subsection (1) served by registered mail is deemed to have been received on the seventh day following the day of its mailing, unless the person to whom it was mailed establishes that, through no fault of his own, he did not receive the notice or that he received it at a later date.

**18(1)** A person who objects to the cancellation or suspension of his licence may notify the board that he so objects providing the reasons why he objects.

Objection to  
board

(2) Notwithstanding subsection 11(2), the board shall review a decision about which an objection is filed pursuant to subsection (1) and shall confirm, reverse or vary the decision as soon as possible.

**19(1)** A decision of the board pursuant to subsection 18(2) may be appealed to the council and, after hearing the matter, the council may confirm or reverse the decision of the board.

Appeal

(2) A decision of the council pursuant to subsection (1) is final.

#### MEETINGS

**20(1)** The board shall call an annual meeting of registered producers at any time before April 30 of each year and at a place determined by the board.

Meetings of  
producers

(2) The board may call special meetings of registered producers at any time and shall call a special meeting on the written request of:

(a) council; or

(b) 30% of, or at least five, registered producers;

within 30 days after the request is made.

(3) The board shall provide notice in writing to registered producers of the place, date and hour of any annual or special

meeting of registered producers at least 14 days prior to the meeting and, in the case of a special meeting, the board shall include in the notice the nature of the business to be conducted at the meeting.

(4) The quorum at an annual meeting or special meeting of registered producers is five registered producers.

(5) The chairman, or in his absence the vice-chairman, shall preside at all meetings of registered producers unless the registered producers choose to elect a chairman.

(6) The board shall prepare and submit to the annual meeting:

(a) a proposed budget outlining the collection and expenditure of funds during the next fiscal year; and

(b) an outline of proposed programs and activities for the next fiscal year.

(7) The registered producers shall fix the fees charged on broiler breeders kept by producers or hatching eggs marketed by producers at each annual meeting.

#### QUOTAS

Quotas

**21**(1) For the purposes of this section, "permit" means a special written authority, considered by the board to be necessary to meet short-term increased demands for hatching eggs, issued by the board to a producer allowing him to increase his production above his quota in a specified amount and for a limited time.

(2) The board may by order provide for the fixing and allotting of quotas and permits to producers for the production and marketing of hatching eggs.

(3) On establishment of the plan, the board shall allot quotas to producers by:

(a) determining the capacity of each producer's production unit;

(b) determining the total capacity of all production units in Saskatchewan;

(c) after determining the provincial quota required to meet market demand, allotting to each producer a share of the provincial quota in proportion to his production unit's share of the total capacity of all production units; and

(d) determining provincial quotas annually.

(4) The board shall offer at least one half of:

(a) any increase in the provincial quota; and

(b) any quota that reverts to the board;

to producers not already holding hatching egg quotas and shall offer any remaining quota to producers already holding hatching egg quotas.

(5) The board shall maintain a list of applicants for quotas and shall, subject to subsection (4), prescribe the manner in which quotas will be offered to the applicants should the provincial quota increase.

(6) A quota or permit allotted to a producer is considered part of the production unit and may be transferred from one producer to another by the board where a sale or other disposition of the production unit occurs, provided that the board is satisfied that no remuneration is being paid or received by any person in consideration of the allotting of the quota or permit.

(7) Any decrease of provincial quota prescribed by the board causes a decrease of all quotas allotted to registered producers on a *pro rata* basis.

#### ELECTIONS

**22(1)** Every registered producer is eligible to vote for any purpose under the plan and to hold any office of the board. Eligible voters

(2) A registered producer who is a corporation, co-operative, partnership, association, society or person carrying on business under a corporate name, trade name, farm name or other designation is entitled to vote or hold office only through a designated representative appointed in writing and notice of whose appointment is filed with the board at the time of registration.

(3) Except as provided in subsection (2), voting by proxy is prohibited and each registered producer is entitled to one vote.

**23(1)** The provisional board shall conduct a vote among registered producers to elect the first board in accordance with subsection (2) and section 25. Election of first board of directors

(2) The provisional board shall call the vote described in subsection (1) at any time within 12 months after these regulations come into force.

**24(1)** The directors hold office for a term of three years. Terms of office

(2) A director is eligible for re-election after the end of his term.

(3) The term of office of each member of the first board commences on the day on which he is declared elected by the returning officer and ends on December 31:

- (a) in the case of the director receiving the largest number of votes, of the third year following the year in which the election is held;
- (b) in the case of the director receiving the second largest number of votes, of the second year following the year in which the election is held; and
- (c) in the case of the director receiving the third largest number of votes, of the first year following the year in which the election is held.

Conduct of  
elections

**25(1)** The board shall arrange for the conduct of elections, fix a date for receiving nominations and, at least 30 days before the date so fixed, send to each registered producer a notice stating that nominations are being accepted for the board and giving the date fixed for receiving nominations.

(2) The board shall appoint a returning officer who is not a registered producer nor an employee of the board.

(3) Every nomination is to be in writing in the form prescribed by the board, signed by two registered producers or their representatives and delivered to the returning officer not later than the date fixed for receiving nominations.

(4) If not more than the required number of candidates are nominated, the candidates so nominated are to be declared elected by acclamation.

(5) If more than the required number of candidates are nominated the board shall, at least 21 days prior to the date fixed for the election, send by prepaid post to each registered producer, the ballot, a plain envelope and a notice of the time by which and the place to which the ballot is to be returned.

(6) All voting is to be by ballot, and the ballot is to be sealed in the plain envelope provided and returned in person or by mail to the returning officer.

(7) The returning officer shall declare those candidates receiving the most votes, up to the number of director's positions to be filled, to be directors of the board.

(8) Ties between candidates are to be decided by the drawing of lots.

(9) A registered producer is deemed to have received any notice, nomination paper or ballot that is posted to him at his last address registered with the board, and the failure of any registered producer to receive any such notice, nomination paper or ballot does not invalidate the election.

(10) Where a registered producer votes for more than the specified number of candidates required to fill the vacancies on the board, his ballot is not valid.

(11) If any delay or irregularity occurs in any election, or if any doubt arises as to the validity of the election, the council shall determine who the directors of the board are, fix their terms of office and, if the council considers it advisable, direct the holding of a special election of directors.

SCHEDULE

**1** These regulations may be cited as *The Pesticide Prohibition Regulations, 1985*. Title

**2(1)** The herbicides 2, 4, 5-trichlorophenoxyacetic acid (2, 4, 5-T), 2, 4, 5-trichlorophenoxypropionic acid (fenoprop) and other chemicals formed from the 2, 4, 5-trichlorophenoxy base molecule are designated as pesticides. Designation of pesticides

(2) The chemical 2, 4-dichlorophenyl p-nitrophenyl ether, which is commonly known as niclofen or nitrofen and which may be marketed under the trade name TOK, is designated as a pesticide.

**3(1)** No person shall use any preparation or formulation containing any herbicide described in subsection 2(1) or apply any of it to water, land or vegetation growing on the land. Prohibitions

(2) Any person owning any preparation or formulation containing any herbicide described in subsection 2(1) shall dispose of it only in accordance with written instructions from the Department of the Environment.

(3) No person shall use in any way or sell the chemical, or a preparation or formulation containing the chemical, described in subsection 2(2).

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council, on the recommendation of the Minister of Urban Affairs, pursuant to section 10 of *The Provincial Capital Fund Program Act*, makes *The Provincial Capital Fund Program Regulations* in accordance with the attached Schedule.

#### SCHEDULE

Title      **1** These regulations may be cited as *The Provincial Capital Fund Program Regulations*.

Interpretation      **2** In these regulations:

'Act'      (a) "Act" means *The Provincial Capital Fund Program Act* ;

'municipality's share of the capital cost'      (b) "municipality's share of the capital cost" means the capital cost incurred by a municipality, less any amount the municipality will recover:

(i) from property owners who abut the capital work; and

(ii) through special assessments, charges or levies as a result of that capital work.

Duration of program      **3** Financial assistance in the form of grants is payable during the 1985-86 and 1986-87 fiscal years.

Eligible capital costs      **4** For a municipality to be eligible for a grant, the capital costs are to be incurred between January 1, 1985 and December 31, 1986.

- 5** Notwithstanding sections 3 and 4, a grant for which a municipality would be eligible pursuant to these regulations may be paid after the end of the 1986-87 fiscal year where the application is received and the capital costs are incurred within the time prescribed in section 4, but where the grant has not been paid. Exception
- 6** The per capita amount is \$25 per year. Per capita amount
- 7** The maximum amount of a grant which a municipality may receive for each capital work is equal to the lesser of: Maximum grant for capital work
- (a) 60% of the capital cost;
  - (b) the municipality's share of the capital cost; or
  - (c) where the municipality receives grant funding for the capital work from the government of Saskatchewan pursuant to any other Act or a Saskatchewan Crown corporation, from the government of another province or from the government of Canada, in addition to a grant pursuant to the program, an amount equal to 75% of the capital cost, that amount to be reduced by the total amount of all funding, if any, received from those other sources.
- 8(1)** A municipality's capital works plan is to include all capital works which are included in the application for the grant. Capital works plan
- (2)** A capital works plan filed pursuant to subsection 6(2) of the Act is to be revised annually.
- 9(1)** A municipality is deemed to have acquired or constructed a capital work and to have incurred a capital cost where it has by bylaw: Capital work deemed acquired, etc.
- (a) entered into an agreement with:
    - (i) another municipality;
    - (ii) a rural municipality;
    - (iii) the government of Saskatchewan, of another province or of Canada;
    - (iv) an agency or Crown corporation of a body mentioned in subclause (i) or (ii); or
    - (v) any combination of the bodies mentioned in subclauses (i) to (iv);
- for the purpose of making a contribution to the cost of constructing or purchasing a physical asset and has made the contribution; or
- (b) entered into an agreement with a corporation incorporated in Saskatchewan which is purchasing or constructing a physical asset for the benefit of the public to

make a contribution, including a contribution by means of purchasing any share capital of the corporation as permitted under section 150 of *The Urban Municipality Act, 1984*, and has made the contribution.

(2) Notwithstanding section 7, where a capital work is deemed to be acquired or constructed pursuant to subsection (1), the maximum amount of a grant for that capital work is 60% of the contribution made by the municipality.

Payment of  
grant

**10(1)** Where a capital work is being constructed, added to or altered and a grant has been approved with respect to that capital work, a municipality may, when one third of the anticipated capital cost has been incurred, submit a statement and receive payment of an interim grant in an amount not exceeding one third of the anticipated grant for the capital work.

(2) The minister may pay a grant for a capital work, less any amount paid as an interim grant, when a municipality has submitted an application for a grant and evidence satisfactory to the minister that:

(a) the capital work has been acquired and the capital cost incurred by the municipality;

(b) the municipality has made its contribution to the cost of a capital work being acquired or constructed in the case described in section 9; or

(c) the construction, alteration, addition to or replacement of the capital work is complete and the capital cost has been incurred.

(3) The evidence of the completion of the capital work being completed and the capital cost having been incurred is to be signed by a person who is designated by or satisfactory to the minister.

Duties of the  
municipality

**11** When a grant to a municipality has been approved, the municipality shall:

(a) maintain books and records that, to the satisfaction of the minister, convey a clear and accurate account of the capital work and capital cost;

(b) at the request of the minister, provide at the municipality's expense an audited statement of the capital cost of a capital work;

(c) permit any person designated by the minister to enter or have access to the records for the purpose of verifying that the capital work has been completed;

(d) notify the minister of any change in a proposed capital work for which approval of a grant has been given or if that capital work is not to proceed.

  - (a) basement — 80% of main floor rate;
  - (b) first floor above main floor — 80% of main floor rate;
  - (c) second floor above main floor — 60% of main floor rate.
2. The adjustments indicated above are not applicable to workshop and equipment areas, warehouse and storage, vaults, car parks, grain elevators or feed and seed mills.
3. When adjustments are made in business assessments according to this directive, an explanation is to be shown on the assessment field sheet.

2. Retail outlets, public accommodation, etc., open for a partial year only - pro-rate assessment on the basis of the number of months during which service is offered to the public.
3. Auction Marts:
  - (a) one day per month — 40%;

  - (d) two to three days per week — 75%;
  - (e) four to six days per week — 100%.

- (A) a resident of Saskatchewan;
- (B) a Canadian citizen or a permanent resident of Canada; and
- (C) in the opinion of the corporation, actively engaged in farming;
  - (ii) a corporation that is incorporated, continued or registered pursuant to *The Business Corporations Act* whose head office is in Saskatchewan, where all the shareholders of the corporation are individuals described in subclause (i);
  - (iii) a co-operative that is incorporated, continued or registered pursuant to *The Co-operatives Act*, where all the members of the co-operative are persons described in subclause (i);
  - (iv) a partnership where all the partners are individuals described in subclause (i).

**“32.2** Where the corporation receives an application from a farmer pursuant to subsection (1) and the corporation is satisfied that the farmer has complied with these regulations, it may make an advance to the farmer with respect to his eligible livestock to a maximum amount equal to the sum of the products of:

- (a) \$125 and the number of his cattle that are eligible livestock;
- (b) \$125 and the number of his horses that are eligible livestock;
- (c) \$25 and the number of his sheep that are eligible livestock;
- (d) \$25 and the number of his goats that are eligible livestock.

“(2) The corporation may establish any terms and conditions it considers appropriate for an advance made pursuant to this Part.

Rate of interest

**“32.3** All advances made pursuant to this Part bear no interest until the date they are due as determined by the terms and conditions of the advance and, after that date, bear interest at the rate of 11 3/4% per annum”.

Section 33 amended

**4** The heading before section 33 is amended by striking out “PART V” and substituting “PART VII”.

Coming into force
